Mrs. A. J. Goldsmith was born in Hinsdale, Berkshire Co. Mass., April 29, 1787, and was Abigail Jones. She married June 6, 1808 to Jonathan Goldsmith. This poem is from Mrs. Goldsmith:

Painesville as it Was in 1811.
From Massachusetts rocks and streams,
To find out this land of our dreams,
And make a final stay,
We climbed up hills and down their steep,
A full month and a day,

And here found Painesville long ago,
July, eighteen eleven,
Not then a built up town as now,
With steam cars running to and fro,
But seemed much nearer heaven.

All over town men were like brothers,
Our neighbors were Chagrin,
Mentor, Kirtland and some others,
Where Painesville men walked in.

To help new comers roll up their house,
With chimney outside, of sticks
Laid up in mud "sick as a mouse;"
No time to be burning bricks.

Painesville was in Geauga then,
And all of five miles square,
And folks went to "the opening,"

When they went any where,
For a sawed board to make a door,
Rived logs were hewn and laid for floor.
Time was they went to Erie
In open boats for all they had,
And every "grist" to make their bread;
The truth it seems you'll querie,

But Joel Scott, a fine old gent,
After much time and money spent,
Those pressing wants supplied;
Had reared a mill that went "to kill"
Years after he had died

In fact that same is running yet,
The "identical one" if we admit,
New blades and handles too—
As many, or more, as the Yankee of yore,
'Twas Jack knife since twas "new,

Now heretofore there'd been no store
For "groceries and dry goods,"
Only each brought what ere he thought
Most useful in the woods,

But since the mill, right up the hill,
It seems I see it now—
A "store" then stood, all made of good
Rough boards nailed on to posts of wood,
I scarce can tell you how,

The size, eighteen by twelve feet wide,
One story high and not for pride,
A "sale box" roof near flat,
The window eight panes (seven by nine),
Or twelve at most, as I opine,
But am not sure of that.

This store, the first on Painesville soil,
Famed not for architectural toil,
But told of times most frugal.
Archibald Campbell owned it then,
'Twas made I think in Eighteen Ten
For one Hugal McDougal.

In Eleven this structure stood complete,
The "gable end" was towards the street,
(All but the street and gable).
The streets were common thoroughfares,
Over "the opening" here and there
By shrub oaks bordered everywhere,
Retrospect seems a fable.

Family Reminiscence.

A very rare circumstance and one undoubtedly without a parallel occurred in the family relations of two sisters, the late wife of W. D. Hardy and the present wife of John Multer of this place, the latter marrying for her first husband the late P. H. Varney, Chardon, Geauga county. These ladies were two of a family of seven sisters, children of the late Gaius and Dorcas Kent, formerly of Conn. Mr. Kent

with his family emigrated to Ohio, about the year 1823, coming first to Conneaut, afterward settling in Chardon, where he spent the principal part of the remainder of his life. But to follow up the history of the two sisters already mentioned. Mrs. Hardy became the mother of seven children. Mrs. Multer was blessed with the same number, (corresponding precisely with the number in their father's family) each of these two families consisted of four sons and three daughters. Mrs. Hardy lost two in infancy, a boy and girl. Mrs. Multer was called upon to part with the same number of the same sex at about the same age, leaving five in each family, three sons and two daughters, who arrived at years of maturity.

During the late war the three sons of each family enrolled their names in defence of their country. Of Mrs. Hardy's three boys two found a resting place 'neath southern soil. Mrs. Multer made the same sacrifice. The two eldest sons of each family being laid on the altar of their country. The youngest son of each family alone being permitted, through the providence of God, to return to the afflicted parents, without even a scratch as evidence of the bloody struggle through which they had passed. Of the fourteen children of the two families six are still living, one son and two daughters of each family.

Death of Levi Kerr

Sat. Morning the New York *Herald* contained a dispatch from Florida giving an account of the fatal accident. Mr. Kerr left Cleveland two weeks ago yesterday. 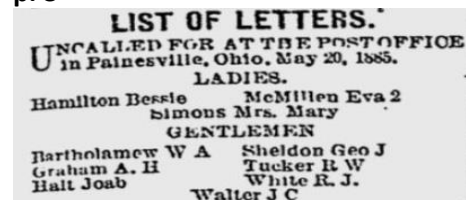

