Death of Homer H. Hine

p. 1 Magnificent Memorial

Morley Library was formally presented to the Painesville Public Library Association Sat. In 1823, the Morley family came to Painesville. There were seven boys and two girls. On the spot where the library building now stands, 65 years ago Josephus Huntington, the village schoolmaster, taught them. The business of the village of the time was largely confined to State street. The street ran through the square at that time but many favored having the road along one side to make the square larger. So, one night C. D. Adams and Mr. Morley fenced off the direct road and people had to go around; this made a stir in the village, but the road remained around the square as it is at present. The Methodist Meeting House and Town Hall were combined on Liberty street near the square. The Methodists then were almost Quaker like in their primitive dress and manners. In the meeting

house, the males sat on one side, and the females on the other side of the aisle. No objection was raised by parents of other denominations of their daughters going to a Methodist meeting. After the meeting, young men lined up on the outside of the meeting house and each young man picked out his girl as she came along. Needless to say, those Sunday evening meetings were very popular with the young people. (Also, some history of the early iron furnaces in Lake Co.)

p. 1 Death of William Freeman

William Freeman, a highly respected colored citizen of Painesville, died at his residence on South street Sat. Mr. Freeman came to Painesville in 1856 and has conducted a barber shop here since that time. He was born in Zanesville, Ohio, about 80 years ago. His father and mother were taken to that city 87 yrs. ago by President Andrew Jackson. When a mere child, he was bound to a Methodist minister with which he

lived until he was quite a boy and later ran away and worked his way down the Muskingum River to the Mississippi. He worked his way up to being a popular chef on one of the liners. At one time he was chef for President William Henry Harrison, but his trade was that of a barber. He operated a shop in Newark for 15 yrs. then went to Cleveland for a short time. He came here July 3, 1856 to open a one-chair shop in the basement of the Cowles House which was about to open. He worked his way up and at one time owned the largest shop in Painesville. He assisted in operating the famous underground railway which carried so many slaves from the South to freedom in Canada. His wife died a number of years ago and out of family of seven children, three survive. They are: Charles, who has lived in England for many years, and John and Stephen, of this city.

Took Her Own Life

Mrs. Mary Wiltse, the mother of Mrs. George O. Wright, left her room at her daughter's home and crossed Liberty street, and sought death in one of the old wells on the vacated water works property. As breakfast as being prepared, Mr. Wright turned his plate over and found a note left for him by Mrs. Wiltse telling she had gone to the well to end her life. Mr. Wright instantly went there and found his mother-in-law's body lying across an iron pipe near the bottom. Her head and feet were in the water. Coroner Philips was summoned. It is supposed that the deed was prompted by a sudden mental aberration. She had a fall last spring which injured her back and hip and her mind appeared to be slipping away since then. Mrs. Mary Wilson Wiltse, was born in Farmersville, now Athens, Canada, August. 13, 1818, and came to Painesville about 10 yrs. ago. She was the mother of four children, one daughter dying about 25 yrs. ago, after reaching a woman's estate. The surviving children are: Mrs. George O. Wright and Mrs. William Rogerson, of South Liberty street, and one son, a resident of Ashtabula Co. Charles, John, Ernest and George Wright Jr., grandsons,

and Charles Coltrin and Charles Bell, grandsons-in-law were the bearers. The burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.
