Plan of Arrangement

The male line of descent is followed direct to U. M. Appler of the 4th generation. The 5th generation families (children of U. M. Appler) follow in order of birth of his children. The 6th generation follows the general order of the 5th generation. The 7th generation families are incomplete and none of the 8th generation is, as yet, married. Therefore the 7th and 8th generations are included under the 6th generation family subheading.

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First Generation - Appler Family

The Erhart and Rachel Appler Family

Their children as named in both of their wills are Jacob, Rosina, Elizabeth, Susanna H. (Rock), Esther (Reil), and a granddaughter Susan Rock.

Eberhardt Ebler (Abeler) from the Palatinate, Bavaria, Germany, came to America via Rotterdam on the ship Harle and landed at Philadelphia, Pa., September 1, 1736. See Strasburger "History of Pennsylvania German Pioneers." Also Ann Elizabetha Ebler (Abeler), probably a sister; but not Rachel, his wife, came over on the same ship. Ann was aged 23 and Eberhardt was 20 years of age. This indicates he was born in 1716. The date of probating his will was June 7, 1768. These dates correspond with those on his tombstone.

He was a mill-wright or miller and *probably* plied his trade in south-eastern Pennsylvania and north-eastern Maryland during the years between 1736 and 1747, when he first patented land in Maryland. During this interim of eleven years he married Rachel, no record has been found. The above is an *assumption* based on fact. I have no data on Erhart Appler reaching back of 1747. And none to indicate that Eberhardt Ebler (Abeler), 1736, became Erhart Appler in 1747. However, I am told the substituting of p for b was common among early Germans in Maryland. Erhart Appler was also known as Eberhart Epler as is shown by a deed of 1838.

The land acquired by Erhart Appler was located in Prince Georges County, Province of Maryland. After 1748, when Frederick County was

formed out of a part of Prince Georges County, it was located in Frederick County, Md. and when Carroll County was formed out of a part of Frederick County in 1836, it became located in Carroll County, Md., and lies a few miles south of Uniontown, Md.

The first record of land holding of Erhart Appler is from the Land Office at Annapolis, Md. A patent was issued to him for 220 acres of land *November 13, 1747*. I have a photostatic copy of this patent and in this, his name is spelled exactly as I have written it above. This tract of land was called the "Deeps." The rent of 8 shillings, 10 pence was to be paid in equal and even portions at the times of the Feasts of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of St. Michael the Arch Angel.

This patent is recorded in the Land Office at Annapolis, Md., in Liber B.Y. & G.S. No. 2, folio 304. After having the above land patented, he discovered some vacant contiguous land which he desired to add to these 220 acres. Accordingly he petitioned the Land Office for a survey. The certificate of resurvey of the "Deeps" with vacant land added amounted to 1570 acres and was named "Resurvey of the Deeps." The patent for this land was dated March 25, 1757. The recording of this patent, of which I have a photostatic copy, is in Liber B.C. & G.G. No. 9, folio 183, Land Office, Annapolis, Md. In this patent the spelling of the name is Erhart Apler.

The rent on these 1570 acres was 3 pounds, 2 shillings, 10 pence. The Rent Roles show that Abrahart Apler paid the Quit Rents from 1753 to 1773. In 1763, his name is entered Everhart Appler. On the opposite page of Rent Roll are these transfers: 175 acres, rent 7 shillings, to Matthias Booker from Aberhart Appler, November 4, 1758; 600 acres, rent 1 pound, 4 shillings, to Philip Greenwald (from same) same date; 200 acres, rent 8 shillings, to John Chrisman (from same) same date; 118 acres (no rent stated) to Adam Lemmon (from same), June 21, 1764. The above is from Rent Roll for Frederick County, No. 3 folio 152, 153 in the Land Office at Annapolis, Md.

The above transfers correspond with deeds recorded at Frederick County Registry of Deeds, namely:—F. 600, F. 602, F. 607 and J. 631. In these deeds the grantor's name is spelled Eberhart, Aberheart and Earhart Apler.

