Dr. Bixby was a young man; Mrs. Bixby (nee Ida Hadden) was early left an orphan and nearly all her life resided in this township. Two weeks ago Mrs. Bixby won the literary prize contest in this village. The doctor leaves a widowed mother who had of late made her home with him.

The Late Asa Childs

Mr. Asa Childs died two weeks ago and a friend has supplied us some facts concerning him. Mr. Childs was born in Vermont, April 3, 1804, where he lived until 1827, when he came to Ohio via Buffalo, then by boat to Cleveland. Subsequently, he located in Medina and in 1828 married a daughter of Jarius and Amy McClure who had recently located from Mass. During their residence in Medina, six children were born to them-only three of whom are now living. In 1846 they moved to Lake Co. and settled on a small farm on Mentor Plains in the northern part of Willoughby Township where they lived until Mrs. Childs died, Mar. 6, 1870. Since that time, his home has been with his daughter, Mrs. C. B. Allen, now a resident of Tiffin, Ohio, where he died Dec. 16, 1887, at the age of 83 years 8 months and 13 days. He was buried in Mentor Cemetery beside his wife.
