Eighteen Years Ago

Wells, merchant at the Flats; Charles F. Wells, of Iowa; H. O. Wells, residing at the homestead, and Marguerite, now deceased. She was the wife of Porter Whelply, now living in Madison, Lake Co, Ohio. Her death was the first in this family of seven children. Mentor Gore known as Mentor Headlands is a tract of land lying on the south shore of Lake Erie, in the township of Mentor. Bounded by Lake Erie on the northwest, and by the old river bed southwest, and the swamp land running a south westerly direction to the big marsh near to the Willoughby line. The first settler was Capt. Daniel H. Green, a lake captain. The headlands were mostly settled by sailors in the early days. Capt. Green built a log house on the place where Mr. Justin Titus now lives; and later built the frame house Mr. Titus lives in. Capt. James McAdams married Capt. Green's sister and built the second house on the Headlands.

The next settler was Elder Philip Lockwood, who lived on the land Capt. Thadford W. Burns now lives on. The next settlers were Captains Henry, Hugh and Andros Brooks, three brothers. Mentioned Captain Alexander Snell.

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Cooking Green Corn.

A new corn preparation, much in vogue with the German population, is called "suckumgode." It is prepared as follows: Of fourteen medium ears of green corn, the grain is mashed on the cob with a lever and then scraped off with the back of a knife, put into a pan to stew with one pint of cold water and placed upon the stove. When it comes to a boil, put in pepper and salt to taste; two large-sized tomatoes with skins taken off, sliced, and a lump of butter the size of two eggs. Boil three-quarters of an hour, or until done. Keep covered and stir occasionally to keep from sticking. The Germans eat it for breakfast as well as dinner, and assert that it cannot be beaten. Pear soup and cherry soup made with a piece of meat for seasoning are also great dishes with the Germans in this State.

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Receipt for Making Coffee.

Grind two gills of roasted Rio coffee as fine as possible. Put into a common tin coffee pot. Add two tin cupfuls of cold water and set on the back part of the stove and let it come to a boil gradually. When at the boiling point set off and serve. It requires no additions to settle it, as it is beautifully clear. The above quantity will make six medium coffee cupfuls of No. 1 coffee, good enough for any man, and very easily made. Try it.

The Late Isaac Moore

Mr. Isaac Moore, late of Mentor, and one of the earliest settlers of Lake County, died at the home of his son, Milan Moore, in Farmer City, Illinois, on Oct. 7 1882, age 89 yrs. His remains were taken to Clinton, Ill., and there laid by the side of his two daughters in Woodlawn Cemetery. Mr. Moore was born in 1794, in New York, near Baltown. His father's name was John Moore, and his mother's name, before marriage, was Leah Groome. In 1811, when he was 18 yrs. old, he with his parents and a sister (two years younger than he) came to Geauga Co., Ohio, and in a short time settled on the east branch of the Chagrin River on a farm now owned by Mr. Reuben Harmon. In 1816, he purchased about 100 acres of land, the northeast corner of which was about 20 rods south of the Mormon Temple in Kirtland. In 1830, he exchanged his farm for one owned by a Mormon by the name of Williams, living in Warrensville, Cuyahoga Co., O., where he lived until 1836-37, when he purchased the Hawkins' farm in Mentor, and later sold it to his son-in-law, Henry C. King. Mr. Moore was married in 1816 to Philena Blish, who came to Ohio in 1805 with her parents, and brothers, Benjamin and Zenas Blish, and their sisters, one of whom, Mrs. Clarissa Dille, is yet living with an adopted daughter in Iowa City, Iowa, at the age of 92. By this marriage, he had 8 children, five sons all now living, and three daughters, none of whom are living. In 1832, his first wife died in Warrensville, leaving him with eight children, the eldest not 16, and the youngest 6 months. In about a year, he married Miss Martha Jones, by whom he had one son, who died when he was about 21. His second wife lived until the spring of 1862. He was again

married to Miss Elizabeth King, a sister of Mr. Oscar Humphrey, of Willoughby, and she died in Willoughby in the spring of 1880, when he came west to spend his remaining days with his children.

The Water Works Now Complete

Starting at a point on Liberty street where the wells and steam works are located, everything is found in perfect order and condition. In the pumping station are two of Worthington's Compound Pumping Engines. Each has a pumping power of 1,000,000 gallons per day.

There are now completed six wells—flowing when not being pumped, and located in a deep bed of soft water gravel; the wells being cemented down into the gravel, so that all water flowing into the well comes direct through the gravel, so that there can be no question as to the purity of the water. The top of the reservoir or tank on High Steed reaches 125 feet above the level of Main street. Benj. F. Stephens, of New York, was the contractor.

In Memoriam

Mrs. Mary Skinner Hine

Mrs. Mary S. Hine was one of Painesville's oldest and earliest residents. She was born in Glastonbury, Hartford Co., Conn., Sept. 20, 1789, and was the oldest child of Captain Abraham Skinner. In 1795, Capt. Skinner moved his family to East Hartford. In Feb., 1805, he started to Painesville. Having previously purchased in company with Eleazer Paine the west part of Painesville township, known as tract four, including what is now known as Fairport, Richmond and the west part of Painesville Village. They came from Connecticut in two sleighs and two or three extra horses which some of the party rode. The family consisted of his wife, two daughters, three sons and two hired men. From Buffalo to Grand River they traveled on the ice on Lake Erie. They first occupied a log cabin on the site of the present residence of Homer H. Hine. A frame house was built on the opposite side of the road in 1805, and in this house, Mary Skinner married Homer Hine, a lawyer from Youngstown, Oct. 5, 1807. The frame of this house is part of the present home, of her grandson, Clarence A. Hine. In 1806 Mr. & Mrs. Hine moved to Youngstown. After the death of her husband and in 1856, Mrs. Hine continued to reside in Youngstown with her youngest son, Augustus, until 1872, when she moved with him to Painesville, remaining in his family until her death. Of her father's family, her sister, Paulina, who married Nathan Perry, and is

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the mother of Mr. H. B. Payne, and now lives in Cleveland, is the only survivor. She was the mother of eight children, five of whom are still living: Homer H. Hine, and Augustus Hine of Painesville; Samuel Hine, of Poland; Mrs. Dudley Baldwin and Mrs. Henry Wick, of Cleveland.
