When he awoke, he found himself in the top of a hay stack. Evidently the sheeting covering the stack from rain had been removed and a hole dug in the hay for the body of Hogisto who was supposed dead. The sheeting was then replaced to conceal the crime.

Richard Neff, who was kicked by a vicious horse on Monday, died Wednesday afternoon. He was 38 yrs. old and leaves a wife, who is the daughter of Mrs. Carlos Mason.

A Tragic Ending

The Geneva case of W. W. Sinclair vs J. G. Fear for defamation of character, which has been on trial in Jefferson for two weeks, had a tragic ending. The defendant was coming into court to hear the verdict and had a pain in the chest. He died the

following day. The physicians pronounced it neuralgia of the heart.

Obituary – Nelson Hoose

Nelson Hoose was born in Mentor, near Little Mountain, Oct. 9, 1831, and died in Perry, Ohio, Oct. 25, 1894. He was the fourth son and the fifth child in the family of eleven children, ten of whom lived to and beyond the years of majority, but only three of whom now survive--Mr. Cornelius Hoose, of Waite Hill, Mrs. Lucy Hill, of Indiana, and Mrs. Olive Hopkins, of Mentor Plains. His parents, Jacob and Sabine Hoose, were among the pioneers of Mentor, having purchased a new farm at a very early day in that part of Mentor near Little Mountain. Mr. & Mrs. Jacob Hoose were natives of New York state. Mrs. Hoose being connected by her mother with the numerous family of Messengers, some of whom settled near Little Mountain in 1815 and 1817. Jacob Hoose died in 1853.

Nelson Hoose was twice married. His first wife, Martha Griffeth, was a daughter of Dr. Samuel Griffeth, and Mrs. Dr. Stebbins, of Painesville, is her sister. By his first marriage, Mr. Hoose had three sons, one of whom, Frank died in childhood and the others, Will and Fred survive. Mrs. Martha Hoose died in 1882.

In 1886, Mr. Hoose married Mrs. Ida A. Ruggles, of Cleveland, who survives him. Soon after his first marriage, Mr. Hoose moved to Arkansas where he lived some time, and he also lived for a time in Illinois. He had a diseased condition of his eyes which prevented him from entering the army as a soldier, he entered the employ of the government as a teamster and saw and suffered much of the hardships of army life in several of the Virginia campaigns. After the war, Mr. Hoose lived for a time in Concord, later in Painesville, and in the fall of 1869, he purchased the property in Perry when he established a business in manufacturing cider and cider vinegar.

Coming back later in the day, they found the multitude had passed but left in their wake thousands that had been killed by the small bird that follows them and stabs the spider to death wherever it is found.

TO COOK POTATOES.

POTATO LOAF—Mashed potatocs, two eggs, well beaten; cold chicken shredded fine. Mix together, adding butter, pepper and salt, and making in the shape of a loaf. Bake brown.

Haggis—This famous old Scotch dish is very simple. Cut the beef in small pieces and mix with mashed potatoes. Season with pepper and salt. Use plenty of butter and bake well.

Porato Mixce Balls—Parboil potatoes equal in quantity to two-thirds of the available cold meat—beef and a little ham, if convenient, chopped fine. Mash the potatoes and mix with the meat and one raw egg. Season with small bits of celery, pepper and salt. Fry in round balls.

Potato Pie—Place in the pastry alternate layers of mashed potatoes and slices of mutton or veal, and three cold boiled eggs, sliced. Season with salt, pepper and mace according to taste. Add butter on each layer, or pour gravy over it. Let the top layer be a thick one of potatoes, and brush with yolk of egg.

Potato and Fish Bills—Take equal parts of cold fish, shredded fine, and potatoes boiled and mashed smooth. Beat in an egg and a few tablespoonfuls of rich milk, but do not make too moist. Salt to taste. Mix thoroughly and beat until light. Roll with a spoon into nearly shaped oval balls, and fry brown.—Good Housekeeping.

