A Work of Art



[On the last day of the session, he was startled by a revelation given from the present Joseph Smith, which is in the article.]

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Training Tomatoes.
The substance of the following mode of training tomatoes, so that they may occupy less space in cramped gardens, and be clear from mud in rains, is given by a writer in the *American Garden*: Drive forked sticks into the ground, or insert them into holes made by a sharp and slender dibble, at each plant in the rows, so that the forks may be about three feet high. Place light poles horizontally in these forks, and secure them by tying. As soon as the plants are large enough, train them up to the poles and tie them. Nip the ends if they grow much above. If autumn frosts are threatened, cover the plants with the doubled folds of large newspapers hung over the poles.

Mr. C. C. Bronson, of Talmadge, told the story of the first marriage in Mentor, which occurred in 1799. Joseph Tuttle, of Concord, related his experience in coming to Ohio in 1815. He is age 87 yrs.

Mr. James Prouty is 66 and was here at the age of five. In sight of this grove a large wolf was

caught in a trap for which Capt. Griswold obtained a \$15 bounty.

Mr. Thos. Morley, age 89, of Mentor came here in 1829. Gen. Northrop, now 89 yrs. old, was raised in Conn. He came to Medina Co. in 1816 with Elijah Boardman, who was one of the first owners of land here, to assist in surveying and setting off 20 townships. He gave a detailed description of the wedding of his sister in 1818. Rev. L. W. Ely, of Painesville, came here with his parents from Mass. in 1817. They were four weeks on the road. Settled in Bainbridge where there were but five families.

Moses Thompson, of Perry, aged 83, came here in 1831. A. Teachout, of Cleveland, said he rejoiced to meet so many old pioneers on this occasion.

Wm. Rexford came to Mentor 66 yrs. ago. Capt. Oliver Andrews, age 87, came to Painesville in 1834, from Conn., where he was born in 1797. Wm. Hendry, of Madison, told a story.

Chester Palmer came to Ohio sixty-one years ago and settled in Kingsville.

J. H. Luse, age 70, is one of two survivors of a family of 17 children. John Park, of Kirtland, age 83, said a few words concerning the hardships and privation of his early life. Mr. Willis Woodruff, of Concord, told the last story he is age 83.


The Willoughby Fire

p. 4 Burying Rubbish

People are encouraged to dig short drainage ditches on their farms and put tile in the bottom for drainage. Then they can put on top of that the rubbish (old hoops, broken bricks, broken glass and pottery, rusted stove pipe, etc.) that people are often puzzled with where to put it. As it accumulates, the rubbish is covered with 2 feet of earth and the ditch extended to receive more. Sunflowers or corn can be planted in front to screen the ditch from view.

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Sour Kront.

The cabbages are sliced quite thinly and shredded into a barrel, being well sprinkled with salt as it is put in the barrel. As a foot or so of the cabbage is put into the barrel it is packed down tight with a rammer. When the barrel is nearly full, considerable water will gather over the cabbage, and a loose head is put in and kept down upon the cabbage by a heavy weight. The liquor is left on the top. In a few weeks considerable acid develops in the cabbage, and then it is ready for use. To use it a quantity is taken out of the barrel and washed in fresh water and stewed until tender in no more water than is necessary. It is usually flavored with caraway or coriander seeds.

How Towns are Built Up Among Mountains Where no Road May Come

Article describes the pack trains made up of horses or mules that may take weeks to get to their destinations. Normally the pack trains have 50 animals. Mules are preferred to horses because their backs are more level and they are less liable to be chafed by their loads. The pack saddle and aparejo, with two great saddle bags, are described.

Death of Judge Reuben Hitchcock of Painesville

Judge Hitchcock died at Clifton Springs, N.Y., Dec. 9th, age 77 yrs. He was born at Burton, Geauga Co., Sept. 2nd, 1806. He was the son of Chief Justice Peter Hitchcock, a native of Cheshire, Conn. He received his early education at Burton Academy and at the age of 17 made the long journey on horseback to New Haven, Conn., and entered Yale College in 1823 and graduated in 1826. He returned to Burton to teach and was admitted to the Bar in 1831 and moved to Painesville. In 1834, he married Miss Sarah Marshall, of Colebrook, Conn. In 1846, he moved to Cleveland and was head of the firm of Hitchcock, Wilson & Wade. In 1851, he returned to Painesville and was elected Judge of the Court of Common Pleas. In 1855, he became the legal advisor of the Cleveland & Mahoning Railroad Co. Judge Hitchcock was one of the founders of Lake Erie Seminary. He had four children, two sons and two daughters, and nine living grandchildren, all grandsons. He leaves a deeply afflicted wife.
