Indian Will (Full blooded Indian) Wills Creek, Wills Mountain and Wills Knob named after him. His wigwam was located in a cove lying between the west side of Wills Mountain and Wills Knob near a rocky formation known as the Devils Ladder. Indian Will died around the close of the Revolutionary War. His remains were buried on the top of Wills Mountain.</p>

Bradys Mill was located near Cresaptown. Practice of the Indians was to bury their dead under piles of stone. On the farm of Christopher Kelly 14 miles below Cumberland one of these stone piles was opened and a serpentine pipe of green tinted stone along with rings were found.</p>

Fort Cumberland Burial Ground would be closer to the fort. Same location as the Colonel Joshua Fry (1700- 1754) monument?</p> <p>17 May 1899 “Excerpts from The Cumberland Times” transcribed by Charles Often. Deed to an old graveyard has been sold and residents must be transferred to some other burial ground. The graveyard fronts Cumberland Street and persons prior to 1852 lie buried in this lot. In 1799 Thomas Beall (of Samuel) deeded the lot (Al. Co. Deed C-64) to John J. Jacob & Joseph Cresap trustees of the Methodist for public worship with no lot number listed. A church built there was torn down 17 years ago.</p>

Co.	<p>Hooks Graveyard origins starts with John Snowden Hook who first obtains land which makes up the Hook Graveyard in 1791 from Thomas Beall (of Samuel) part of the tract Walnut Bottom (Al. Co. Deed A-64). Over the years more land was obtained. In 1912 the graveyard was sold to William Pullard from Ezra B. Hook (Al. Co. Deed 110-704). Deed states “South side of Walnut Street in Cumberland commonly known as Hooks Grave Yard. Same piece of property Ezra B. Hook inherited from his father John L. Hook who in turn inherited it from his father James Hook. Same property that James Hook inherited from his father John Snowden Hook. Find a Grave list the graveyard but no mention of the early members of the Hook family. Are early members of the Hook Family still buried here? 		<p>The earliest known burial was Hanson Pigman who died in 1812-13. His remains, along with his headstone were reinterred to Rose Hill at a later date.</p> <p>List additional persons buried in the Hook Graveyard but were reinterred to other graveyards. See Allen, Thomas Poole and Zelch family section for further.</p> <p>8 April 1887 Excerpts from The Cumberland Times transcribed by Charles Often. R.N. Batcholder Quarter Master General of the Army sent a letter to the G.A.R. members. Stating 12 Union soldiers are buried in Hooks graveyard which is practically abandoned and badly neglected. General Batcholder steps needed to be taken to protect them. A committee was appointed to take steps for the removal of these remains. No soldier names were listed or what graveyard that were moved to. Find a Grave list one soldier.</p> <p>Find a Grave states “Memorial Day” events in the mid 1890s listed six soldiers, Lemuel Foster, William Feaga, John Hughes, William Morrison, Oliver Froby and Unknown Wright. By the mid 1950s only John Hughes was honored.</p> <p>Civilian Telegraph 1864 news article making a plea for someone to open up a new graveyard. Deed to an old graveyard is sold and the residents must be transferred to some other burial ground. This graveyard fronts Cumberland Street and persons prior to 1852 lie buried in this lot. In 1799, Samuel Beall's son, Thomas Beall, deeded the lot to Joseph Cresap and J.J. Jacob, trustees of the Methodists for public and</p>

divine worship. A church built there was torn down 17 years later and the church is not the Centre Street ME Church. One problem in moving the residents is that the graves are unmarked and identification is impossible. 14 Jul 1899 Exhumation and reburial activities begun by Mr. Isaac Nelson. 15 Jul 1899 Mr. Lewis F Wilson has the contract to re-inter bodies. **17 Jul 1899 Captain David Lynn removed from old Methodist cemetery on Cumberland Street and removed to Rose Hill. (Full column article of history of David Lynn of the Revolutionary War).**

Archives of Maryland Online-Proceedings and Acts of the General Assembly, 1874. CHAPTER 81. AN ACT to empower the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Cumberland, to sell and convey a certain lot of ground in said city WHEREAS, Thomas Beall, of Samuel, of Allegany County, did in the year of our Lord, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, convey by deed to Joseph Cresap and John J. Jacob and their successors, in trust for the use of the Methodist Society in the town of Cumberland, as a place for public and divine worship, a lot of ground in said town, which said deed was duly recorded among the land records of Allegany County, and the property taken and held under it for the last seventy-three years.