In 1760 another patent was issued to Everhart Appler for a contiguous tract of 9 acres, rent 4½ pence. This tract was called the "Wrangle." The certificate shows it was surveyed for Everheart Appler. This patent is recorded in the Land Office at Annapolis, Md., and is in

Liber B.C. & G. No. 17, folio 394, and is dated December 20, 1760. This makes his total land patented 1579 acres and sales from this tract totaled 1093 acres which leaves a tract of 486 acres which he called his "plantation."

In his will he made his mark to Eberhard Eply. In this instrument he willed all of the land on one side of Little Pipe Creek to his wife, Rachel, and after her decease to his son Jacob. All of the land on the other side of the creek he willed to his four daughters.

In 1801, Jacob Appler had this land which he inherited from his father, Erhart Appler, resurveyed and patented. This land is described as being part of the "Resurvey of the Deeps," the tract called the "Wrangle" with liberty to correct previous surveys. This land was found to contain, with $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres of vacant land added, $195\frac{1}{2}$ acres and was named "Abrahams and Jacobs Lot." This patent was issued out of the Land Office for the State of Maryland June 5, 1801 and is recorded in Liber I.C. No. P., folio 362.

It seems that Jacob Appler had some doubts about his title for on December 5, 1838 he sold this tract of $195\frac{1}{2}$ acres to Moses Shaw, consideration five dollars, and on the same day and same consideration he bought it from Moses Shaw. Therefore, two deeds WW3—F. 144 and WW3—F. 146 are recorded in the Carroll County Registry of Deeds at Westminster, Md.

By the terms of Jacob Appler's will, probated April 17, 1843, he directed the executors of his will to sell this, as well as other tracts of land. Accordingly on November 10, 1845 this tract of land, $195\frac{1}{2}$ acres, was sold to John Engle. This is recorded in the Carroll County Registry of Deeds, J.S. 6—F. 15, at Westminster, Md. About a year later this farm was sold by Engle to Hiram Englar, grandfather of the present owner, H. E. Engler (lately deceased). I have copies of all these wills and deeds and an examination of the boundaries, find they check all the way.

The different spellings of Erhart Appler's name is somewhat confusing; but, as has been explained to me, in the early days many persons could not read or write their own names. They made their mark. The clerks wrote the name as it sounded to them. There is no doubt about his son's name. He wrote it "Jacob Appler, Senr." (He had a son Jacob.)

Second Generation - Appler Family

The Jacob, Senior and Mary (Hyde) Appler Family

The son of Erhart and Rachel Appler was born July 1, 1757 at Uniontown District, Frederick Co., Md., and died April 3, 1843 at Uniontown, Carroll Co., Md. Buried at burial ground on farm. Headstone moved in 1932 to Little Pipe Creek Cemetery. The fact of the moving of this stone is cut on the back of the stone. He seems to have lived on "My farm" until about 1820. Since then in Uniontown, Md., with his widowed daughter, Mrs. Senseney, until his death. He was a farmer, real estate dealer, etc.

He married Mary Hyde, daughter of Jonathan and Ann Hyde, on March 19, 1779, at Uniontown District, Frederick Co., Md. She was born March 9, 1761 and died January 10, 1836. Buried beside her husband, Jacob, Sr., on burial ground on farm. She seems to have been remotely connected with the Hydes who gave or sold to the City of London, England, the ground now named Hyde Park, London. The Hyde estate eventually reverted to the Crown. The American would be heirs made two unsuccessful attempts to regain possession of this estate but Queen Victoria ruled the evidence presented to be inconclusive. Jonathan Hyde, who was a wheel-wright and blacksmith, willed to "My daughter, Mary Appler" to each of her children on arriving at the age of 25 years the sum of 100 pounds. And since there were 11 children who passed this age, it cost his estate quite a sum for those days or any other times.

