## INTRODUCTION

---

The early history of Free Masonry is lost in a maze of myth and legend. Some claim it had its origin at the tower of Babel; others, that it took its rise at the building of the pyramids. There is a Masonic tradition, generally known, that it flourished at the building of King Solomon's Temple and was revived at the building of the second temple. But how, when and by whom it was spread to all parts of the civilized world, no man can tell. The secrecy imposed by centuries of opposition and persecution destroyed all data on which authentic history could be based.

At first it is probable that all Masons were "Operative" Masons: ie., skilled in the art of building. Afterwards gentlemen and tradesmen were admitted as "Speculative" Masons. This innovation, dating back to the period of the "Old Charges," was a wise one and has secured the strength and continuity of our great fraternity to the present day.

Modern Masonry dates from the revival of Free Masonry in England where the first Grand Lodge was formed at London in 1717. Grand Lodges now work in all the principal countries of the world.

The first lodge in America was founded at Philadelphia about 1730. In 1734 Benjamin Franklin was elected Grand Master of Pennsylvania. St. John's Lodge, No. 1, Boston, instituted in 1733, was the first Masonic body formed in New England. The first Masonic body in Maine, Portland Lodge, No. 1. met under a charter granted March 30, 1769 and still exists. Rising Virtue Lodge, No. 16, was organized

at Bangor, Sept. 16, 1802. In 1820, when Maine became a state, there were thirty-one lodges in this state, but none in this section nearer than Bangor.

Like other lodges, Penobscot Lodge has had its ups and downs, its trials and triumphs, its years of depression and its years of prosperity. During the Anti-Masonic excitement this lodge suffered with others and for a time ceased working but it retained its charter ready to resume labor after the storm had passed. Under the wise and skillful guidance of efficient officers it has grown strong and influential and is now enjoying the most prosperous decade in its history.

The disastrous fire of 1896 which destroyed the secretary's records, and the Portland fire of 1866 which destroyed the records of the Grand Lodge, placed your committee under a peculiar and serious disadvantage. We have consulted the existing records of the Grand Lodge and of our own lodge, the annual reports of the Grand Lodge, the files of the local paper, and the histories of neighboring towns. Items of interest have been contributed by some of the older brethren. No available source of information known to the committee has been neglected in the hope of making this history of Penobscot lodge as complete and reliable as possible.

# HISTORY of PENOBSCOT LODGE

NO. 39, F. & A. M.

---

About the year 1821 a number of brothers residing in Garland, Exeter, and Dexter, members of different lodges, having the good of the craft at heart, wishing to enjoy more of the benefits of Masonry and to better disseminate the knowledge of its teachings, forwarded to the Grand Lodge of Maine this petition:

To the Grand Lodge of the State of Maine:

Your petitioners respectfully represent that there exists but one Lodge in the County of Penobscot; viz, the Rising Virtue Lodge of Bangor; and that in the extensive interior part of the County there are many Masons who cannot enjoy all the Benefits of Masonry, except under the inconvenience of traveling from twenty to thirty miles.

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that the Grand Lodge would grant them a charter for a Lodge to be denominated Penobscot Lodge, to be holden at Garland in the County aforesaid, and that the following named brethren be appointed first officers thereof. (viz.)

At the next meeting of the Grand Lodge at Portland in Jan. 1822, the petition was read and referred to R. W. Brothers Trafton, Wheeler and Kendall, who reported as follows:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Larned Pullen and others praying for a Charter for a Lodge to be located at Garland by the name of Penobscot Lodge have attended to the petition and are satisfied that the following Petitioners are Master Masons. They having been vouched for as such, (viz.) Larned Pullen, Winthrop Chapman, Philip Greely, Joseph Kelsey, Isaac Wheeler, Benj. Flint, Wm. Godin, and Wm. Bean. They had also satisfactory evidence that Wm. Hoyt is a Master Mason although he was not regularly vouched for; respecting Apollon Pond and Hazen Eastman, we have not been able to obtain any information as to their being Master Masons.

Your committee would therefore report that the prayer of the petition be so far granted as to grant a charter to all the Petitioners with the exception of Apollon Pond and Hazen Eastman.



The Grand Lodge voted that the foregoing report be accepted and a Charter granted accordingly.

Consequently, on Jan. 24, 1822, Simon Greenleaf, Grand Master, signed the Charter for Penobscot Lodge and declared the precedence of the Lodge to commence from the tenth day of January, 1822.

