Immediately following his graduation he began active duty in the United States Air Force. Throughout his years in practice he was a member of the Southern Arizona Dental Society and the American Dental Association. Beyond his family, his practice and his involvement in community activities, Gene had another passion: the Wildcats. For more than three decades he and Joan held season tickets to UA football and basketball games, often traveling out of state to watch the Wildcats play. In all, he loved life, his family, the outdoors and animals - daily living ethically, responsibly, fully and happily. He leaves behind a bright mosaic of memorable actions, experiences and relationships that will comfort, sustain and be a source of continuous pride to his family, friends and former patients.
