MUCH BUSINESS TRANSACTED BY COUNCIL.

STREET WORK DISCUSSED AND PLANNED — ALDERMAN HEYMANN PROTESTS.

Accompanied by spectacular side lights, the City Council Monday evening transacted considerable business. The usual budget of bills was paid, including those relating to the shelling of Beach Street, for labor, teams and shell, for the reason that some of the members of the Street Committee, without consulting the full committee, ordered this work, and, furthermore, that the expenditure is illegal, for the reason that the Street Committee has no powers without previously having obtained the consent of the council. This being the case the members of the council who ordered the work should pay for it. The objection was noted on the minutes.

Henry T. Titus tendered his resignation as fire chief to take effect immediately upon the organization and acceptance of the volunteer fire department. The communication was laid over until the next meeting.

Oscar Michael submitted an offer of placing mail on Ridgewood Avenue. It was filed.

All requests for tax rebates were laid over until a special meeting to be held Nov. 29th at 2 P. M.

Mayor Greenleaf was authorized to use the police power to remove the boat house at the foot of Third Avenue, instantly.

The Clerk was authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of sidewalks along west side of Ridgewood Avenue to Fremont St.

The Council voted to place tile from the railroad tracks along the south side of Magnolia Avenue to connect with the First Street drain. This is to drain the water works pumping station.

It was moved by Alderman Heymann and seconded by Alderman Osborn that the City provide by the sale of bonds sufficient to cover the cost of an electric fire alarm system, with district indicators to locate fires to reorganize the fire department, to erect a suitable building to house all the fire apparatuses, and to be a meeting place for the members of the fire department, to pay for any hose, ladders or any other necessities for fire protection already purchased; also the interest on the bond issue for the water works. The interest and sinking fund is to be assessed against the assessed property located within five hundred feet of any fire plug as a special assessment.

Notice was ordered published in the newspapers that the numbering ordinance will be enforced.

THE PUBLIC ASKING FOR MORE LIGHT.

Patrons of the F. E. C. Ry. are complaining of the poor lighting of the passenger depot at this place, which is afforded by oil lamps only. The private opinion, very publicly expressed, of parties arriving or departing by night trains is that a place of Daytona's importance should be better equipped in this respect and they are surprised that electric light is not substituted for the oil.

The fact is that the company took this matter in consideration a year or more ago but had to abandon the idea of installing electric light owing to the fact that the service is discontinued at midnight during the summer, while the business at the depot necessarily demands an all night service throughout the year.

It is possible that if the matter was properly presented to the management by the city authorities, or a committee of the citizens, something might be done to improve the present lighting of the depot at this time as the electric light will be available for the purpose the year round.

FIRE ESCAPE INSTALLED AT LOCAL OPERA HOUSE

Graham Thompson last week had a most complete fire escape system put in at the Daytona Opera House on South Beach street, making it apparently impossible for anyone to be trapped by fire in the building. There are now at least three exits in addition to the main stairway.

A stationary ladder has been put at one of the windows on Cottage Avenue, leading from the rear of the Opera and a broad landing with substantial railing has been erected on the west and south stairs of the building with a five or six foot rail ed stairway leading to the ground on the west. This additional stairway with landings reached from the windows on the west and south sides is in itself fully adequate to clear the building in a few minutes without the use of the back stairway, the ladder and the front stairway with its branch passage to Cottage Avenue.

The seating capacity of the new house has also been increased by the addition of 150 more chairs and other improvements have been made.

CLARENDON TO HAVE WIRELESS.

SUB-CONTRACTORS COMPLETING ARRANGEMENTS FOR COMMENCING WORK.

Attorney E. F. Oates, of this city, and W. T. Hadlow, of Jacksonville, returned from Philadelphia last week, where they had been in conference with the architects, Messrs. Price & McClanahan in reference to the completion of the plans for the Clarendon. Several changes in the floor arrangements necessitated a night delay, but these have all been completed and the work will begin within two weeks. The various sub-contractors have also been in Philadelphia completing their arrangements.

Dr. E. L. Potter left for California for a short visit to his hotel in Los Angeles, but will probably return soon to inspect the progress of the work on the new house.

The financial arrangements have almost been completed, the 7 per cent bonds being picked up very eagerly by wise investors. A few more bonds are for sale by Cashier F. N. Conrad at the Merchants Bank.

The hotel will be built in accordance with the plans as shown in the Merchants Bank last spring, and the new building will be fireproof in every way.

Negotiations have been opened with the various furniture houses who are all anxious to get the contract for furnishing a house of this kind. The building when completed will be the finest south of Atlanta and will be absolutely up-to-date in every respect.

Mr. Oates, while in New York, arranged for a wireless station to be erected in the house and all business will be taken care of by the wireless company.

Since the burning of the Colonades the peninsula vicinity is left without a hotel capable of taking care of the people who are in the habit of spending their winters here and the public at large are demanding a house of this kind.

Mergenthaler Linotype INSTALLED FOR DAILY NEWS

The Gazette-News this week installed a Mergenthaler linotype and each line of this week's paper is cast on a slug by this intricate machine, which in its action is almost human. The machine which The Gazette-News possesses is known as the "Junior," although it does practically the same work as the "Standard" machine with the exception that it does not set as wide "measure." The speed, however, in the hands of an experienced operator is said to be about the same.

The Junior does practically the same work as five compositors would do by hand. After the commencement of the publication of the Daily News the linotype will be operated 18 hours each day, thus insuring plenty of reading matter for the subscribers of the Daily News and the Gazette-News.

P. F. Herklotz, an expert in the employ of the Mergenthaler Linotype Co. installed the machine and filled the office force up with preliminary instructions which are intended to keep the operators on the "wide side" of the "Junior." While here Mr. Herklotz also installed the same kind of a machine for W. W. Carter. His labors here necessitated the missing of his Thanksgiving dinner with his family in New Orleans.