Scharfs History of Western Maryland Vol. 2. 1882. First Methodist church in Western Maryland was built about the year 1789. It was erected upon a lot of ground given for the purpose, situated on the hill west of Will's Creek, immediately in rear of Dr. Bruce's present residence, on what is now known as Smallwood Street. It was a one-story frame building, about thirty-two by forty feet. It was furnished with a plain plank pulpit, and long, narrow benches, without backs. Services were held in the church until the year 1816, when it was found to be too small for the congregation and a lot of ground having been secured on the east side of Will's Creek on Centre Street, the spot now occupied by the present handsome edifice, a new church was built.

1. Thomas Beall (of Samuel) to John J. Jacob & Joseph Cresap for \$1.00 (Al. Co. Deed C-74 1799) Trustees for the Methodist Church of Cumberland which now stands. No lot number shown. In the deed it states "Thomas Beall will if legally required to execute any other deed for the more effectual sure making for the aforesaid lot for the said Trustees".

2. Allegany County Equity Case 4002 William Beall and others (Defendants) (Al. Co. Deed 71-182 1891) Lot 154 sold to Maria L. Ryan. Deed index shows Thomas Beall (of S.) Estate by trustees.

Apparently Thomas Beall never executed a deed for the property and it went back to the estate of Thomas Beall and was then sold to Maria L. Ryan in 1891.

3. Maria L. Ryan sold the lot to Henry H. Hartsock & David P. Miller (Trustees) 1891 (Al. Co. Deed 71-417 Lot 154). Deed index shows Centre Street M.E. Church of Cumberland.

4. Henry H. Hartsock & David P. Miller (Trustees) Allegany Equity Case 4302 (Al. Co. Deed 86-389 Lot 154) 1899 to William H. Ash. **No deeds mention a graveyard**

Information states “He was buried between the encampment and Wills Creek. Deed 13-315) just before his fathers death in 1855. Rezin Beall obtained the land in 1825 (Al. Co. Deed N-85) from Ignatius Middleton. None of the deeds from 1977 mention a burial ground. Beall owned several hundred acres of land. On the location of the burial ground according to "History of Allegany County, Maryland" By James Walter Thomas, Thomas John Chew Williams. "He is buried in the old Beall Cemetery on Evitt's Creek east of Cumberland." .Located 2 deeds for the sale of the land of Alpheus B. Beall (Intestate). The land ended up in Equity Court (Docket# 1737) in 1869. The land was ordered sold and in 1870 and the heirs of Alpheus B. Beall sold the land to George Winter (Al. Co. Deed 30-670 260 Acres). The tract contained parts of the tracts Bealls New Discovery, Addition to Bealls New Discovery, Bealls Retirement, Better Times & Troublesome Times. Also in 1870 William H. Beall obtained the tract Rising Sun from the heirs of Alpheus B. Beall (Al. Co. Deed 31-381). Both deeds make no mention of a burial ground. 		<p>The land of Alpheus B. Beall is part of or next to the land of his father David Beall (1767-1856) and his grandfather Thomas Beall (1748-1820). 1850 Allegany County Census shows Alpheus B. Beall living next to his father and mother David & Mary Beall with a Beall family tree also listed. Unknown as to the number of the Beall Family that are buried here. Will A-123) and leaves his land to his sons John, Lewis and William. Find a Grave states “Several years before his death he lost his sight. In 1814 he, three daughters and two grandsons had typhoid fever, all six passed away within days of one another. They were buried in the family graveyard on his farm. No inscriptions on the markers remain”. In the 1830 census a Joseph & William Dean are next to each other. In 1840 it list Joseph Dean Sr. and Joseph Dean Jr. as well as William Dean next to each other. In the 1850 Allegany County census it list all three living next to each other with their families. Joseph Dean age 73, Joseph Dean age 34 and William Dean age 48.</p> <p>History of Allegany County Maryland list Mathias Dean as a son of William Dean Sr. (aka Joseph Dean Sr.). Mathias Dean is living next to his nephew Joseph and Maria Dean in the 1860 census near Flinstone MD.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Two Corrections</p> <p>1. The William Dean Sr. in History of Allegany County Maryland is actually Joseph Dean Sr.</p>
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2. Joseph Dean Sr. is the father of William Dean who married Elizabeth Davis not a William Dean Sr. Both Joseph Dean Sr. and Jr. are not listed in the 1860 census only Elizabeth Dean (wife of Joseph Dean Sr.) living with her grandson James Dean. Information shows Joseph Dean Jr. died 1857 in Virginia. Find a Grave list a Joseph Dean buried in Wilson Cemetery #3 at Flintstone MD. Information shows birth as 1816 and death date as 1904. This is the birth date of Joseph Dean Jr. which information shows died in 1857 Virginia. Headstone photo shows death date as 1904. No death certificate located at the Maryland State Archives. Family trees show Joseph Dean (of William) died in 1904. This is Joseph Dean (of William)