Their children were: Rachael b January 22, 1780 d September 4, 1784; Nancy or Anne b April 22, 1782; Eleanor b May 18, 1784; Mary

b October 21, 1786; David & Jonathan (Twins) b October 21, 1788; Abraham b December 10, 1790; Jacob & Margaret (Twins) b November 6, 1793; Sarah b October 15, 1796 d 1797; Elizabeth b July 4, 1798; Isaac b September 16, 1801; Jesse b February 13, 1804. This corresponds with the six sons: David, Jonathan, Abraham, Jacob, Isaac and Jesse and the five daughters: Nancy Senseney, Eleanor King, Mary Winters, Margaret Weaver, and Elizabeth Christ; named in his will to each of whom he bequeathed \$1000. The sales of his several real estate properties and personal property netted considerably more than this.

Scharf in his "History of Western Maryland" states that, "In 1817 Jacob Appler is a wealthy citizen living near town" (Uniontown). A footnote on page 852, Vol. II, states "On thursday August 28, 1817 Jacob Christ was married to Miss Elizabeth Appler by Rev. Curtis Williams." This note is in connection with the building of St. Lucas' Church, built in 1818. Jacob Appler, Sr. was one of the managers in raising funds and erection of this church. This church seems to have been of the Evangelical Reformed denomination. Of the sons of Jacob Appler, Sr.— Abraham Appler was an elder and Isaac Appler a deacon. In 1882 this church was occupied by the Church of God and is near Uniontown, Md.

Jacob Appler, Sr., in his will reserved the burial ground and a way from the house to it from future sale. The farm was sold by the executors of his will with this reservation. When I first visited this farm in about 1900 with my father, mother and brother Jacob we found the old burial ground a sorry mess of bushes and briars; fallen tombstones and holes made by small burrowing animals. On a plot just inside the gate were buried Jacob Appler, 1843 and Mary, his wife, 1836. When I again visited this farm in 1939 accompanied by my son-in-law and daughter, the road-way and the burial ground were cleared away and the land under tillage.

I have made no effort to trace any of the 11 children of Jacob and Mary Appler, except Isaac Appler, my grandfather. But the following scraps of information have fallen into my hands: David and Jonathan, David was twice married; first to Rachael Focht (no date) and again August 3, 1840 to Elizabeth Gilbert. There seems to have been two sets of children of whom Walter F. Appler of New York City is one of the latter set. David died in 1858. Jonathan was a bachelor. Abraham married Rebecca Hoffman. Died February 1, 1878, buried St. Lucas' Churchyard. Jacob and Margaret (no data on Jacob). Margaret married Nathaniel Weaver August 9, 1815. Jesse, the grandfather of Howard E. Appler whose partial records are cited in my sources of data. Nancy died in

1853. Mary was three times married, first to George Creager April 7, 1807, then to a Thomas and third to Fred Winters, all before 1839. Elizabeth died May 16, 1867.

In the U. S. Census of 1790 (the first census taken), the Maryland volume shows the Jacob Appler family as it was then constituted, namely:—two free male whites over 16 years of age, three free male whites under 16 years of age and four free female whites. No slaves. I could find no other Applers in Maryland. In "A Century of Population Growth in the United States" all families of over 100 are listed. The name Appler does not appear in this book. The two unmarried sisters of Jacob Appler in 1769 must have married or died before 1790, since they are not listed in this census.

Third Generation - Appler Family

The Isaac and Judith (Winters) Appler Family

Isaac, a son of Jacob, born September 16, 1801, at Uniontown District, Md., married Judith Winters, March 27, 1827, in Evangelical Reformed Church, Frederick, Md. She was the daughter of George and Catherine (Ross) Winters; hence the origin of the given family name, "Ross," which recurs in future generations, which she gave her son Joseph Ross Appler. Isaac Appler died at the age of 92 years, and Judith, his wife, at the age of 91 years. Both are buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery, Hannibal, Mo.

Isaac was a Justice of the Peace in Uniontown, Md., and general businessman. In 1855 he migrated with his family and his sons' families to Dixon, Ill., and in 1857 to Hannibal, Mo.

