


MAP





MAP OF ANDROSCOGGIN CO.








CITY OF AUBURN





LEWISTON AUBURN


LISBON FALLS VILLAGE








MECHANIC FALLS






POLAND

GREENE.

Surface.—In its geographical appearance Greene is a little more elevated than the town east and south, and more broken, but less than these north and west. The top of the hills appears to be of a height particularly those in the western and northwestern parts, known as Clark's and the Adams and Adams hills. Between these and the center of the town are others of less elevation, and some of them are almost the highest in the town, the summit of which is located the beautiful residence of Ephraim Hill, Esq., and so on. From the summit of these hills you have an expansive view of the surrounding country. The eastern and southern prospect is particularly fine, and is unobscured by elevation of mountains, except Sabbath Mountain in the immediate vicinity, while the western view is of a different character, and is a view of the State of Connecticut, which increases in magnitude until you behold in the distance the high peaks of the Catskills, the first land sighted by the mariner on the Atlantic as he approaches our coast, and really the continent of America.

Soil.—The soil varies, on the higher parts a strong loamy and somewhat sandy soil, which is well adapted to grazing, orcharding, and all kinds of crops, and on the lower parts a more fertile soil, well adapted to the culture of wheat, corn, and other crops, but not so good for wheat as the upper lands.

Water Courses.—The town is deficient in water power, there being no streams of great magnitude within its limits. There is a rivulet, composed of small streams emptying into Colchester Pond, called Sprague's Mills. Geo. The extent here is 100 feet in diameter, and contains about sixteen tons, and manufacture about four million cubic feet of gas per annum, and consume 1600 tons of coal. He labored for Mrs. Wertz for 20 years, and died in 1870. J. P. Gill, Esq., has been, from the start, the agent for the works.

Schools.—Previous to 1795, when the town was incorporated, the schools were conducted by private contractors. There are at present 1000 pupils in the public schools who are taught therein. Daniel Davis, who came here in 1777, taught the first school in his own house, and perhaps his brother Amos, who came here earlier, was employed in teaching. Mr. Amos Davis built a small house for Mrs. Davis, and she died in 1810, and was buried in the cemetery. This was probably as early as 1780. Ben Reed, Esq., who came here in 1785, was a school teacher for a number of years, and had a school in his house, which was employed in that capacity soon after his arrival. At the end of 1791 and 1792 Mr. Daniel Davis, who was the father of Amos Davis, at Garrettsville, and Mr. James Mitchell taught in the west end of his log house in 1793 or 4. Mr. Miller, who was a school teacher, was employed by Capt. Silas B. Brown, who was serving Westborough until he died in 1810. Mr. Brown was the same name as D. Brown, who was employed in teaching in a small room in one end of Mr. James Amos's blacksmith shop.

In 1790 a school-house, the first in town, was built on the farm of Dea. Joseph Wood, on the west side of the Col. Ham, which was occupied for a meeting and town-house for nearly a century of a century. This school-house was not used for a school for many years. Some two years afterwards a school-house was built at Garrettsville.

In 1839, and perhaps before, Ben Reed, Esq., taught at Leonard's Corner, in a house owned by Mr. Clark Woodbridge, a few rods from the center of this city, which was situated only a short distance from the town pump, where the school was held for more or less of the time in this district before the erection of the school-house in 1843. The house was situated on what is now called the West side of the street, and school-house, and was used for a school for several decades. About 1812 Richard D. Harris, from Connecticut, commenced teaching in Lewiston, which gave more interest to the school than it had before. He, perhaps, contributed more to the advancement of our schools than Mr. Woodbridge. He was a teacher for every year, except two, from 1817 to 1839. Rev. Benjamin Thoms taught nearly as many years as the former.

It was not, however, until the fall of 1839, that a high school was organized in Lewiston. During the summer of that year a two-story school-house was built on the site of the old one just west of the Main Street, which cost \$10,000. In the building, two high schools were opened in the fall of 1839. The high school was under the direction of Mr. George W. Jenett, an experienced and successful teacher, and the grammar school under the direction of Miss Augusta Willoughby, who was a successful teacher and constantly increased, and at the present time we have within the limits of our city, one high school, one school-house and thirty-one schools under the direction of more than forty teachers.

State College.—The Agricultural Academy, an institution under the direction of the F. Depot, discontinued was turned over to the State, leaving the denomination without any literary institution in 1850. In November of that year the question of establishing a new institution was under consideration at the annual convention. Subsequently, March 18, 1852, a resolution was passed by the State, and the State Seminary with an endowment by the State of \$15,000. The trustees met at Vienna, June 1853, and held several days of session, and resolved to locate the new institution at Lewiston. Rev. G. S. Cheney, of Andover, was appointed to visit the site of the proposed institution, and in the establishment of the seminary, and whose report decided the location of the institution, was chosen president. The site of the proposed institution, which was a donation and some improvements, determined upon and the construction of the building commenced in the fall of 1853. The cornerstone was laid with appropriate exercises on June 24, 1856. Rev. George Knox, of Lewiston, delivered the prayer, and the exercises were closed by a benediction of the oration. The seminary was open for the reception of students in the fall of 1857, and the first class graduated the following June.

In 1853 the trustees instituted a collegiate course of study and changed the name of the institution to the State Seminary. It has graduated six classes, prepared for entering colleges, and has received a large number of pupils. The department in the summer of 1857, a young lady was admitted, and the last class graduated in June, 1859.

There are thirteen free scholarships, ten of which are awarded by the State, and three by the State Seminary, consisting of a thousand dollars each. The Seminary has graduated seven classes, comprising seventy-five numbers, and has received a large number of pupils.
