Among the things in Polly's kitchen was an old wooden clock made in Winchester, England, over one hundred years ago. An old flint lock gun taken by John Watts in the French and Indian wars in 1756, an old log cradle, an old shoemakers candle stick, an old warming bed pan over 200 years old.

On Aunt Polly's clothes line hung an old red petticoat over 80 years old and an old pair of fustian pantaloons made in England nearly a century ago.

In one corner hung an old cross-cut saw traced back to the Sinclair's in Scotland 130 years ago.

Mrs. O. Baker amused the young people by spinning flax by hand (in the old way.

Outside of Aunt Polly's kitchen hung D. Wyman's old tavern sign, "Perry Inn" which hung over the South Ridge Road years before the surveyors went through for the L. S. & M. S. R. R.

Among the other articles we notice that Mrs. Craine contributed a cane and snuff box over 100 years old.

Mrs. John Harper, an old German shoe with wooden sole and shod with iron, also a wooden mortar and pestle over 200 years old.

Mrs. D. B. Sinclair, three knots raw silk and silk dress and stockings spun and wove by Mrs. Sarah Tisdell over 50 years ago.

Mrs. Butterfield, one bed quilt, quilted and printed by hand 62 years ago by Mrs. Captain Butterfield, now 90 years old and great-great-grandmother. Her picture we find here in the "five generations" taken a short time since. Also fancy work of Mrs. B's, which the girls of to-day cannot excel.

Also a beautiful specimen of coral from Sandwich Islands. Four specimens of lava and brimstone from Kilauea, Hawaiian Islands.

A watchman's rattle brought from New Orleans forty years ago; a shark's jaw with five rows of teeth. A wreath of hair flowers, the work of Miss Mary Lamson, now deceased.

Mrs. Davis, a side saddle over one hundred years old; also her wedding dress and gloves.

Mrs. E. B. Haskell, a cane, 97 years old; a sundial cast in 1762; a bible marked MDCXCVI (1696); a revolutionary tea-cup as thick and as large as an egg shell.

Mrs. Tooty, knife and fork used at Washington's tea party; an old silk corset 140 years old; an old wedding coat of 1750, worn by Mr. Hall.

Mrs. Mary Mosher, dishes used 80 years ago; a pair of spectacles used in 1750.

Several old bibles were shown over one hundred years old, an old case knife 150 years old; old justice of peace records of 1825.

Relics of the revolution, also of war of 1812, and no end to those of the late rebellion.

Coins and old paper money.

Bed quilts and sheets and clothing made by grandmothers long since dead.

Specimens of shells, minerals, birds eggs and stuffed birds too numerous to mention; among which was a stuffed peacock by Mrs. James McVitty, greatly admired.

Mrs. Julia Shepard's fine plush embroidered banner was very fine.

Mrs. W. Woodhead exhibited a violin made in England in 1694 with date inside; also a pair of tongs from England over 80 years old.

Rev. L. H. Stewart exhibited a section of a stockade post from Andersonville Prison.

## **Pioneer Sketch**

### **History of the Painesville Mills**

The pioneer had a great inconvenience when after harvest, he had to crush his grain by hand in the primitive way, or be compelled to bear it on a tedious journey of days or weeks, through a wilderness of forests and over unbridged rivers before he could reach a mill. In the first years of the Western Reserve, the settlers found it necessary to make pilgrimages of 60 -75 miles to secure the grinding of their grain. At one time there was a small wind mill in Madison operated by a man named Kimball. But Erie was the nearest point for such work.

In 1806, Joel Scott came from Mass. with 4 sons and settled at Newmarket on what is known as the Skinner farm. The next year, they built a small mill on the site of the present Painesville Mills. The castings needed to construct the mill were procured from Middlebury, which settlement has since become a part of the city of Akron. Scott and his sons also built a sawmill and established a ship yard in which they built two schooners that did service on the lakes. Harry Babcock and Mr. E. H. Merrill of Akron, grandson of Joel Scott, were on one of the schooners back in 1820. In 1826, the mill property was sold to the Geauga Furnace Co. It soon burned down and was rebuilt. In 1851, it passed into the hands of P. P. Sanford, then to Rowland Moseley in 1855.



## May 6, 1886

Jonathan Card bought the mill in 1856 and sold it the next year to N. S. Wheeler. It burned down and was rebuilt by W. S. Towsley and Abraham Teachout, of Madison. Boynton & Kurtz purchased it in 1865. Mr. S. Bigler owned the mill in 1870. Painesville Mills standard brands of flour were the Anchor, Magnet and Clipper. Mr. Hill and his son, Addison, were merchants in 1818.

Poem written by Mrs. A. J. Goldsmith is printed. **"Painesville as it was in 1811."**

### **Death of Another Pioneer**

Charles Cook Bronson was born in Woodbury, Conn., July 5, 1804. In 1809, his father moved his family to Tallmadge, Ohio, and located on the farm which continued to be the home of the son until his death a few days ago. He had put on record a vast amount of historical information. He has left eight large books of manuscript containing his recollections and researches of the early history of Northern Ohio. These have been given to the Tallmadge Historical Society. Mr. Bronson was married to Julianna Wetherbee, of Streetsborough, Nov. 16, 1837. She died Jan. 25, 1840, leaving two children, neither of whom are now living. On April 18, 1869, he married Mrs. Clarissa M. Scott, of Mentor, who now survives him.