It is probable that a dispensation had been granted the petitioners previous to this date for we find that they had met as a lodge previously and had even elected a new member, Daniel Chase, Jan. 3rd, 1822, three weeks before the granting of the Charter.

The lodge was organized and had its headquarters for several years in the two-story dwelling of Wm. Godwin, (sometimes spelled Godin). This house was built for a ta-

vern and was situated west of Garland village opposite Maple Grove Cemetery, (Oak's History of Garland).

Since the Secretary's books were destroyed by fire in 1896, we were fortunate to find at the office of the Grand Secretary in Portland, the first return made by Penobscot Lodge in which was listed the above named officers. The other members were Joseph Kelsey, Apollos Pond, (who with Eastman, had evidently proven his right to the title of Master Mason), and Benjamin Flint. Since the year covered by the returns closed Sept. 1, the names of Daniel Chase and Nathan Merrill, raised Nov. 25, appear only as candidates.

Although the lodge was small, it seems to have started out with bright prospects. The money for the charter, furniture and jewels of the new lodge was provided by means of a joint note given by the members.

The following transcript from the Treasurer's books of that time is most interesting:

The Lodge seems to have entered upon a period of great prosperity. Many new members were received and the treasurer's books show a good financial condition.

This year Penobscot Lodge was called to mourn the death of one of its charter members, Philip Greely, who had served efficiently as one of its officers since its organization. This is the first recorded death in Penobscot Lodge. Brother Greely was one of the first settlers in Garland. He was prominent in the affairs of the town, having held many offices, and served as captain of the local militia company.

Rev. Isaac Wilkins, the first clergyman to join Penobscot Lodge, was the first settled minister in the town of Garland and as such received the ministerial lot from the public lands in that town.

#### Letter of Stevens Davis to the Grand Master.

(postage paid 25c)

Dexter, Sept. 5, 1829.

Bro. William Lord.

Dr. Sir. Your kind favor came duly to hand and we have taken proper steps and had our petition signed by the D. D. G. M. We flatter ourselves that our wishes will be forthwith gratified: our situation actually demands it. If there should be any objections, Bro. John Merrill of Warren can give some information how we are situated (in point of locality) and what our prospects are if moved.

We think it will be the means of adding many good and respectable members to our Society, Morgan to the contrary notwithstanding, besides helping many of us to meet oftener by moving the Lodge more in the center of our numbers.

We shall send your Lodge their dues the first opportunity—as we have the funds on hand.

If you will attend to our petition I will see you satisfied for your extra services.

At the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, Jan. 22, 1830, the committee, to whom the above petition was committed, reported and the Grand Lodge voted that the [above petition] prayer of the petition be granted, "on condition that the petitioners secure the approbation of Meridan Splendor Lodge to the removal of said Penobscot Lodge as within prayed for,"

On Feb. 7, 1830, Meridan Splendor Lodge of Newport gave its approbation of the proposed removal of Penobscot Lodge.

Although nearly all the officers and two-thirds of the members of Penobscot Lodge signed the petition, it is probable that the proposed removal was strenuously opposed by some of the Garland members. In fact, one irate individual who had been prominent in the affairs of the Lodge expressed himself in such vigorous language that he was expelled for "grossly insulting members of Penobscot Lodge."

It is probable that the Lodge meetings were held in Dexter the next year after permission was given, but as will appear later, no meetings of this Lodge were ever held in Exeter.



### The Morgan Excitement

The effects of the Morgan event which occurred at Batavia, N. Y., Sept. 1826, were far-reaching and disastrous to the craft. Rejoicing in the situation, Anti-Masons thundered against Free-Masonry in unmeasured terms. Public meetings were held denouncing the order. All kinds of stories were circulated. The excitement was unparalleled. Masonic clergy were dismissed from their pulpits and Masonic meetings disturbed and prevented.

Since Gov. Clinton of N. Y. and President Jackson were both Masons, politicians took advantage of the fact and an Anti-Masonic party was formed which tended to keep up the excitement. In 1830 more than 130 Anti-Masonic papers were published. The Anti-Masonic vote in 1832 in New York alone was 156,672.

Although the excitement was greatest in New York state, its effects were felt all over the country. Many weak brothers repudiated their vows and the faithful could meet only in secret, often in the woods or a hidden garret. In Vermont not a single lodge continued its work.

