Hon. Gideon E. Meigs, ex-Mayor of Painesville died in Chicago on Monday. A telegram came to Augustus Post from Col. Meigs' son-in-law, W. W. Wetmore, who was in St. Louis. He served in the war and at the close of it, engaged in the grocery business in company with George Baldwin and afterwards with Mr. Morton, formerly the Methodist minister of this place. In the late sixties, he entered the employ of Liggett, Myers & Co., the large tobacco firm of St. Louis.

Heard the Booming of Perry's Cannon

Sept. 10, they just sat down to dinner when they heard the boom of cannon and knew the great fight had begun. They went to the bluffs to watch until the end of the firing and could not tell who won. They heard that night that Perry was defeated and two or three families embarked on a boat and set out for Cleveland that night. Her mother carried a baby in her arms but two days old. En route, they were stopped and were told Perry had won the day, and they returned home with their hearts full of joy.

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has been unwilling to come to any reasonable terms. They will build the bridge at this point independently of such consideration. To do this, they will have to cross the river with one span, build a west abutment and carry the east end as far beyond the present east abutment as it will reach. The middle pier cannot be used at all as it will not stand the weight.

Obituary

Samuel L. Baker, who died at Willoughby, April 19th, was a man who deserves more than a passing note. He was born at Windham, Conn., 1812, on the same farm on which his great-grandfather had lived. He was one of seven children and was brought up under rigid Puritanical discipline. In 1819, his father after much sickness and reverses, moved his family to Cooperstown, N.Y. Here Samuel was apprenticed at the age of 16 to learn the machinist's trade. He was so skilled as a machinist, he learned his trade and bought his time from his master. He worked at his trade in Utica, N.Y. and North Adams, Mass. In 1835, the family moved to Erie, where Samuel bought a farm and tried farming for a while. He came to Cleveland in 1836 and engaged in the manufacture of steam engines and boats, propellers, etc. He was a pioneer in the iron business in Cleveland. He built the old Phoenix foundry and conducted business under the firm name of Baker, Parmerlee & Co. He retired from business in 1866 and moved to Willoughby where he spent the remainder of his long life. Mr. Baker was three times married. 
p. 1 Wholesale Poisoning

Genealogy of Gideon Mosher:

Gideon Mosher was born Dec. 25, 1777, in N.Y. His father died and his mother remarried. He was put out among strangers to share his boyhood days; two brothers and one sister shared the same lot; the sister he never saw again. His education was very limited as it was paid in those days by subscription payment. He could only go to school in the place of some absentee. In 1799, he married Sarah Billings, a daughter of James Billings, who served 5 yrs. in the Revolutionary War. Gideon served in the War of 1812, and his father Hugh Mosher served and died in the Revolutionary War. He owned a farm on Buffalo Creek, ten miles from Buffalo, where nine children were born to them, three boys and six girls. In the fall of 1818, they started for Ohio, coming to Perry, Lake Co., Ohio. He bought a farm on the Grand River now known as the Blair farm and lived with Thomas S. Wright while building a log house, where three more boys were born. After buying and selling several farms, they traded for one in Brighton, Lorain Co., O., in 1844, where they lived until the death of the old people, when the farm went to their son, Hugh.

Gen. Edward Paine

The mortal remains of an old pioneer lie mouldering in a now unmarked and neglected grave in the old Washington street cemetery. About 1798 or 99 he purchased 1,000 acres of land in this township, known for many years as the "Paine Tract." He was the founder of our town and after whom the town is named. He was the first member elected to the territorial legislature from Lake Co., then known as Trumbull Co. He built a log cabin on the Grand River and he and Mrs. Paine reared a family of eight children. A will case figured in our courts here last spring growing out of the fact that Edward L. Paine, a grandson of Gen. Edward Paine, died leaving eight or ten thousand dollars to Mrs. Wm. P. Greer, an adopted daughter of Colbert Huntington, whose wife was a sister of Edward L. Paine. Mrs. L. P. Noble, a granddaughter of Gen. Paine, contested the will, setting up that Edward L. Paine was *non-compos mentis* and won her case. The case has since been taken to the Circuit Court. It seems it would be much better to use some of the money to erect a monument over the remains of Gen. Edward Paine.

Death of J. F. Scofield

Mr. J. F. Scofield died this morning. He had been ill and confined to his room a few days. Born in Dewittville, Chautauqua Co., N.Y., Nov. 4, 1819, he came to Painesville early in the Forties. In 1843, he was compositor on *The Telegraph* which afterwards he owned and edited. In 1866, he was a clerk in the P.O and was postmaster for 13 yrs. In 1870, he bought out the interest of Rev. N. P. Bailey in *The Painesville Telegraph*, then owned by Bailey and Merrill, and for 20 yrs. controlled its management. He is the last of a family of eight children. Mr. & Mrs. Scofield had two sons, Clarence G., who died in 1861, and Charles F., who is now left to care for his mother. The burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Obituary

Another pioneer has died. Mr. John Corkens, of Jackson street, died age 90 yrs., died Sept. 29, 1896. His body was laid to rest in Mentor Cemetery next to his two oldest grandchildren. He was taken suddenly ill with a partial stroke of paralysis affecting the vocal chords and brain. He had been a resident of Painesville 20 yrs.; 11 preceding years, he resided in North Mentor. He

was born Dec. 25, 1806 at the Isle of Man. He came to New York with his father's family in 1825; father, mother and five children (two sons and three daughters). They stayed on Long Island one year and then came to Painesville, settling at Mentor Plains (Hopkins Point) on a farm, which is called the Corkens Old Homestead. There is only one sister, Jane, surviving, who is 17 yrs. younger than himself, Mrs. Zeba French, of North Mentor. In the winter of 1837, he married Julia, only child of William and Betsey Emly, who came here from Cornwall near Montreal, Canada. Mr. Emly was a drum major and son of Col. Emly, who commanded a British regiment in the English army. Mrs. Emly was born and reared in New York. Their union was blessed with eight children, five boys and three girls. Their eldest child, William H. was born April 18, 1838 and was given to his grandparents (Empys) when he was two years old. They moved to Milwaukee in 1844, living there until he was 20. He is the only living child and a resident of Painesville. In 1843, Mr. Corkens moved to Milwaukee, then to Sheboygan Falls, Wis. Later, they settled in Grafton, Ill., and engaged in the boating trade on the Mississippi. His wife died in 1860. In 1862, he crossed the ocean to take possession of land he had become heir to.