Note: On the Find a Grave page for Joseph Dean died 1904 list his father as Joseph Dean 1777-1855? and mother as Elizabeth Genneman Dean 1783-1860. This would be true if this was Joseph Dean Jr. born 1816.

Land Records

Joseph Dean first appears in land records in 1816 obtaining a lot in Skipton (Oldtown) Al. Co. Deed H-497). Joseph Dean next obtains 30 to 40 acres part of the tract Chrismans Purchase from Andrew Deffenbaugh in 1819 (Al. Co. Deed K-247). In 1847 Joseph Dean deeds the land to Joseph Dean (of William) (Al. Co. Deed 3-129).

1850 census list the value of real estate for each person. Joseph Dean Sr. list none, Joseph Dean Jr. list \$150.00 and William Dean with \$1075.00

A clue to the location to the dwelling of William Dean is found in 1864. Joseph Dean (of William) sells to James Dean the tract Refuse No longer (Al. Co. Deed 21-470 43.5 Acres) patented to Joseph Dean (of William) in 1847. Deed states "White oak tree on the south east side of Green Ridge about 44 perches south east of the dwelling of William Dean.

Some years ago when a group of Twiggs were researching the family name, I was looking at a book "Meshack Browning". the story of a hunter, and happened to see a "Hannah Twigg Browning" pictured in a rowboat. It so happened I was talking with the 'right' friend as she had some old letters ,which belonged to her father, and they pertained to Hannah and her family. Asa Twigg was Hannah's brother. Amongst these letters was a listing of Twiggs, copied from the Francis Twigg bible. When some of the "Twiggs" were working on the Twigg Family of W.MD. we lacked info on Francis.....but, here it was! Note:Francis Twigg was b. 29 Sept. 1750 and d. 1840, and was b. in London, England. He m. Mary Leasure on 12 October 1770. She died in 1853. Asa Twigg m. Catherine Jeffreys 38 Mar 1815.

In one of the letters I was able to have, this is what was written, in part: “Before my father died that was before 1900 he asked me to do him a favor. After he passed out, and I promised I would and he asked me to take his mother and father up. They was buried in an old large grave yard over near the Baltimore Pike near the old Christy home. His mother was buried 87 years 8 months and 8 days. We took both grandfather and mother and found her head, teeth was perfect, one eye tooth on the right was missing. But someone had written in the old bible stating his mother died when she was 21 years old and Father was a baby one year old. She lost one eye tooth on the right side and we found out that was true also found her wedding ring and in the note in the bible stating his mother was a beautiful lady and refined. Just look back at our folks. They had refinement to. I buried them in my father’s lot in Mt. Herman and all has a lovely Quincy granite monument. They were buried 116 years. We did not bother them as they was buried North of where we now live on their own grave yard farm.....”