"In Maine the Grand Lodge failed to meet for several years and had merely nominal meetings in others. The Grand Lodge from 1834 to 1843 met annually, but once without a representative from a single lodge, and had rep-

representatives but twice during that time from more than four lodges. Indeed, almost all the lodges suspended their meetings and became dormant, even if they did not surrender their charters." (History of Free-Masonry).

Penobscot lodge suffered with the others. In 1830 and 1831 little work was done. The last record on the Treasurer's book at this period, Jan. 24, 1832, records the payment of thirteen cents, postage on a letter,

Feb. 23, 1833, David Shepherd of the 7th Masonic District reported: "Two years ago I attempted to get returns from Mosaic, Penobscot, and Meridan Splendor Lodges without visiting them but failed to get them in time to make return to the Grand Lodge, and two (Mosaic and Meridan Splendor) altogether . . . . . Feb. 20, 1833 . . . . . I called on the Secretary of Penobscot Lodge, the Master living at a distance, and found the members were so scattered that they had had but one meeting since my visit last year, which is also very much the case of other lodges in the District; their meetings are rare and but thinly attended."

(Grand Lodge Report, Vol. 1., p 255)

Jan. 12, 1835, David Shepherd, D. D. G. M. reported no returns from lodges in his district. (Grand Lodge Report, Vol. 1, p 266)

As the excitement over the Morgan affair died out, the lodges in the state gradually resumed their labors. Although it is probable that Penobscot lodge met from time to time, we have no record of any regular work until 1843 when the following officers were reported:

Since most of the members of the Lodge at this time lived in Dexter a growing desire to have the Lodge permanently located in this place resulted in the following petition:

Dexter, Dec. 23, 1844

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of the State of Maine:

The undersigned petitioners, being Free and Accepted Masons and members of the Penobscot Lodge, for and in behalf of and in accordance with a vote of said Lodge should respectfully represent that at the annual communication of the Grand Lodge in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty, leave was granted the Penobscot Lodge to remove from Garland and to hold their meetings alternately one year at Dexter and the next year at Exeter. That soon after, for causes well known to the craft, the meetings of the Lodge were discontinued and were not resumed until within about one year. Consequently no meetings have been held at Exeter, no provision has ever been made for a room for their accommodations at Exeter, there are now remaining but few members in Exeter. Most of the members live in, and in the vicinity of, Dexter. Furthermore, that the brethren in Exeter do not desire that it should be removed to that place, holding that it will be for the interest of the craft and the accommodation of the brethren that it should be permanently located at Dexter. We therefore pray that the Grand Lodge at its present session would grant leave to the Penobscot Lodge to remain permanently located at Dexter and as in duty bound will ever pray.

Jan. 16, 1845, the committee to whom the above petition was referred having reported that the prayer of the petitioners should be granted, the Grand Lodge so voted. Since which time all the regular communications of Penobscot Lodge have been held in Dexter.

During this period of reconstruction, from 1843-1846, Simon Foss of Dexter was D. D. G. M. of the 7th District. He was much interested in Masonry and did much to awaken and reorganize the dormant lodges in this part of the state. June 1, 1846, he reported that he had made a settlement with the lodges in his district. Dexter's share

of the funds remitted was \$24. His successor, Joseph Prescott of Garland, who continued the good work, was also a member of Penobscot Lodge.







### Homes and Abiding Places of Penobscot Lodge

Before Penobscot Lodge was duly chartered the members met, probably under a dispensation, in Squire Wheeler's barn in Garland near the present site of Fred Wood's residence. After organization they met in Wm. Godwin's (or Godin's) tavern just west of Garland village opposite Maple Grove cemetery. When they moved to Dexter, about 1830, they occupied a room in Green's tavern on Upper Main street. This building is now the residence of James Leighton on the Charleston road. It formerly stood on the present site of Chas. Hutchinson's residence.

In 1847 they moved into and dedicated their new hall in the Folsom block situated on the east side of Main street, about where Harry Hale's store now stands. This building was burned in 1850 and the lodge lost all its furniture, clothing, jewels, etc. Fortunately the records were saved.

After this the Masons met successively in Dustin's hall, the Ireland block, and Good Templars hall. In 1876 they moved into and dedicated their present hall which they enjoyed undisturbed until the fire of Jan. 17, 1896. This fire burned most of their furniture and furnishings but, worst of all, the secretary's records were also destroyed. The Odd Fellows very kindly gave the Masons the use of Odd Fellows hall until repairs could be made. Penobscot Lodge

then returned to its own hall which it has occupied ever since—a total of 46 years in the same hall.