Their children are as follows: Augustus Columbus Appler edited and printed the Carroll County Democrat, Westminster, Md., in the early 1850's, which he sold and joined the family migration to Hannibal, Mo. He went to St. Louis and accepted a position as foreman on the "Missouri Republican" (later the St. Louis Republic). During the Civil War, he purchased the St. Clair County Democrat at Osceola, Mo., and published that paper until 1875. Returning to St. Louis, he took up writing articles for the St. Louis Times. He seems to have had two daughters and a son, Julius A. Appler of San Antonio, Texas. Buried in Valhalla Cemetery, St. Louis, Mo.

John Thomas Appler, also a newspaperman. In 1858 a company was formed to publish a daily Democratic newspaper (See, History of Marion

County, Mo.), the "Evening News," in Hannibal, Mo. This paper advocated the secession of the South from the Union. He became the editor and publisher. In 1862 this printing plant was destroyed by Union soldiers. Mr. Appler became Capt. John T. Appler in the Confederate Army and fought in many important battles of the Civil War. After the war he was in charge of the mailing lists of the St. Louis "Republic" for 30 years, and retired in 1919 when the Republic was bought by the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. He died in 1922 at the age of 80 years, and is buried in Valhalla Cemetery, St. Louis, Mo. He had one daughter, Eunetia Appler—Brady—Palmer.

Joseph Ross Appler, located in St. Louis, Mo., where he conducted a men's furnishings goods business, which later became the Appler & Sears Co. of which he was president. During the St. Louis World's Exposition he was a prominent executive in organizing the "Fair." He died in 1925, leaving a son, Arlie A. Appler of 4320 Natural Bridge Road, St. Louis, Mo., and a daughter, Lulu Delmar Appler—Williss. He is buried in Valhalla Cemetery, St. Louis, Mo.

C. Milton Appler remained single. He was an express messenger and lived in Hannibal, Mo., and is buried there in Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Mary Catherine Appler—League lived in Hannibal, Mo., and died there, age 93. Buried at Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Sarah Appler—Stewart lived at Quincy, Ill., and later in Chicago.

Thaddeus Appler married in First Reformed Church, York, Pa., to Harriet Bletcher (no other data).

Fourth Generation - Appler Family

The Urbanus Marion and Louisa (Bollinger) Appler Family

He was a son of Isaac, born May 30, 1832, at Uniontown District, Md. He married Louisa Bollinger at Westminster, Md., January 15, 1853. She was the daughter of Jacob M. and Anne (Sprenkle) Bollinger who emigrated from Holland and settled in Uniontown District, Md. Shortly after Louisa's marriage, the Bollinger family moved to Conewago Township, Adams Co., Pa. Her sister, Mary, married Jacob Lohr. They emigrated to Iowa, homesteaded a section of land on part of which was built Lohrville, Iowa. Benjamin, a brother, married a LeFever, a son, Maurice and a daughter, Bertha. Ephriam, one daughter, Rena. Eli, several children. Jesse, men's furnishing goods, Hanover, Pa., one or more children. Ephriam and brother Eli were both millers.

Their children as named in the family Bible are:—

Syrena Alverda b April 15, 1854 d December 26, 1923.

Jacob Albert b March 7, 1856 d August 21, 1923.

John Thomas Marion b May 31, 1858 d May 22, 1938.

Laura Louisa b October 29, 1860 d March 28, 1861.

Mary Catherine b March 10, 1862 d November 15, 1930.

Harry Oscar b July 19, 1864 d August 28, 1883.

Isaac Elmer b April 1, 1867 d May 29, 1914.

Ida Alice b September 9, 1870 d March 3, 1871.

Charley Ross (baptized Charles Ross) b February 23, 1872.

Maurice Bollinger b May 10, 1874 d September 13, 1875.

Cyrena was born in Carroll Co., Md. Then my father and mother joined the trek of the Isaac Appler clan to Dixon, Ill. As I remember my mother's relating this, they traveled by covered wagon of the Conestoga type. They fell in with other travelers bound for California, for the California "gold fever" had not yet run its course. Some of these travelers had inscriptions painted on their wagon sides such as "California or Bust." They met with others returning east who had inscriptions painted on their wagon sides, such as "Busted be God."

