p. 1 Mark R. Doolittle

May 15th, 1897, Mark R. Doolittle died; he was a respected citizen of Painesville and lived on North St. Clair St. His wife died nearly five months ago, Dec. 21, 1896. He was born in Middlebury, Vermont, August 30, 1824 and was of Scotch descent—his ancestors settled in Mass. in early colonial times. His father, Joel Doolittle, was a graduate of Yale College and after studying law and being admitted to the bar in Mass., moved to Middlebury, and was the first tutor in Middlebury College. He was a judge of the Supreme Court for many years. He died in Middlebury in 1841, at the age of 69 yrs. His wife, nee Sallie Fitch, was a native of Pawlet, Vermont, and was a lady of superior ability and culture. She was the mother of seven children, all of whom lived to manhood and womanhood. Only one is now living, Mrs. Sara P. Alvord. Mrs. Joel Doolittle died at the age of 86. The deceased, M. R. Doolittle, was her youngest child. He came to Huron, Ohio, in 1841 where he learned the printer's trade. In 1845, he worked as a compositor for *The Telegraph* in Painesville, until 1855 when he established the Advertiser which he conducted until 1860. He was married Sept. 4, 1847, to Miss Alta P. Briggs. She was a native of Erie Co., N.Y., and was a lady of culture. She was the mother of four children, George who died in the fall of 1870, age 22; Kate, afterwards Mrs. Dr. Gardner, who died Jan. 7,

1881. The surviving children are, Mark R. and Mrs. W. G. Hawkins now living in this town. Mr. Doolittle then was one of the proprietors of the *Telegraph*, retiring to take charge of the Painesville post office for over four years. He was buried in Evergreen Cemetery.

In Memoriam

Lucy J. Bartram Branch

Mrs. Lucy J. Branch, widow of the late Judge William Branch, died in North Madison, O., May 17, 1897, aged 80 yrs., 11 mos., and 22 days. Mrs. Branch was born at Huntington, Fairfield Co., Conn., May 25, 1816, and was the daughter of Uriah Bartram and Rebecca Williams. She was of pure New England Puritan stock and was a descendant of both sides from some of the most distinguished Colonial families. Among her ancestors were Charles Chauncey, second president of Harvard College, who came to America in 1838; Henry Wolcott, one of the founders of Windsor, Conn., and one of the signers of the constitution of 1639; Samuel Chaplin, who came to Roxbury before 1640 and afterward went to Springfield and was the ancestor of all the Chapin family in this country; Thomas Gilbert of Windsor, and his son, John, who was a captive of the Indians in King Philip's war; Thomas Wheeler, who settled at Concord, Mass. in 1638 and moved to Fairfield, Conn., in

1644 and was influential in the development of the state. Her paternal grandfather was Daniel Bartram, of Fairfield, who married Ann Merchant, of Redding. He was a soldier of the revolution. Her father, Uriah Bartram, was a captain in the war of 1812. In the year 1809, he walked from Redding to Madison in company with John R. Reed, B. French, and Daniel Turney and purchased 100 acres of land on the Middle Ridge of John A. Harper. On May 3, 1810, he started from Redding with his father, mother, wife and two children—Wheeler and Harmon—and two brothers—Levi and David—for Madison and arrived June 10. He remained on his farm until 1814 when he moved to Huntington, Conn, but early in the year 1818 moved again to Rutland, Meigs Co., Ohio, where he lived until 1822, when he returned to the farm in Madison which he bought in 1809. There Mrs. Branch was married July 4, 1834 (?) and at once moved to Kirtland where the family of Judge Branch was living. She lived there until 1837, when she moved to North Madison, where she remained until her death. She was an invalid for 15 yrs. and for the last 10 yrs. was unable to walk. She had four sons and five daughters, all of whom except one daughter survive here; and she was carried to her grave by her four sons.