### Notable Service

To run smoothly and efficiently a lodge depends in a great measure upon its secretary's punctuality, accuracy, and general knowledge of lodge affairs. From the first Penobscot lodge has been peculiarly fortunate in the choice of its secretaries. Three men have had charge of its books for sixty years. In 1863 Newell Bates was made secretary and again in 1865 and each successive year until he had completed a full score of years. Then Andrew H. Knight gave ten years of efficient service. But in length of service, at least, Charles S. Hutchinson, our present secretary, is the peer of them all. He is now completing his thirtieth year of faithful and devoted service. Seldom has he ever been tardy or absent at any special or stated meeting.

Brother Hutchinson was born in Atkinson, Jan. 17, 1855. He received his education at Foxcroft Academy and Dexter High school. He married Alice L. Buxton of Dexter and engaged in the furniture and undertaking business in that town. He is a member of St. John's R. A. Chapter (of which he has been secretary seventeen years) of St. John's Commandery, Bangor, and of the Mystic Shrine, Bangor. Brother Hutchinson says when he has completed his full thirty years of service he will then be ready to surrender the books to a younger man.

### Charities and Donations

We have made no mention for several reasons of lodge donations to poor and needy brethren, their widows and orphans. The lodge is not an insurance company. The usages of the order forbid the helping of those who are pecuniarily able to help themselves. It also forbids its members from proclaiming through the press or otherwise their benefits and donations.

Nevertheless, the benevolences of the lodge are many. It plans to take good care of its sick and needy, and one-

third of all dues received is set aside as a special fund for that purpose.

### Conclusion

Since the organization of Penobscot Lodge the names of nearly seven hundred members have been enrolled on its books. These men came from all walks of life and represent the best manhood of Dexter and vicinity. Their lives and their influence have in a great measure moulded the industrial, civic and religious life of the community. It is interesting to contemplate how much these men have contributed to its history and development, and how barren would be that history could their lives and activities be eliminated from it.

Of these seven hundred members, about one-third have joined within the last twenty-five years. Most of the others have paid the common debt of nature. They have left us a glorious heritage of high ideals, noble example and great achievements under adverse conditions. It will be our shame and our sorrow if we do not live up to the high standard set by them of pure Masonry and loyal citizenship.

## PAST MASTERS OF PENOBSCOT LODGE

NO. 39, F. & A. M.

### I.

#### William Hoyt, 1822

William Hoyt was born in Hopkinton, N. H., in 1782. In 1816 he moved from Bradford, N. H., to Ripley, Maine, on to the farm recently owned by his grandson, the late William Hoyt. For several years after coming to Ripley he worked at surveying, assisting his brother, Stephen Hoyt, in lotting out several towns, including Ripley.

Brother Hoyt was twice married; his first wife was Betsey Barnes; his second, Abigail Brown. He had two children, Elisha B. and William P. Hoyt.

Brother Hoyt helped organize the Universalist church of Dexter and was a member of its first parish committee.

He was much interested in Masonry. Before Penobscot Lodge was organized he frequently rode to Bangor on horseback, following a spotted line through the woods, to attend meetings of the order.

The story is told of him that one evening while riding to attend a meeting of his own lodge in Garland, his horse, frightened at some wild animal in the bushes, bolted, threw his rider, and galloped home. Brother Hoyt picked himself up unhurt and finding he was nearer the lodge room than home decided to go on. He attended the lodge meeting, walked home, and stabled his horse before any one had wakened to be alarmed at the riderless steed.

Brother Hoyt died in 1862 and was buried in the Rodgers burial ground in Ripley.

## II

**Ephraim Currier, 1823, '24**

Ephraim Currier was one of the first to join Penobscot Lodge and was the first Senior Warden elected. He served two terms as Worshipful Master. He is said to have been a good man and a true Mason. Little else can be learned about him at this time.

## III

**Leonard Lealand, 1825**

Leonard Lealand served two terms as Senior Warden and one term as Worshipful Master. Besides this nothing authentic can be learned of him. John W. Leland of Sangerville writes us: "We have looked up our family and find none of the name of Leonard in Sangerville, but did find one of that name in Eden about 1825, and that he married a woman from Penobscot county, and they had two children." In the short time at our disposal we have been unable to ascertain if this man and the master of Penobscot Lodge were identical.

## IV

**Joseph Kelsey, 1826**

Joseph Kelsey was born in Shirley, Mass. July 24, 1784. He moved to Guilford about 1815. He was one of the charter members of Penobscot Lodge and was always its ardent supporter.