### **Obituary**

Died at his home in Painesville, O., May 5<sup>th</sup>, 1886, Dr. S. G. Pancost, age 85 yrs. 1 mo., 7 days. Samuel G. Pancost was born in New York City, March 29, 1801—the third child in a family of 14—five sons and nine daughters; one sister and one brother survive him. The father moved his family from the City to Scipio, Cayuga Co., N. Y., in 1806. The father was a carpenter so the farming had to be done mostly by the mother and her little boys. Mr. Jethro Wood, the inventor of the iron plow, was a neighbor and called the plowboy, Samuel, to hold it. It was a source of pride for him that he held the first iron plow made in the world. He married Miss Sally H. Smith in Vermont. In Oct., 1830, he started for the west, Perry, Lake Co., Ohio, with his wife and two baby daughters. He spent a year in Perry then moved to Madison where his wife died Jan., 1833. In time, he married one of the Parmly sisters, a widow Turney. He sold a horse to buy a set of instruments and went to Shelbyville, Ky., and opened an office as a dentist. He came home for several weeks every summer. In 1847, his second wife died, leaving him now with four daughters. Dec. 31<sup>st</sup>, he married Miss M. A. Gammon, of Savannah, Ga., and remained there until summer of 1856 when he came back to Ohio and finally settled in Painesville, April, 1860. In June, his wife died leaving him with three sons to care for. In June, 1862, he married Miss Sarah Baldwin, who survives him. The body was placed in the vault to await interment in Evergreen Cemetery.

President Grover Cleveland married Miss Frances Folsom, of Folsomdale, N. Y., in the Blue Room of the White House, June 2nd 1886. Rev. Wm. N. Cleveland, the brother of the President stood at his left hand. The couple left the reception at 8:30 p.m. and boarded a train to take them to Deer Park to spend the honeymoon.

p. 2 col. 5 The Trousseau of the President's Bride -

The *New York Herald* has a cable description of Miss Folsom's wedding trousseau, which is said recently to have been "the talk of Paris." We quote:

The skirt and corsage of the marriage costume are simple, but their simplicity is relieved by a wealth of soft silk and Indian muslin embroidered with orange blossoms attached to the left side of the skirt and nearly meeting the court train, which is over four yards in length. The train is slightly rounded, and falls in two organ pleats. Two delicate muslin scarfs, bordered with orange-blossoms, are daintily draped across the front of the corsage, and crossing the corsage from left to right is also a broad sash of satin fastened to the hip. The sleeves, which leave the wrists and arms bare almost to the elbows, have three bands of Indian muslin draped on them, forming a plissé; while inside the arms, near the elbows, the sleeves are adorned with tiny sprigs of orange-blossoms. The bridal veil is nearly seven yards long, and is of plain white silk tulle, relieved by myrtle and orange blossoms. It is to be worn high on the head, and will fall gracefully over the train, completely covering it.

For a traveling-dress Miss Folsom has chosen a charming deep gray lamage striped, its cut full and plain, over a simple dark-gray silk petticoat. The corsage opens so as to reveal a double-breasted waist-coat, trimmed half way between the throat and the waist with velvet, terminating at the top in a high collar, fastened by a coquettish gray velvet bow. The waistcoat is brightened by rows of steel buttons, and the whole costume is completed by a large gray hat lined with velvet and trimmed with picot ribbon and ostrich feathers.

Last, but not least, come the ball dresses proper. One—a mystery in white faille—has an underskirt entirely hidden by a net covered with white jet pearls and crystal beads. The train and corsage are of the same materials, the corsage being cut low and round, and the sleeveless shoulder-straps are adorned with bows. To end a long list of wonders, imagine a short, pale blue tulle dress of diaphanous texture embroidered with silver daisies. Beneath this a petticoat of pale-blue sicilienne. The delicate tulle is relieved by a short pointed cuirasse of brocaded silk, while to make the costume perfect, Miss Folsom will deck her hair with silver daisies and cornflowers."

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### For Telling Horses' Ages.

The full-grown horse possesses twenty-four back teeth; that is, six in each side of each jaw; these are called molars or grinders. He has twelve front teeth; that is, six in each jaw. Mares have no tusks. The foal has either at his birth or shortly afterward, eight milk teeth; that is, four in each jaw; at about twelve months two more milk teeth come in each jaw. These remain unchanged until he

is three years old. The mouth of the yearling and two year-old cannot be confounded. The yearling mouth shows no signs of use, and the corner teeth are shells only; at two years old these teeth are strong and well grown, and the corner teeth filed up. A little before three years the two center teeth of each jaw fall out and are replaced by permanent ones. A little before five the two remaining teeth are shed and in their place come permanent ones. The upper milk teeth usually fall out first.

Thus the mouth is completed as to its front teeth; the corner tooth, however, is but imperfectly developed, being at present a shell only; this shell at six years old has filled up and is a complete tooth. This is the difference between a five and six year old. The tusches appear between three and one-half and four years old, and they take nearly two years to arrive at their full growth. These teeth, as the horse grows older, get blunter and shorter, and so to an experienced judge are a sure indication of age. Up to six years old the mouth is in a distinct and periodical state of structural change. There is no difficulty in determining the age up to that date. After that the age must be judged by the shape of the mouth and the appearance of the teeth called the mark. At six years of age the cuts leave the two centre teeth above, at seven the next two above, at eight the outer or corner teeth above.

At nine the two centre teeth below lose the cuts, at ten the next two below, and at eleven the outer or corner teeth below. After a little practice the close observer can scarcely make a mistake. The changes that occur are the same in all horses, or near's so.—*Sportsman*.