Mr. Barnes has been a great sufferer from asthma for many years but the last year or two it became unbearable. He has been living this winter with his brother, Mr. B. F. Barnes, of Erie street. On Saturday, he went up to Main street and remained for about an hour. He doubtless procured the revolver with which the fatal shot was fired. Mr. Barnes got up about 4 a.m. Shortly before 7 o'clock, the family heard a shot fired. They found him with a bullet hole in the center of his forehead. Mr. Barnes was born near Auburn, N.Y., and was 70 years old. He came to this city when a boy and has resided here ever since. When the Lake Shore Railway was built, he went into the draying business and continued that until eight years ago when failing health compelled him to abandon it.

The Plains consist of a tract of level country, mostly of sandy soil, on the lake shore, lying partly in Mentor and partly in Willoughby townships. There are two churches, a grange hall, and several good country schools.

Hopkins Point is a locality on Lake Erie north and east of the Plains, takes its name from one of the pioneers of Lake Co., who settled on a point of land consisting of a number of acres, which extended for some distance into the lake. The waves have long since washed away the entire point. A broad beach has now been formed at the same place. Behind the beach the ground rises to a sufficient height to afford a fine outlook upon the waters. There is a small grove on the bank and the shade of chestnut trees makes the place attractive in the summer time. Several cottages nestle among the trees and many events are seen here in July and August.

The Headlands lie on the lake in the northeast corner of the township and are cut off from the main land by the marsh which extends in the

form of an arc of a circle from the lake at Hopkins' Point to the mouth of the Grand River at Fairport. The marsh is supposed to be the bed of an ancient river. It is bridged at the east end and in the center, and the western outlet is much of the time closed by a sand bar wide enough to make a good crossing even for teams. The enclosed tract of land is over two miles long and a half mile across at the widest point. The land lies considerably higher than the lake level and a view of the passing vessels is excellent. A dozen or more cottages line the beach.

Little Mountain is situated just outside of the southeast corner of Mentor Township and three and half miles from the village. It is about one mile in diameter at the base and towers 750 feet above Lake Erie and 1320 feet above the sea. The top is covered with 100 acres of forest. In the day of the Indians, it constituted an important signal station for the display of beacon fires by night and columns of smoke by day. Among the natural curiosities are the Spring Caves, the Devils Kitchen, the Grand Canyon, and Temple Rock.

Kirtland Mormon Temple was the first Mormon Temple built in the world. Joseph Smith, the founder of Mormonism, came to Kirtland, O., from Palmyra, N.Y., in 1830, and purchased one square mile of land. The temple is built of stone, has three stories, is 80 feet long, 60 wide, 50 to the eaves, and the spire towers 120 feet above the ground. It was built in 1834. The Mormons departed westward in 1847. There are a number of Mormons of the "Josephite" faction which has always rejected polygamy. The Book of Mormon forbids the multiplication of wives. The practice was authorized by a later revelation alleged to have been made to Brigham Young.

He has spent a good deal of time in this city, having been in the employ of Coe & Wilkes and more recently of the File Works. His parents live in Michigan.

It Has a History

Many have examined the old copper plate at the recorder's office. S. C. Mr. Kingsbury was a noted silversmith and did business in Painesville for years. Mrs. Hickok thinks that Mr. Abram Tappan, of Unionville, one of the early surveyors of this county, made the original survey. Mr. Tappan built and occupied the brick

house in Unionville afterwards owned by the late Stephen Warner. Mr. Pyle has gone to Cleveland today to have some maps struck off from the plate.

An Interesting Relic

An interesting relic in the shape of a copper plate of the Western Reserve including the fire land was formerly owned by Chas. N. DeForest, of North Madison, who was using it to cover up a stove pipe hole in the house which some years ago he sold to a Mr. Hardy. The plate is 18" long and 12" high. Mr. DeForest had mentioned it to the recorder who asked him to bring it in. Mr. DeForest asked Mr. Hardy for it, then straightened it out and cleaned it up. Mr. DeForest had obtained it from a Mr. Blair, of Madison in 1859, who undoubtedly was its original owner.