Brother Kelsey was prominent in civic matters. He signed the application for the first town meeting in Guilford. He was elected moderator of that meeting and was the first town treasurer. He was selectman and treasurer for many years, was a member of the Constitutional convention of Maine in 1819, represented his district in the Maine House of Representatives in 1820-30 and in 1845, and was a member of the State Senate in 1825 and 1836.

He was twice County Commissioner, was Indian Agent

and Postmaster. He was a friend and trustee of Foxcroft academy.

He moved to Foxcroft, and died there July 16, 1861 universally loved and respected.

## V

### **Joseph Prescott, 1827, '28, '43, '44, '45**

Joseph Prescott moved to Garland in 1822. He was a carpenter and many houses in that town are evidence of his skill as a builder. He was prominent in town affairs and held frequent office. He was nine times moderator. That he stood high as a Mason and in the opinion of his associates is shown by the fact that he was five times master of his lodge and was twice D. D. G. M. It is claimed for him, also, that he was Master during the time the lodge was inactive, 1833-'43, making fifteen years in all, a longer time, probably, than any other Master has served in Maine. He died March 6, 1849.

## VI

### **Isaac Wheeler, 1829**

Isaac Wheeler came from Rutland, Mass., and settled in Garland in 1802. He was a justice of the peace and one of the most prominent citizens of Garland. He was chairman of the board of selectmen for years. The first town meeting was held in his house near the present site of the residence of Fred Wood. He built the first store in Garland. He signed the temperance pledge in 1828. The first meetings of the members of Penobscot Lodge were held in his barn.

## VII

### **Rev. William Frost, 1830, '31, '32**

Rev. William Frost came to Dexter and settled on a small farm beyond Bement Hill. He was the first pastor of the First Universalist Church which was organized in Dexter Sept. 27, 1828. For several years before his church was

built and dedicated in Oct. 1829, he held meetings in the schoolhouses. He was a Past Master of Mosaic Lodge and was probably affiliated with Penobscot Lodge soon after it moved from Garland to Dexter. Father Frost was held in high esteem by the Universalist denomination. "A man of gentle manners, full of the spirit of the gospel, he planted well the seeds of Universalism." He often compelled his youngest daughter, a roguish child, to sit up in the pulpit with him.

### VIII

#### Lysander Cutler, 1846, '53

Lysander Cutler was born Feb. 16, 1807. He came to Dexter from Royalston, Mass. in 1828 and became a partner in the firm of Amos Abbott Co. Later, with Farrar, he built a woolen mill which was burned. He immediately built the Stone Mill and began to operate it in 1848. He was a public spirited man and was influential in building the school and town house on school street.

He organized the Dexter Rifle Co. and was elected its Captain in 1835. Later he was elected Colonel of the Ninth Regiment.

He went to Milwaukee, Wis., where he engaged in the corn and grain business. When the Civil War broke out he went to the front as Colonel of the Sixth Wisconsin Regiment. He was twice wounded. He rose to the rank of Brigadier General. He died in Milwaukee, July 1, 1866.

### IX

#### George Fitzgerald, 1847, '52

George Fitzgerald was a prominent Mason and did much for the unbuilding of Free Masonry in this community. He married Miss Eunice Hook of Dexter by whom he had seven children.

Brother Fitzgerald was a machinist by trade and the first one to take up that branch of business in Dexter. He was a supporter of the Universalist church. He died Jan. 1, 1858.

## X

**Simon Foss, 1848**

Simon Foss, son of Obed and Mary (Bradbury) Foss, was born in Hollis, Sept. 9, 1802, and was educated in the public schools of that town. He was interested in the woolen mills at Salmon Falls, N. H. Coming to Dexter by stage, he was so pleased with the water power he went to work among the stumps to build a dam. He began a mill, the Foss, Abbott Card Co., on the present site of the Amos Abbott Co's mill. Bro. Foss built a little red house near the site of the Universalist church. Later he lived in the two-story white house at the corner of Maple and Pleasant streets.

He married Lucinda Conant by whom he had ten children.

Later he moved to the lower part of the village where he built a mill, said to be the finest in Dexter, the Foss Conant Co. His health failing he moved to Tonic, Ill., where he died March 26, 1856.

In politics, Bro. Foss was a Whig and afterwards an Abolitionist. He was the first man in Dexter to cast an Abolition vote. Liberty Street was named in his honor because of his strong views on the freedom of the slaves.