Jacob was born at Dixon, Ill. Mother was homesick and did not like the flat prairie, she longed for the rolling land and hills of eastern Maryland. After a few years they returned east and went into the hotel business in Baltimore. Md. Here John T. was born. They were burned out in Baltimore and moved to Moritz's Tavern, 3½ miles S.W. of Gettysburg, Pa., in western Adams Co., Pa., near Emmittsburg, Md.

Laura Louisa was born here, and M. Catherine. Laura died in infancy and is buried at Emmittsburg. My parents ran Moritz Tavern during the battle of Gettysburg. My father was pressed into service as a guide by a Confederate general. The Confederate army was encamped around the tavern and the vicinity several days before the Battle of Gettysburg. My mother, with several army bakers helping her, baked bread almost continuously for a week.

In the spring of 1864 they purchased the small farm situated on the Baltimore Turnpike midway between the villages of Two Taverns and "Frogtown." I remember the house well, it was a two-storied stone house. This house burned when George Bakers lived there and we rebuilt with the wooden frame house now standing on the site of the stone house. All of the remainder of the children were born here. Harry died in an institution and is buried at Media, Pa. Ida Alice and Maurice B. died in infancy and are buried in St. Mark's Churchyard.

The following is taken from newspaper clippings: Mr. and Mrs. Urbanus M. Appler living near Gettysburg celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary February 15, 1903. All but one, John of Lohrville, Iowa, of the six children and 29 grandchildren of the aged couple visited the home-
stead, the anniversary was made the occasion of a family reunion. Before leaving, the children and grandchildren of Mr. and Mrs. Appler presented their parents with many presents of gold and other useful articles.

U. M. Appler died at his home near Two Taverns, Adams Co., Pa., December 21, 1908. In early life he learned the printing trade with his brother, A. C. Appler, editor and publisher of the Carroll County Demo-

crat at Westminster, Md. He worked at this trade until he joined the Isaac Appler clan's trek to Dixon, Ill. After the Civil War he took up huckstering. He served three years as school director and always took a lively interest in public questions. Interment at St. Mark's Churchyard.

Mrs. Louisa (Bollinger) Appler, widow of U. M. Appler, of near Two Taverns, Adams Co., Pa., passed quietly away at her home, Saturday morning, February 24, 1912. The deceased was a most estimable lady and a devoted mother and esteemed by all who knew her. She is survived by four sons and two daughters; Ex-Register and Recorder, Jacob A. of Gettysburg, John T. and Elmer I. of Mt. Joy township, and C. Ross of the Girls' High School, Boston, Mass. Mrs. Cyrena A. Collins of Mt. Joy township and M. Catherine Baker of Cumberland township, Adams Co., Pa., also 28 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. She was the last surviving member of the Jacob M. Bollinger family. Funeral from her late residence with interment on the family lot at St. Mark's Reformed Church. The four sons acted as pall-bearers at her request.

Fifth Generation - Appler Family

The William J. and Cyrena A. (Appler) Collins Family

Son of Edward and Sarah (Straley) Collins was born May 12, 1853 at Mt. Joy Township, Adams Co., Pa., and died June 10, 1911. He is buried at St. Mark's Churchyard. He was a farmer, machinery and pump dealer. He married Cyrena Alverda Appler, daughter of U. M. and Louisa Appler. She died December 26, 1913, and is buried at St. Mark's Churchyard. She taught several years in Adams County public schools before her marriage. Their children are: Leonard Urbanus b September 17, 1878; Maud Irene b June 6, 1885; and Bessie Louisa b March 24, 1887.