Mr. R. C. Moodey Injured

Mr. R. C. Moodey missed his early morning train and tried to jump aboard the next train at the State street crossing. He tried to get on the forward end of the baggage car and was thrown violently to the ground. He was picked up and taken to his mother's home on North St. Clair street. No bones were broken. D. M. Eddy was a pioneer merchant of Painesville. He had been an invalid for years. He was 85 yrs. old. Mr. Eddy came to Painesville in 1831 and has ever since been closely identified with the business interests of this village. He was the father of Painesville's boot and shoe dealers. He helped to plant trees on the Park in 1838. He contributed liberally to the building of the Court House which was the work of private donation. He had three sons: One died in the army from heart disease; the second was injured at a fire in California and was taken to Honolulu by his

brother, where he died of consumption. The eldest son perished at sea on the return voyage. Mr. Eddy's first wife was Katherine Adams, sister of the late Charles Adams. His second wife was Mary Axtell, sister of the late Imri Axtell. In 1864, he was married to Miss Elizabeth Huntington, who survives him. Thirteen years ago, Mr. Eddy suffered a sunstroke from which he never fully recovered. He was a member of the Masonic order and the oldest Odd Fellow in Painesville.

Judge Hamilton B. Woodbury

An account of the life of Judge Hamilton B. Woodbury, who died in Cambridge, Pa., Wed., written by his life-long friend J. A. Howells, of the Jefferson Sentinel:

He was born in Kelloggsville, Monroe Township, Ashtabula Co., Nov. 27, 1831. His ancestors were among the first to settle in New England. John Woodbury came to Cape Ann before Gov. Endicott arrived and settled at Salem or Beverly in 1624. One of the most conspicuous of the Woodbury's in the late days was Hon. Levi H. Woodbury, of New Hampshire. He was governor and twice U.S. Senator from that state; Sec. of Navy and Sec. of the Treasury under President Jackson, and successor of Judge Story as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. The late Hon. E. B. Woodbury, son of Wheeler Woodbury and father of Judge Woodbury, was born in 1805 and was seven years old when his father came to Ohio. He was nearly 40 years old when he began the study of law. The firm of Chaffee & Woodbury a generation ago was one of the most successful in our county.

Hamilton B. Woodbury read law in the office of Chaffe & Woodbury and was admitted to practice in 1852. He was then living in Kelloggsville, where he was twice elected Justice of the Peace. In 1857, he moved to Jefferson and was soon elected Mayor. In 1873, he was elected delegate to represent this Senatorial District in the Constitutional Convention the same as his father had done 23 years before. He was elected Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in 1875 and for a second term in 1880. He was then elected one of the Judges of the Circuit Court. In his 20 years as service as judge, he was never absent one day on account of sickness, for pleasure or other cause until the present year. His family consists of a wife, daughter, Mrs. J. R. Stone, of Eagleville, F. H. Woodbury Esq., Deputy Probate Judge Mr. H. B. Woodbury Jr., and W. W. Woodbury, attorney at law, practicing in Youngstown.

Death of a Lake County Man

A dispatch from Ironwood, Mich., June 19, announces the death of Hon. William Warren Corning, of Portage, Wis. He suffered a stroke of paralysis Sunday evening while visiting his daughter, Mrs. L. L. Wright, and never regained consciousness. Mr. Corning went to Wisconsin 35 years ago from Mentor, Ohio, where he was born in 1830. After settling in Portage, he became one of the foremost men of that portion of the state, representing his district in the state legislature and serving three terms as mayor of Portage. He was recently sent to Ironwood by the E. P. Allis Co., of Milwaukee, to take charge of extensive hardwood interests owned by them. The deceased leaves five children: William S., of Lagrange, Ill.; Mrs. Wright, of Ironwood; Mrs. McVichie, of Iron Belt; Mrs. Elverson, of Medford, and Mrs. Swendson, of Portage, where interment took place Friday the 21st. When in Lake Co., Ohio, he clerked in the store of Aaron Wilcox. Mr. C. O. Child was, also, a clerk in the same store at the time. Mr. Corning has a sister, Mrs. M. C. Angier, and other relatives living in Mentor.

p. 1 A Natural Curiosity

The Jaw Bone of a Whale on Exhibition in Painesville

Mr. E. L. House, proprietor on the Painesville Steam laundry, during a recent trip east, secured the jaw bone of a whale, through F. K. Downer, of Auburn, N.Y. Some 20 years ago this bone was taken from a whale captured off the Island of St. Helena. One tooth was broken from the jaw at the time it was captured. The jaw was taken from a sperm whale. It is the lower jaw, 16 ½ feet long and contains 42 teeth. It is several hundred pounds in weight. Old whalers estimate that the size of the whale that had this jaw was from 75 to 80 feet long. As these whales were captured for their oil, the bones were rarely brought to shore. Mr. House is to be congratulated on having secured it.

