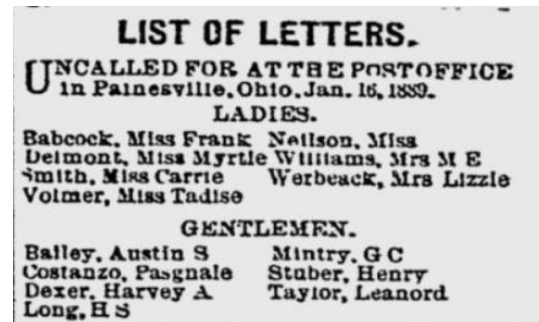

A Perilous Adventure, Mentor Headlands

The Owen and Gibson gill net fishing boats that wintered in Huron, Ohio, were last week several days on the trip down to Fairport where they encountered head wind and ice. The Owen boat managed to get clear of the ice and made harbor, but the other boat was left in the ice when the wind went down. Then a gale struck and the craft drifted helplessly in the tempest when finally, it found the beach near Mentor marsh in a disabled condition. The crew, Wm. Gibson and John L'Homedieu, were 100 yards from shore, and by means to two boards each (one placed in front of the other to crawl upon the ice) they gained the shore. The boat went to pieces in the breakers soon after the men left her.

p. 1 col. 6 DEVASTATING WORK OF THE PENNSYLVANIA FLOOD

Eight thousand deaths are a minimum estimate. The great calamity originated about 70 miles due east of Pittsburgh, in the southern part of Cambria county. Dead bodies are lying all along the banks of the river between Sang Hollow and Johnstown.

Up in the hills above the south fork a large artificial lake had been created by damming. The rains poured all the waters of the region into it; they broke the dam and rushed down the narrow south fork valley in an appalling "tidal wave" without warning. Few could escape and nothing could withstand the torrent. It swept westward along the valley, wiping out town after town, doing untold damage throughout the whole length of the Conemaugh and Kiskiminitas, and finally carrying the tide of disaster even to Pittsburgh itself.

Col. Charles C. Smith, of St. Paul, died at Norwalk, O., April 17th, a few days after returning from Europe. He was born in Niagara Falls in 1830 and was the only son of Maj. C. H. Smith. At age 17 he began to learn railway surveying and construction. In 1850, he accompanied Maj. Barnard, U. S. Engineer, to Mexico on a surveying expedition of the Isthmus of Tehuantepec. Men like Amasa Stone, James F. Joy and James J. Hill sought his services and advice. He entered the war as a volunteer with the rank of Captain, Sept. 9, 1861. On Feb. 26, 1863, he was commissioned Colonel of the Tenth Ohio Cavalry. Last Dec., Col.

No report from Concord

Ten-minute talks were given; the oldest person in the assembly, Moses Morrell, was introduced. He was born in Maine in 1796 and if he lives a few weeks longer will be 93. He enlisted and served in the army in the War of 1812-14. He was stationed for 6 weeks on Campbell's Island off the coast of Portland, Maine. He came to Painesville 56 yrs. ago. He can walk off with his oldest son, age 70, with very little effort.

Moses Thompson, of Perry, age 79, exhibited a mold his mother used over 100 yrs. ago for casting pewter spoons. He told a story of riding a horse at age 3 and grabbing hold of a tree branch from its back.

E. J. Ferris, of Little Mountain, age 88, came here in 1805. He related an incident of being thrown

over his horse's head one dark night while riding on top of his grist.

Jacob Viall, of Willoughby, an ex-sheriff of Lake Co., came here in 1815. Paper took the place of window glass till they could send to Pittsburgh to get it.

Mrs. Harvey Woodworth gave her experience of pioneer life in Painesville. She had exchanged corn for whiskey and the whisky for goods which she made up into clothing.

