She was the last survivor of the cyclone of 1821 which destroyed their home and carried their baby four miles away to the shores of Sunapee lake while its bed was carried 14 miles away and lodged in a tree top. She is also the last surviving member of her family, who as pioneers, came to Ohio in 1822.

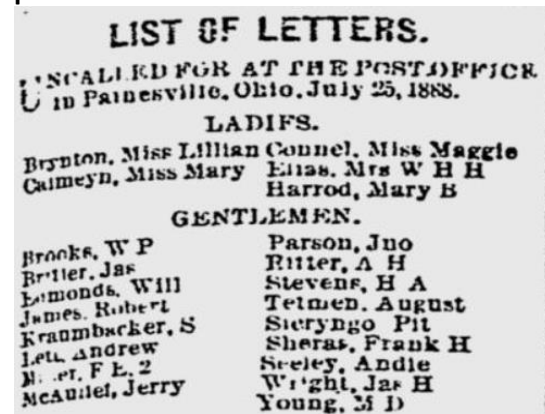

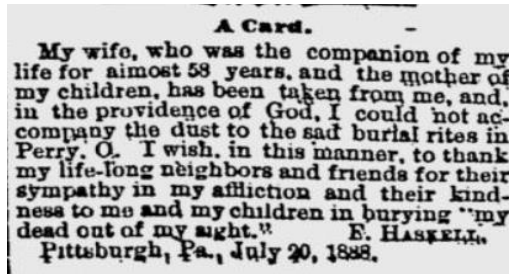

An overview of the fair of the Lake Co. Agricultural Society held in Painesville. The weather was not favorable the first two days. Friday, the day of the races, was a bad day, rain setting in about 10 o'clock and continuing at intervals through the day. Notwithstanding these drawbacks, the receipts will cover expenses and leave a small surplus. The various exhibits of livestock, etc. are discussed.

The following is a summary of the races:
3 YEAR OLD COLTS.