Pioneer Sketch - Daniel Townsley

Daniel Townsley was the eldest of the four sons of Moses and Abigail Townsley and was born at North Hampton, Mass., Sept. 23, 1783. His father was a soldier in the Revolution and died in 1803. His mother came to Ohio, lived with the family until her death in 1849, at the age of 97. About 1809, he came to Huntsburg, Geauga Co., staying a few days with the family of Stephen Pomeroy, the first settler in the township. As he was not ready to locate at the time, he went to Cleveland and worked on the farm of Maj. Carter, where he remained for a year. He returned to Mass., where on Oct. 23, 1811, he married Cynthia Alvord, and in 1816, came to Huntsburg. They made the long journey with an ox team and were about six weeks on the road. They went to Windsor, where there was no road cut through to Huntsburg, and walked 7 miles to their destination leaving their team. It is related that Lemuel Atwood Sr. while working for Lew Hunt to make payment on lot 57, chopped five acres of heavily timbered land in about a month by working over time, doing much of the work by Capt. Barnes and his brother, moonlight. Michael, did a job of threshing for Uncle Daniel. Many of the farmers preferred to have their grain tolled to pay for threshing as money was hard to get. Every tenth bushel was taken for wheat, and every twelfth for oats. Uncle Daniel was short, standing just five feet in his boots. He had a neighbor lady make him a braided palm leaf hat with a crown a foot high so he could be as tall as his neighbors. Mr. T. had three brothers who owned farms in Huntsburg. One of them, John, went with the militia company to Cleveland at the time of Hull's surrender when our frontier was threatened. Abigail, a sister, married John R. Justice and lived in Munson. Mr. T. had two children: Corcelin, who married Willard F. Smith and Orrin, who married Laura

____son and had a number of children. Orrin's eldest son, Philetus, served in the Civil War and settled in Phillipsburg, Kansas. Elizabeth B. Alvord also came from Mass. with them and lived in the family until her marriage to Asa Church,

who was killed by the falling of a tree in 1826. She afterwards married Sylvester Russell and had a large family. On May 20, 1861, the wife who had been his companion for so many years died, Aunt Cynthia. Her life work was done and well done. He remarried and it was not a good marriage. He ended up selling his little farm, separated and went to Kansas. He spent his remaining days in the family of a distant relative named Chilson, who preceded him to Kansas.

Of the heads of families residing in Huntsburg sixty years ago, when the writer first came to the place in 1835, it is believed that Theodore Bridgeman and wife are the only couple now living. They live with or near their son in East Cleveland. About two years ago, they had a family reunion on the 90th birthday of Mr. Bridgeman. E. H. C.

Joe Hickey Threatens to Get Even with his Persecutor in Willoughby

Hickey had been working for Frank Ward, who lives two miles north of Willoughby Village and when paid off ten days ago he went on a glorious drunk and was discharged by his employer. The same day, Tuesday, he went to the home of Frank Storm, a short distance from the scene of the fire, and ordered Mrs. Storm to get him something to eat. Storm appeared shortly afterwards and told Hickey to get out of the house. He refused to do so, and Strom threw him out. He told Storm "he would want for a roof over his head someday." Several days later, Hickey had trouble with Frank Gunn and several other men and said he would get even with them. That afternoon, a private detective that Ward hired to work up the arson case, found Hickey asleep about half a mile from the village with his head resting on a jug of whiskey. He told Ward where he was asleep and Ward went into the village and told of the find. Farmers and villages for miles around gathered to the number of 150 and went to where Hickey was asleep. They woke him and accused him of setting the barn on fire, which he denied. The men seized Hickey and applied a coat of shellac to him and as it dry, it drew the skin so tight that Hicey fairly howled in pain. He was drawn up and down the river with a view to force a confession from him. He was then ridden on a fence rail and ordered to leave the place forever. Those who know his desperate nature are confident that Willoughby is not yet through with Joe Hickey.

