Fruitland Facts.

The first Friends that settled in de-Fruitland neighborhood were Thomas the II. Stanley and family, he believing derthat it was his duty to settle near the Kaw Indians to assist them in a better '.Ry way of living, both religiously and temporally. They came here in the fall of 1857 near the first of the tenth month, with the approval of the Friends and also of government at that time. There were a few Friends lived on the Cottonwood river, namely: Curtis Hiatt, Jonathan Wheeler. ops Joseph Moon, and Madley and family. ins Andrew Hinshaw lived just west of Emporia and Milton Chamness four miles south of Emporia. on The next fail, 1858, John Moon and nd several other families of Friends set-( tled on or near Cottonwood. Charles ot Hinshaw settled in the Fruitland he neighborhood in the fall of 1861 or 63 t: ne y John Morgan, Nathan Beals, Maholm ES. Oliphant, William Lewis and their fam il 18" ilies settled in the neighborhood in 1861 p '62 and '63, also Able Bond and Whitle ın 01 Worthington and their familes. There was a meeting set up called m Neosho preparative meeting, a branch gi of Cottonwood monthly meeting. The ev preparative meeting was established in 1862 and was held in Thos. ele Stanley house. The Fruitland month-Le ly meeting was set up in 1980 and was the held in the stone school house until of church was built in 1884. The present M membership numbers between 75 and Pr 80.

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