They bought a small farm in back of Yost's store which he called "California." Leonard was born there; but I am under the impression Maud and Bessie were born on the small farm which Collins bought of a Mr. Speck, a carpet weaver. This last named place is located on the Baltimore turnpike about three miles east of Gettysburg, Pa. Later he bought the old Feterhoff property adjoining, built a new house and other buildings where they lived until both died. After their parents' death Bessie acquired the last named property, Maud the small farm above referred to, and Leonard the property where his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. U. M. Appler, lived.

The Jacob A. and Emma C. (Mackley) Appler Family

He is a son of U. M. and Louisa Appler, and married Emma, daughter of Joseph and Jemimia (Hause) Mackley, February 1878, at Hanover, Pa. She was born January 27, 1853, at Mt. Joy Township, Adams Co., Pa. She taught several years in Adams County public schools before her marriage.

The following are their children: Joseph Urbanus b November 4, 1878; Erma Belle b March 28, 1880; Della Virginia b August 17, 1881; Albert Ross b October 17, 1883; Ira Willis b March 21, 1885; John Oram b November 19, 1886; Isaac Ray b September 23, 1888; Clara Louisa b March 18, 1890; Elsie Ruth b February 12, 1891; Guy Milton b January 6, 1893; Evan Mackley b February 17, 1895; Mary Hyde b July 7, 1898; twelve children, all of whom lived to have families of their own.

Jacob and Emma went to housekeeping in the spring of 1879 in the stone house above referred to, after U. M. Appler and family moved to the farm now owned by Trostle, a part of which is now the property owned by Leonard Collins. Emma remained at home a year after her marriage and Joseph U. was born at this Mackley homestead. Jacob A. huckstered as well as his father, their routes overlapping. Father bought him out, deeding to Jacob A. the 7½ acres of land, more or less, lying opposite the property of Isaac Bercaw, now Ward G. Bercaw, as part payment. Erma and Della were born in this stone house in Mt. Joy Township. In the spring of 1882 Jacob A. moved to the Jacob M. Bollinger farm in Conewago Township; here Bert, Willis, John, Ray, Lou, and Elsie were born. In about the year 1892, Jacob A. bought the Joseph Mackley farm near Two Taverns, Pa., here Guy, Evan and Mary were born. In connection with his many other activities, he taught some 50 years in the public schools. These were six months' terms in the rural schools of Adams County, Pa. Soon after being elected Register and Recorder for Adams County, he moved to Gettysburg and lived on N. High Street until he died, August 21, 1923. Mrs. Emma Appler, his wife, died May 27, 1924. Both are buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Gettysburg, Pa.



The George S. and M. Catherine (Appler) Baker Family

He was the son of Samuel and Margaret (Crouse) Baker and was born December 1, 1857, at Mt. Joy Township, Adams Co., Pa. He married Catherine, the daughter of U. M. Appler, October 10, 1880, at Gettysburg, Pa. Their children are: Charles A. b January 7, 1882; Howard R. b, March 3, 1883, d July 16, 1901, buried at St. Mark's Churchyard; Estella Louisa, b April 17, 1885; Blanche M. b. October 8, 1887, d May 23, 1901, buried at St. Mark's Churchyard; Roy George b March 7, 1887; Belle Virginia b August 14, 1891, d September 1, 1891. Buried St. Mark's Churchyard; John A. b May 26, 1893, d same day, buried at St. Mark's Churchyard; Nina M. b August 3, 1895; Eunice M. b May 8, 1896.

I cannot recall where each of the above children was born for I have no dependable data to rely on. They lived a number of years in the stone house above referred to after Jacob A. moved to Conewago Township. Here the house took fire and burned to the ground, leaving only parts of the stone walls standing. Their household goods were a complete loss. After father, U. M. Appler, moved across the road, they moved to the farm which is now the Trostle farm. Later, when this property was sold to Simon Miller, they moved to a farm in Cumberland Township and later to Gettysburg, Pa., where they lived until their deaths, George S., August 21, 1930, and M. Catherine on November 15, 1930. Both are buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Gettysburg, Pa.

The Elmer I. and Frances V. (Fisher) Appler Family

He, a son of U. M. Appler, married Frances, October 24, 1886, at Littlestown, Pa.