Then, in another letter (mostly repeating what he said in another letter):

“My father asked me 6 months before he died Son I want you to do me a little favor after I pass out, and he told me after 6 months I want you to go over in the old Naughton Graveyard. A man by Selby owned the graveyard and farm. Before, my father and others had always kept up a nice fence around the graves and he said, you know where that 2 hickory trees is marked, you take those bodies up and put them in our lot in Mt. Hermon Cemetery. Naughton would not let them keep fences up any more. So I got some

men to help and got a nice box made of whole pine, and my grandmother had been buried 87 years 8 months 8 days, and she was buried in a homemade walnut coffin built with glass ½ and a vault built. Cut in stone and covered with heavy walnut lumber, 6 ft. 4” deep, and it had been written in the bible stating she was a beautiful woman 21 years old and had her right eye tooth taken out, and a ring on her right finger. We found themand all her bones was firm and My grandfather Asa Twigg, his bones was buried I think 40 or more years. But his bones looked like they had tiny holes in them and the Drs. Said it was because he was old.....”

Asa & Catherine Twigg were moved to Mt. Hermon Church Cemetery (39.63517, -78.71816) on Mt. Hermon Road. Also located at Mt. Hermon Church Cemetery are Francis & Mary Leisure Twigg the parents of Asa Twigg. The lands of Francis & Asa Twigg are east of the church on Williams Road. The headstone for Francis & Mary Twigg clearly date years later with Francis Twigg death in 1829. Unknown if Francis & Mary Twigg were relocated from his land or the same location as Asa Twigg. Note-Mt. Hermon Church cornerstone was laid in 1891.

Graveyard Land Owners

The 1905 article mentions the burial location owners as Christy, Selby and Naughton. Arthur Selby dies in 1858 (Al Co. Will B-150). In his will he leaves the tract Moveable Property to his daughter Mary G. Christie wife of Robert Christie. In 1859 Robert Christie sells the tract Moveable Property to Walter W. Selby son of Arthur Selby. In 1869 Walter W. Selby sells the land to Michael Naughton (Al. Co. Deed 29-434). No deeds mention a burial ground. Find a Grave shows the graveyard location on Hardman Road off of Christie Road with no headstone photos. The location matches up with the location of the tract Moveable Property. Hardman Road Cumberland MD. Area of 39.658279° -78.702490°

Church in the Turkey

In early Frederick County Maryland German Church records is mention of the “Congregation in the Turkey”. The diary of Reformed Pastor Conrad Steiner states he visited 10 times in 1757 the “Congregation in the Turkey” Between 1772-1786 Lutheran Pastor Andrew Krug visited the Turkey area 5 times. United Brethren Preacher Christian Newcomer recorded in his journal the he visited on April 17, 1796 a place called “Turkey”. If Reformed Pastor Conrad Steiner states he visited the Congregation in the Turkey 10 times in 1757 was there an earlier church or were services conducted in church member homes? Location today is Hessong Bridge Road & Blacks Mill Road near Creagerstown. It is

unknown how long the church remained active as original members died off and others made their way to churches in Creagerstown and Mechanicstown (Thurmont).

Land Notes

In 1766 Frederick Holtzman obtained a warrant to have the Partnership tract surveyed and was patented in 1773 (Fr. Co. Patent #2911 6.75 Acres). In 1774 Frederick Holtzman (Frederick Co. Deed V-697 6-3/4 Acres) deeds the tract of land known as Partnership to Christian Shryock and John Smith (Trustees of the Lutheran Church) and George Zimmerman and Charles Baltzell (Trustees of the Presbyterian Church). Land was to be used for a chapel of worship for the Lutheran & Presbyterian Churches and a schoolhouse.

The tract Partnership 6.75 acres has the tract Bonnetts Resolution 1743 for Martin Wetzell (PG. Co. Patent # 357 150 Acres) bordering on the west side. On the east side borders the tract Mill Place 1742 for Handel Barrick (PG. Co. Patent # 1467 100 Acres). In 1768 George Zimmerman obtained 100 acres from Handel Barrick part of the tract Mill Place (Fr. Co. Deed L-592). This bordered the east side of Partnership.