He was a pillar of the Congregational church, and with Obed and Benj. Foss and Andrew Conant built the Congregational Chapel.

Brother Foss loved children and was universally known as "Uncle Simon."

## XI

**Reuben Flanders, 1849, '57, '63**

Reuben Flanders was born in Cornville, Somerset County, in 1811. He came to Dexter when he was nineteen years old and engaged in the cabinet business being a pioneer in that branch of business in Dexter.

He married Abigail B. Allen of Cambridge and there was born to them five children, all of whom are now dead.

Later he purchased the Knowles mill which he converted into a box mill. In 1856 he invented a machine for making orange and lemon boxes, but he did not patent it. With this machine he cut the first box ever made by machinery in the world. Soon after the war this mill was burned. Bro. Flanders sold out and purchased the mill property at North Dexter where he engaged in the lumber business. He died March 22, 1883.

In politics he was a Whig and later a Republican; in religion he was a Universalist.

## XII

### **George Cutler, 1850, '56.**

George Cutler, brother of Lysander, was born in Dracut, Mass. He moved to Ripley, Maine, where he married Sarah Horn. They had four children. Later he moved to Dexter, where he had charge of the mill business of Farrar & Cutler. At one time he manufactured satinette in a mill near site of the Eldridge shop. At another time he kept hotel.

He was a Republican and represented his class in the legislature.

His religious preferences were Universalist.

## XIII

### **Levi Morgan, 1851.**

Levi Morgan was born in Garland, Jan. 16, 1813. He was educated in the public schools of that town. He married Lucy Potter and they had four children. Bro. Morgan's business was general farming. In politics he was a Republican; in religion, a Free Baptist. He died June 20, 1881.

## XIV

### **Isaac M. Russ, 1854, '60**

Isaac McFarland Russ was born in Camden, Dec. 10, 1814. He came to Dexter with his father at the early age of fourteen. He taught his first school when he was seventeen and continued to teach winters for forty years. He

believed in the old saying of "Spare the rod and spoil the child." Many stories are told of his rigid discipline and his methods of dealing with the bad boy in the hard schools of those days. He served frequently as superintendent of schools and on the school board.

Bro. Russ married Clarissa R. Elder of Dexter by whom he had four children.

Bro. Russ was an operative as well as a speculative Mason and much of his work still standing in Dexter is proof of his ability as a craftsman. In politics he was a Democrat and served in the legislature in 1837. In religion he was a Universalist. He died Nov. 11, 1904, at the advanced age of 89 years and 11 months.

## XV

### **Thomas Brown, 1855**

Thomas Brown is believed to have been a resident of Exeter. He joined the lodge in 1829 and served as Steward Treasurer, Senior Warden, and Worshipful Master. Besides this nothing definite can be learned of him in time for this sketch.

## XVI

### **W. S. Allan, 1856**

Winckworth Sargent Allan was born in Whiting and was educated in the public schools of that town and vicinity. He married Susannah Knowles of Corinna by whom he had five children. He was a contractor and builder. He was also the first Master of Parian lodge of Corinna. He was interested in town affairs and was town assessor for twenty-one consecutive years. In politics he was a Republican and represented his district in the state legislature. In religion he was a Congregationalist.

## XVII

### **William Henry P. Bement, 1859, '70, '87**

William Henry P. Bement was born in Solon, Maine, Sept.

14, 1812, and came to Dexter at the early age of eleven. He married Zylpha Tucker of Dexter and they had seven children, five boys and two girls. Bro. Bement was a carpenter and builder. He also manufactured lodge furniture and made a large part of the furniture for Penobscot Lodge, including the altar now in use. He was a good Mason, well informed in the usages of the order. He was always ready to go to lodge with the boys either at home or out of town up to his last days. He died Jan. 24, 1895.

### XVIII

#### A. H. Billings, 1861, '62, '65

A. H. Billings was a native of Albion, Maine, where he was born Jan. 11, 1827. He married Hannah Dane and they had five children. Brother Billings was a mill man and worked in the card room and as a bookkeeper for the Cutlers. He lived in the house just north of the Methodist parsonage. A prominent Mason. He was a Republican and a Universalist.

### XIX

#### J. W. Barron, 1864, '66

John Wilson Barron was born in Athens about 1838. When he was a small boy his parents moved to Dexter where he attended the public schools. For several years he was employed in the drug store of Dr. John Springall. When the proprietor died he purchased an interest in the business and carried it on under the name of Barron & Springall. When the Dexter Savings Bank was incorporated he was elected treasurer which position he held until his death. He died Feb. 23, 1878.