In 1803, Spencer Phelps came from Mass. In 1805, Paul Clapp

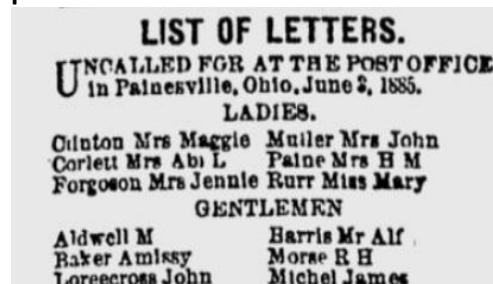

moved his family to the wilds of Ohio, and the same year John and David French came from Mass. and located land. Forty of the Williams family met on June 27, 1885, at the home of H. S. Williams in LeRoy for a reunion. Mr. S. B. Baxter, of LeRoy, was chosen President, and Mrs. B. E. Burr, of Montville, Sec. After dinner, a beautiful easy chair was presented to Mrs. W. A. Davis, nee Sarah Williams, by her husband, it being her 65th birthday. The 27th was also the birthday of Mrs. H. S. Williams, who received gifts from her husband. Next was a brief account of the journey from Mass. to Ohio by S. D. Williams (now deceased) and his brother, Heman Williams, now living in Concord at the age of 88 yrs., 7 mos. He had put the account on paper and it was read by his daughter.

Lanesborough, Berkshire Co., Mass. June 17, 1817. S. D. Williams, age 22 and his brother, Heman, age 20, talked of finding a home in the western states. When they got to Painesville, they found a land owner and purchased two lots in LeRoy. They sold their horses for \$100 each which they gave in payment for the land and returned to Mass. on foot. On Oct. 3, they started with an ox team and a wagon and reached what was then Geauga Co., on Nov. 3, which was Heman's 21st birthday. He returned to Mass. in 1821 and married Miss Anna Reynolds They had 10 children; six still living. His brother, also returned to Mass. for a wife and married Miss Frelove Brown and had eight children, six are still living.

Due to the inclement weather Tuesday, it was necessary to abandon the Pioneer Meeting and it was decided to postpone it for two weeks. Mr. C. C. Bronson was going to read two articles at the meeting but cannot be here in two weeks. He permitted us to make extracts (below).

In the spring of 1797, Lorenzo Carter and Ezekiel Hawley arrived and took up residence in Cleveland in the family of Major Carter. The first marriage on the Connecticut Western Reserve was in July: Chloe Inshes to a Mr. Clement from Canada. The second marriage was in what is called Mentor, Geauga Co. There being no townships at the time, they designated the localities by the name of settlements. This wedding was at the Marsh Settlement in 1799. It was west of Black Brook near the lake shore. In 1798, Col. Alexander Harper, Major William McFarland and Ezra Gregory with their families arrived at what is since known as Harpersfield, Ashtabula Co., from Harpersfield, Delaware Co., N.Y. In Major McFarland's family was a young

widow, name Parthena Mingus. She married James Hamilton, who lived in Newburg, fifty miles away. They heard that in the Marsh Settlement there was a man by the name of Moses Parks, who had been a Baptist preacher and they made the long ride to him to be married.

Death of Eber D. Howe

Eber D. Howe died at his home in this city last night, age 88 yrs. He was born in Clifton Park, Saratoga Co., N. Y., June 9, 1798. At the age of 14, he enlisted and served as a soldier in the war of 1812-14. In 1819, he established the Cleveland *Herald* in connection with Ziba Willes.

He severed his connection with the *Telegraph* in 1835, since which time he has lived a quiet and rather retired life.

Samuel Moodey whose death we mentioned in our last issue was born in Painesville, Jan. 8, 1816, and has made this place his home for all that time. He and his father, Robert Moodey, purchased the stock of drugs, etc. of Mr. Hills and for many years conducted business under the name of R. & S. Moodey. He built a block on the corner of State and Main streets. Mr. Moodey leaves one son, Charles A. Moodey, who resides at the homestead and with whom the father made his home at the time of his death.

The farm was covered with an immense growth of oak and chestnut, which soon melted away under the sturdy blows of his ax and of his stalwart sons, as they one after another grew up to manhood. What a family that was; nine sons and four daughters. Perry, the oldest, at 19, went off to Georgia, married there, had

a family of sons and daughters and never came back. William died early and was the first buried in the cemetery at the flats. In 1837 or 38, Lori Holmes sold out to the Mormons and moved south near Columbus, O. Here he died. In 1845 the family came back to the old farm, though Charles and Hiram having married there did not, but remained until recently where they also died. John became a preacher in the Methodist church. He too is dead. He was conceded to be one of the handsomest men in Geauga county.

Somewhere about 1850 the noble mother of this family died. Her grave may be seen in the old cemetery. Her maiden name was Betsey Curtis and that makes the writer of this article cousin to the Holmes, in which he doth rejoice much.

About 1855, the old farm was sold a second time. This scattered the family; Stephen went to Binghamton, N. Y., and is there to day. He has never been back and never married. Henry went to Wisconsin, so did Jeanette his youngest sister, who married John Barnes of this place.