Curious the land remained vacant from 1742/43 to 1766 when it was surveyed. The tract Partnership ran along the Hessong Bridge Road which was an early main road to Frederick for the area. **Ground penetrating radar scan was done at the location in 2021 with a total of 42 probable graves and 36 possible graves identified in two clusters. Was this church or burial land for the original settlers prior to 1774 when it was sold to the trustees? Is this the site of “Church in the Turkey”?**

On Find a Grave the location is the site of the Lickliden Family Cemetery with 7 persons listed. The land where the cemetery is located was never owned by the Leichleider Family. Conrad Leichleider (1724-1781) land was about 1.5 miles further up Hessong Bridge Road and was formerly Michael Reisner's tract Green Spring (Fr. Co. Deed J-908 200 Acres 1764).

George Zimmerman (1738-1793) bought the tract Mill Place in 1768 from Handel Barrick (Fr. Co. Deed L-592 100 Acres) which borders on the eastside of the church property. The church property made its way into the Zimmerman Family and remained there until 1891 when it was sold by Hannah Zimmerman (1814-1904) wife of Michael Zimmerman (1814-1891) Fr. Co. Deed JLJ 1-171 19 Acres. Both Conrad Leichleider (1724-1781) & George Zimmerman (1738-1793) were buried here (Headstone photos Find a Grave).

Bridge replacement on Hessong Bridge Road over Little Hunting Creek. It states “A small family cemetery was known to be located on the southwest portion of the project area, but its full extent was uncertain. In addition, a historic stone-lined well had been previously filled in by the property owner within the project area. The archaeological investigation, which employed a ground-penetrating radar survey, additionally identified a total of 42 probable graves and 36 possible graves in two clusters; the remains of two buildings; a path connecting the buildings to the cemetery; and a concentration of slag related to a blacksmith shop”. Frederick News Post January 18, 1995. The late Ross Stull who farmed north of the Turkey graveyard. He recalled that earlier there was evidence of 50 or 60 graves I remember that 30 years ago there were still some stones in place and depressions showing unmarked graves. Recently I found only remnants of about a dozen stones thrown together near the old wild cherry tree.

In 1805 Jacob Bower dies (Fr. Co. Will Vol. 1-98) and leaves the land of his father to Susanna Bower and also Susanna is to have the lands of her father. Jacob Bower leaves the remainder to his children Catherine, Barbara, Daniel and an unborn child. Barbara Bower dies in 1807 (intestate) with no records found.

Headstone information: Western Maryland Genealogy Vol. 4 No. 4 Oct 1988. Gravestone found on the farm of Homer Remsburg on Holter Road near Middletown. Gravestone was delivered to Frederick S. Palmer of Middletown. Anna Barbara Bauer d. 1807 aged 60 years. Present location of headstone is unknown.

Note

The land of Peter/Teter Bower is 2.5 miles northeast of the Homer Remsburg Farm. No information found as to why the Barbara Bauer headstone was located on the Homer Remsburg Farm.

William Draper Sr. with his sons and daughters obtained 93 acres in 1824 part of the tract Range About the Miserable Knobs (Fr. Co. Deed JS 21-90) which is located about ½ mile south of the Moses Hurley property. 1857 Frederick Co. Equity Case (BGF 2-296) testimony was heard from Jacob Young of D. who stated old William and Mary Draper were in possession of the land until William's death, then Mary Draper and Joseph Draper lived there. Land is located on Spruce Run Road Wolfsville MD. No probate records were located for Moses Hurley Sr. or William Draper Sr. or Jr.

It appears the land went to the heirs of Moses Hurley. In 1858 his daughter Sarah A. Hurley Haynes sells 7 acres of the land (Fr. Co. Deed BGF 3-105).

In 1857 the 93 acres obtained in 1824 went to Equity Court (BGF 2-282) and was ordered sold. Land was sold in 1863 by the trustees (Fr. Co. Deed BGF 9-77) to Jacob Wolfe Jr.