He was married and had one child, Wilson Barron of Camden, who stands high in Masonic circles and is Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Maine for the ensuing year.

## XX

**John Martin, 1867, '99**

John Martin was born in New Chester, afterwards known as Hill, N. H. He came to Dexter about 1833 and settled in Skimmer Lane where he carried on a farm. He married Melissa Libby of Dexter. They had one adopted daughter. He died Feb. 21, 1913, at an advanced age.

## XXI

**Henry S. Dole, 1868**

Henry S. Dole was born in Lowell, Mass., Oct. 21, 1832, and was educated in the public schools of that city. He came to Dexter in June, 1858, and was employed as a wool sorter in the Stone mill. He married Georgia McClellan of Dexter.

Bro. Dole was an influential man in town. He was a member of the Chapter, and of the Universalist church. He was a director of the Savings Bank, on the Board of Library Trustees, and at one time manager of the Dexter Co-operative store. He was sent as a delegate to the Grand Lodge to ask for a dispensation for De Grey Lodge. He died Apr. 16, 1909.

## XXII

**Daniel Dolloff, Jr., 1869, 1883**

Daniel Dolloff, Jr. was born in Sangerville and educated in its public schools. He married Julia French of that town. He came to Dexter where he was employed as a wool sorter. He was prominent in Masonry, was a member of the Chapter and Commandery, and served several terms as D. D. G. M. He died Nov. 27, 1911.

## XXIII

**Ephraim Gee, 1871, '72, '73**

Ephraim Gee was born in England, March 4, 1834, and came to America when he was five years old. He attended the public schools of Dexter.

Bro. Gee married Angie Lougee of Dover and they had two children. He was a boss spinner and was a valued employe of Amos Abbott Co. for twenty-eight years. Bro. Gee was well known for his honesty and kindness. In religious faith he was a Universalist. He died March 8, 1882.

## XXIV

### Joseph H. Fitzgerald, 1874, '75, '76, '84

Joseph Hook Fitzgerald, brother of George, was born in Dexter, Oct. 31, 1836, in the little old house on Spring street just below the Dexter House. He married Olive Smith of St. Albans and had five children. A machinist by trade, he was at one time master mechanic at the Stone mill. Much of the furniture of Penobscot Lodge was made by him. Among other things he presented the lodge with a marble gavel. This with a copy of the Centennial program and other records will be sealed up June 7, not to be opened for one hundred years.

He moved to Oakland in 1886, and to Old Town in 1889. He was master when the Masons moved into and dedicated their present home in 1876. Writing in 1917 he tells us: "I took my third degree Oct. 14, 1867. The December following I was appointed one of the stewards and held office of some kind until 1876, the third year of my being master." Bro. Fitzgerald was a member of St. John's R. A. Chapter. He was a Universalist. He was one of the best posted Masons of Penobscot Lodge. If he was in town, he was seldom absent from a lodge meeting.

## XXV

### Alton P. Fassett, 1877, '78

Alton P. Fassett was born in Abbot, Maine, in 1849. He moved to Dexter where he lived for years carrying on his trade of blacksmith.

He moved to Oregon, where he still lives, a florist in Spokane. Although a thirty-second degree Mason, he has always retained his interest in his home lodge. He is our oldest living Past Master.

## XXVI

**W. H. Dustin, 1879, '80**

W. H. Dustin was born in Wentworth, N. H., Nov. 30, 1844. He was the son of Nathaniel and Sara (Jumper) Dustin and a lineal descendent of Hannah Dustin of Indian history fame. Bro. Dustin was raised Dec. 9, 1866; exalted Royal Arch Chapter, June 28, 1867; created Knight Templar, Mar. 3, 1873.

He married Emma Cates of Dexter. He was a supporter of the Universalist faith.

## XXVII

**Edwin G. Libby, 1881, '82**

Edwin Greenwood Libby was born in Exeter, June 29, 1844, and was educated in the schools of that town and of Dexter.

He married Mary Catherine Morgan by whom he had two children. He was engaged in farming and was also the proprietor of a lumber and grist mill. He was prominent in town affairs and served on the board of selectmen in Dexter. In 1905 he moved to Rocky Ford, Colorado, where he died Dec. 7, 1908.

## XXVIII

**Willard B. Goff, 1885**

Willard B. Goff was born in Sangerville and educated in the public schools of Parkman and Dexter.