The *Loda (Ill.) Times* of July 16 contains notice of the death of Mrs. Jane H. Goodell, wife of the Hon. Addison Goodell, who is well-known in this county. It read: Mrs. Goodell was one of the few remaining old settlers of Loda, having moved with her husband to Loda in 1855. A woman of rare intellectual gifts, with a warm heart and a generous disposition. Mrs. Goodell was the daughter of Selleck Byron and Mary V. Warren, and was born at Pittstown, Rensselaer Co., N.Y., Oct. 16th, 1830. She was one of a family of seven children, of whom, William R. Warren, of Westport, Conn., is still living. The Warrens were among the first settlers of New England. In 1837, her parents moved to Mentor, Lake Co., Ohio, and her girlhood was spent on a farm there. She was educated in Western Reserve Teachers' Seminary of Kirtland, Ohio, and in the Willoughby Seminary, which was later moved to Painesville Ohio and now known as Lake Erie Seminary. She was employed as a teacher in these schools for some time. She married Addison Goodell, of Mentor, Ohio, May 21st, 1850, where she lived for five years. Mr. Goodell was engaged in the lumber business. One daughter, Mary, was buried there, and Frances M., now Mrs. William J. Strong, of Chicago, was born there. The other children, Bertha G., now Mrs. Morton B. Keegan, of Martinsville Indiana; Warren S. and Nathan P., were born at Loda. The two sons are engaged with their father in banking and live with their families here. For the past eight years, she has been an invalid.

An Awful Deed

Residents of East Erie street were startled by the details of an awful deed committed by Mrs. Adelbert Ely at an early hour Tuesday morning in the notorious house back of Leo Parmly's place. A few years ago, this place was the scene of the murder of John O'Rourke and has had other incidents which have given it an unsavory reputation. Tuesday, this was the scene of another murder, a brutal assault and an attempt at suicide. The house has been occupied by Mrs. Adelbert Ely, her daughter, Mabel, a girl of eleven and her son, Ira, who is nine years of age. Alex McDonald was a boarder at the same place. Five weeks ago, Mrs. Ely separated from her husband, Adelbert Ely, who works Frank Brown's farm in Drake's Hollow. McDonald was a farm hand there and is charged with being the source of the trouble and the separation. Mrs. Ely had signed a contract in parting from her husband to

allow the children to spend two weeks every month with their father. They had been there two weeks and were brought back by her to Painesville on Sunday; the father wanted them to stay another week, but the mother refused to allow this and seem angered that they were detained over the time allotted. On Monday, the woman acted and talked strangely. On Tuesday morning, McDonald, the boarder got up to get the milk. He occupied a room upstairs with the boy and in the adjoining room Mrs. Ely slept with her daughter. Mrs. Ely complained of feeling badly and asked him to get some camphor. While he was gone, the mother attacked the boy with a claw hammer and beat him savagely several times over the head. The boy escaped from his mother and ran downstairs. He was the first to give the alarm. At this time, McDonald returned from his errand up town. He found Mrs. Ely on the bed in the boy's room with her throat cut and bleeding profusely. The daughter was rigid in death. Her face was discolored; she had been dead for hours. Mrs. Ely had suffocated her daughter during the night, then tried to murder her son, and failing this tried to take her own life. Mrs. Ely's wound was sewed but it is extremely doubtful that she would live. The little boy was taken to his grandfather's, Mr. Jonathan Colwell. Mrs. Ely is 38 yrs. old and uncontrollable in temper. She is the daughter of Jonathan Colwell and was married to Mr. Ely 13 yrs. ago. An action for divorce is now pending at Chardon in which she is a defendant.

p. 1 A Day of Fatalities

Sept. 15 will be remembered as Coroner's Day in Lake Co.; three persons meet a violent death; two victims of the Lake Shore and one suicide. The public is already familiar with the details of Ed Corlett's fate at the diagonal crossing in East Painesville. The engineer and fireman of the engine which caused that fatality met another accident at Ashtabula Wed. evening. The engineer was a new man and ran through the derailler and the engine and the forward mail car were wrecked. The engineer and fireman were injured and this will delay the coroner's inquest of Mr. Corlett's violent death. Earlier in the day Coroner Phillips had been called to Willoughby to view the remains of Bennie Hulsmann, a little boy, six years of age, who was killed by the Painesville accommodation and was not found until the next morning. The accident occurred at Beidler's crossing of the Lake Shore, one mile west of the Willoughby station. The Hulsmanns live on Vine street about a mile from this crossing. Bennie went on an errand with his father, and then was sent back. The boy took the same way back and waited for his father; but his father did not go home the same way. The boy waited until nearly dark started for home and was seen near the Lake Shore crossing. It is supposed this train struck him. S. E. Murphy, an old resident of North Madison, was the third victim that day. He was 85 yrs. old and lived with his son, George W. Murphy, on a farm near the lake, east of Spring Grove. He left home at 10 a.m. to walk up to the North Ridge to visit a relative; when the son returned home in the afternoon, his father was still absent. A search was made and about 5 o'clock his body was found hanging from a small maple tree on another farm. The body was suspended by a small rope and the feet just touched the ground; he had been dead some time. Of late, Mr.