The Rider Tavern

Mr. Zerah Rider, now in his 76th years, has given us some notes in regard to his family history and the building of the famous tavern on Mentor street. Mr. Rider says his father, Joseph Rider, in 1802 came from Tolland Co., Conn., afoot with his ax on his shoulder and a knapsack on his back. He built a log house on the banks of the Grand River not far from where the Fairport road was afterward located, on the right bank across from the present residence of Mr. H. H. Hine, who owns what was then called New Market, and afterward called Skinner's Landing. He returned to New England and in 1803 brought his family, wife and three little girls, westward as far as Erie with a horse team, where he exchanged his horses for a voke of oxen. As there were no roads, he drove on the lake beach to the mouth of the Grand River. Shortly after they arrived the family dog disappeared. His disappearance was a mystery until a letter was received from his former home announcing his return, weak, weary, and gaunt. He had made the return trip in less than scheduled time with little or nothing for food. About the year 1812, Mr. Rider moved to and occupied a double log house which was near the present residence of Mrs. Mathews on State street and opened a tavern. In 1817, he began building the old landmark so long and widely known as Rider's "Tavern," as all hostelries were then called. This he occupied in 1818 and kept as a public house until his death Feb. 22, 1840. Three generations were born here, and Zerah, who has lived on the same premises since his birth. In 1862, the old sign was taken down and the place became a private house. The Rider family ancestry goes back to Plymouth Rock. Joseph and Hiram Rider came over on the Mayflower. Joseph married and had sons, Joseph and Hiram. The names continued in every generations. All the "Hirams" remained single. Joseph the son of Zerah, however, is also childless and the name may yet become extinct. One hundred and fifty guests have sometimes found shelter for a night in the tavern, and Mr. Rider has assured us, he has stood on the tavern veranda and counted a hundred teams going west, coming east, or standing by the roadside. The house was originally only one and a half stories, but in 1832, twenty feet were added on the west and the whole raised to two stories. Mr. Rider, then a boy of 12 yrs., with two yoke of cattle, hauled all the hewn timber, some sixty feet in length, from the woods, for the rebuilding.

Fragments of Local History

In a recent interview with Mr. S. C. Hickok, we have some information about the earlier industries of this region. Mr. Hickok was born in Rutland Co., Vt., in August, 1817, and though now approaching his 80th year, is still both hale and vigorous in both body and mind. In his birth place Horace Greeley learned his trade, and Mr. Hickok remembers when a boy to have received the paper from the hands of Mr. Greeley, then a "printer's devil." Mr. Hickok has lived within the borders of Lake Co. since 1828, coming up the lake on a sail vessel and landing at the mouth of Grand River before any piers were built. At that time, there were only four steamers on the lake: Enterprise, Wm. Penn, Niagara, and Ohio. The old steamer, Walk-in-the-Water, having been lost in 1823. The ridges which were parallel to

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the waters of Lake Erie were found to furnish a quality of ore known as "bog ore," and iron being scarce and much needed, small smelting furnaces and forges sprang into being. Among the earlier plants was the Erie, afterwards called the Arcole Furnace in North Madison. This was located on Cunningham Creek in 1828 and 1829. Clyde furnace located on the Grand River, south of Unionville, and near the county line, was built in 1831 and used as late as 1836 or 37. Geauga Furnace, was also built on Grand River, on what was then known as the Lake road, now Erie street, of the county seat, and is the only plant of its kind that survived to the present time. Concord Furnace which was burned about 1835, was located on Bog Creek, in what is now known as Drake's Hollow. What was known as the Railroad Furnace, from the fact that the top house received its supplies over a tramway on trestle work extending from the high river-bluff over the roadway, was located on the farm of Mr. Wm. Blair in South Perry. There was a forge on the east branch of the Chagrin River near the residence of B. S. Upham, East Kirtland. Also, similar works in Concord near the LeRoy township line known as Cascade forge. Field's forge was located on Grand River, not far from what is known as Vrooman farm on the South Ridge. Paine's forge in LeRoy township was located on Paine's Creek, and was the last one of the kind to go into disuse and decay.

A distillery was on the little stream which crosses the road near Mr. Carpenter's in West Mentor. Painesville had its still a little north of E. L. House's steam laundry. Another was located to the west of the county infirmary building, known as the Arch Bridge distillery and supplied with water from the Emerson farm, now owned by Mr. Churchward. James Boyle operated a still for a few years in the late thirties, a little west of "Log Tavern" corners in Concord township.