Dr. St. John, of Willoughby, is age 79. In 1813, his father was drowned in Buffalo, leaving his mother and eleven children. He came to Cleveland in 1826. He received his diploma as a physician and had read law and was admitted to the bar. He spoke of James A. Briggs, one of the early pioneers here.

E. W. Taylor related one or two anecdotes.

I. A. Baxter was born in Mentor in 1825.

Mrs. L. L. Kewish read from an old account book which was opened in East Windsor in Nov. 1772. A pair of stockings were worth 5 shillings sixpence, salt \$10 a barrel.

J. M. Benjamin exhibited a 200-year-old Bible.

Mr. Daniel H. Gray wore a vest which was worn by his father at his marriage in 1806. Also, a coat made of flax woven by his grandmother over 100 yrs. ago.

Charles Carn, of LeRoy, and Charles Lace, exhibited relics from the Isle of man.

Mrs. A. Rust, one of the oldest pioneers, told a story of a man and two boys who were to take wheat to New Orleans by teams to have it ground so they could pay and keep the preacher. It was a long trip and took over ten months, but the boys made it home and sold the flour for \$27 per barrel in gold. The boys were paid \$100 each, the old man \$300, and the rest handed over to the preacher which paid his salary for 4 years.

Obituary

Judge Perry Bosworth died Nov. 19, 1889. He was born in 1816 in Strongsville, Cuyahoga Co. He was admitted to the bar at age 23 yrs. He married Thirza Reed, of Strongsville, and settled in Madison, and was for 8 yrs. engaged in the mill and dry goods business. In 1860, his wife died. Her death, the loss of children and near relatives,

and the destruction of his property by fire, all occurring about the same time, would have crushed a less resolute man. He married the sister of his former wife, his present widow, and came to Painesville to practice law. He lived here 28 yrs. He was Probate Judge, then Clerk of Courts, three times a Mayor, a member of the Constitutional Convention in 1874, and in later years the President of the Board of Education.

Death of Christopher Quinn

Christopher Quinn died at his home on St. Clair street, Nov. 21st. Born Oct. 22nd, 1812, he was 77 yrs. old, and had spent most of his life in Painesville. His place of birth was Town Clare, County Down, Ireland. He came to America on the sailing vessel, Robt. Morris in 1830. The voyage took 10 weeks and 3 days. Mr. Quinn settled first in Cleveland, afterward in Euclid and Willoughby. He was married and resided in Kirtland. He moved to Painesville as County Clerk and his first wife died there. He married second, the widow of the late John W. Howden, a sister of the recently deceased C. D. Adams, Esq. In 1872, his wife died, leaving one daughter, Lizzie, now the widow of Ford W. Tinker.

Death of Nicholas Brink

Mr. Nicholas Brink died at Tiffin, Ohio, last Saturday. Mr. & Mrs. Brink has been visiting their daughter, Mrs. C. E. Pratt for two weeks and were intending to remain until Thanksgiving. Mr. Brink had taken a long ride Saturday afternoon and on returned about 4 p.m., told his daughter, he would take a walk. On passing a house he stopped and told an acquaintance that he felt very tired. Mormons in Canada.

The *Ottawa Citizen*, the organ of the Dominion Government at the capital, sounds the keynote of warning regarding the influx of Mormon population into the Canadian Northwest from Utah, in giving currency to the report that polygamy is being practiced among them at Lees Creek. Mr. Steinhouse, who recently resigned his seat in the British Columbia Legislature to accept the Mormon faith, has within a few days publicly declared that there is no law in the Dominion to prevent Mormons having a plurality of wives. Regarding this interpretation of the Canadian laws, the *Citizen* says that on the strength of the representation that the Mormons now in Canada are not polygamists they have been well treated, no obstacle being placed in the way of their settlement in the country; but once let it be understood that Canada is to have a second Utah in the country, and public sentiment will prove sufficiently strong to stamp out the moral pestilence. If existing laws are not sufficient to meet their case, Parliament will pass such a measure as will do so.