Murphy had acted strangely and doubtless had taken his life while temporarily insane. A son committed suicide the same way a year ago.

An Interesting Turtle

A story in this paper last week told of a Box turtle with the name of "Dr. Griffith" and the date "1838." The inscription is genuine. Mr. G. H. Huntington of this place knew Dr. Griffith and says that his father was with him when he carved his name on the turtle's back. Mr. Huntington was then a boy of 10 yrs. A few years later Mr. Huntington found the same turtle on the flats near the Brink farm north of this village. He says the turtle was then about the size of a dinner plate.

Deadly Diagonal Crossing Claims Another Victim

When anybody is killed by the cars in Painesville Township, it's a good guess that it is on the diagonal crossing of the Lake Shore east of General Casement's home. That was the place where Ed Corlett, of North Madison met his fate last Wed. Those who saw the accident say the engine struck the buggy squarely and reduced it almost to kindling wood. The driver shared the fate of the buggy. He had stopped and waited of the train to go by, not seeing the other train coming. The horse was killed, too. He leaves a wife and 3 yr. old daughter. He was 47 yrs. old.

A Tender Blossom Plucked

Painesville friends were informed Thursday of the death of Sterling Steele, infant son of Albert H. and Gertrude Steele at their home No. 242 Crawford Road, Cleveland. Death occurred from convulsions after an illness of several days. He was 4 months old; burial was at Evergreen Cemetery.

A Stabbing Affray Among Fairport Finns

A Finn, whose name is unknown, was stabbed to death in a fight at Fairport 10 o'clock Thursday night. The victim was a stranger, about 22 yrs. old, who came over from Canada last Sat. The murderer is John Pouttu, a fellow countryman, who has fled for Fairport and is now being hunted by officers. The origin of the quarrel between the two young men is unknown. They were in the rear of Matt Herto's saloon on High street. There were witnesses to the knife fight in which one man was cut in the face and across the throat. The men separated and each went to his boarding place. The stranger reached his room but expired from his wounds. John Pouttu ran to the home of Matt Herto, whose wife is a sister,

and not gaining admittance he ran down toward the lake. He is about 21 yrs. old and unmarried. He is 5' 8" high, medium build, a trifle stooped shouldered, short black moustache.

Photographed the Tusk

Prof. Geo. F. Wright, the noted geologist, came to Painesville Tuesday to examine the tusk which Mr. George Prentice has in his office at the Lake Shore Depot. The tusk was found in the gravel bed at Amboy and in its fragmentary state is over 8' long. It was unearthed at depth of 38 feet. The tusk was photographed by Prof. Wright for the purpose of an illustrated article which appeared in the *Sunday Plain Dealer*.

In Mentor Marsh

Warren Reynolds, a young man 18 yrs. old, a sophomore in the Case School of Applied Science, and the only son of Iri Reynolds, the secretary and treasurer of the Wade Park Banking Co., was accidentally shot by a companion on Sat. at dusk and died Sunday morning after suffering mortal agony for nearly sixteen hours. On Friday, with two college mates, W. C. McClure and Leslie D. Stair went to Salida Beach, where Mr. Iri Reynolds has a summer cottage for a hunting trip of a few days. Sat. afternoon they entered the marsh east of the Beach in a boat to shoot duck. While crossing the marsh, Reynolds undertook to relieve Stair, who was oarsman of the party and they were in the act of changing seats when one of the guns was discharged. The gun was pointed directly at Reynolds and the full charge struck the young man on the right hand and entered his abdomen, tearing a great hole and penetrating the lungs and liver. The wounded boy was taken to the home of Mr. Brunner, a farmer living nearby, where Dr. T. M. Moore saw him at 9 o'clock. The boy's parents arrived from Cleveland an hour later. Mr. Stair had been holding the gun when it discharged.

For nearly 30 yrs., Mr. Palmer was a resident of Willoughby, where he was well known. His first wife died in June, 1883. Three years later, he married to Mrs. Almeda Pomeroy, of Bay City, Mich., daughter of Capt. Joe Bartholomew, deceased. In 1894, he purchased the Bartholomew homestead in LeRoy for his wife's health to be farther from the Lake air. The absent sons were unable to be present owing to illness and non-delivery of telegram. Mrs. Susie Wert, of Kankakee, a granddaughter was present. Thus, has passed another Lake Co. pioneer.