He married Martha Leighton of Cambridge by whom he had two children. Bro. Goff was a carpenter by trade and was seriously injured while at work on the Masonic hall.

## XXIX

**Charles H. Haskell, 1886**

Charles Herbert Haskell was born in Garland, June 12, 1859. He was educated in the public schools of Dexter. He married Annie L. Rounds of Exeter and they had two children.

Bro. Haskell was superintendent of a creamery. He was a good man, square and friendly. He took an active interest in the lodge and the Methodist church until the time of his death. He was a member of St. John's R. A. Chapter. He died Oct. 27, 1914.

### XXX

#### **John B. Haskell, 1888**

John B. Haskell was born in Garland, May 29, 1854, and was educated in the public schools of that town.

He married Christine Nickerson and has two children. Later he moved to Boston, where he still lives engaged in the business of commission merchant. He is a Republican and a Universalist.

### XXXI

#### **Llewellyn J. Blanchard, 1889**

Dr. Llewellyn J. Blanchard was a native of Maine where he was born Nov. 10, 1842. When he was a small boy his parents moved to Michigan and there he lived until the Civil war broke out. Enlisting when he was seventeen years old, he served until the close of the war, being three times promoted. Returning to Bangor he entered a commercial college from which he graduated in 1866. For several years he served as a bookkeeper for a manufacturing concern. Deciding to go to college, he graduated from Dartmouth in 1879 and from the Pennsylvania College of Dental Surgery in 1880. He began the practice of dentistry in Kenduskeag but later moved to Dexter.

He married for his first wife Frances Hodgdon of Kenduskeag. His second wife was Mary J. Goodridge of Dexter. Dr. Blanchard was a Republican. In religion he was a Unitarian. He died Oct. 2, 1902.

### XXXII

#### **Elmer A. Brewster, 1890-91**

Elmer A. Brewster was born in Parkman, Dec. 24, 1854. When he was twenty-one he came to Dexter and engaged

in the meat business. Later he formed a partnership with his brother to carry on a wholesale and retail grocery business under the firm name of Wm. E. Brewster & Co. He married Grace A. Gilman by whom he had three children, George, Hugh and Clara. Besides the local Masonic bodies he was a member of St. John's Commandery and was a noble of Kora Temple. He was D. D. G. M. for two years.

In politics Bro. Brewster was a Republican and represented his district in the state legislature. His religious preferences were Free Baptist.

### XXXIII

#### Owen W. Bridges, 1892, '93

Owen W. Bridges was born in Wales, Maine, April 1, 1836, and was educated in the public schools of Sangerville.

When the war broke out he went to the front as a member of Co. I, 22nd Maine Regiment. He was a member of H. F. Safford Post G. A. R. and usually directed the Memorial Day exercises.

Bro. Bridges was an expert stone worker and for many years was a member of the firm of Morse and Bridges of Dexter. He was interested fraternally and besides the local Masonic bodies was also a member of the Odd Fellow organizations. He was a strong Republican and a Free Baptist. He died in Dexter April 6, 1916.

### XXXIV

#### Alberto P. Bement, 1894, 95

Alberto P. Bement was born in Dexter, June 29, 1858. He married Clara May Curtis of Carroll and there was born to them three sons. He lives in the lower part of the village where he carries on a general business of trucking and farming.

Bro. Bement is a member of the local Masonic bodies and of the Council. He has been Master twice, High Priest twice and representative to the Grand Lodge five times. He is one of those well informed Masons who can work in any

position and can always be depended upon to do it in good shape. He considers it almost a sacred duty to be present at every meeting of the lodge.

In politics he is independent and votes for whom he believes is the best man.

### XXXV

#### **William C. Elder, 1896, '97**

William Corydon Elder was born in Corinna, Feb. 11, 1837, and was educated in the common schools of that town. He married Amanda A. Whitney of Abbot and they had one child which died in infancy.

Bro. Elder was engaged in farming. Later he went to Boston where he ran a restaurant. During the Civil War he enlisted in Co. I, 42nd Mass. Regiment. Returning to Dexter he became proprietor of the Exchange Hotel.

Besides Penobscot Lodge Brother Elder was a member of St. John's R. A. Chapter. He was a Republican and a member of the Free Baptist church. He died Jan. 16, 1910. (?)

### XXXVI

#### **Arthur R. Levenseller, 1900, '01, '02**

Arthur R. Levenseller is a native of Holden, Maine, where he was born Aug. 25, 1866, and was educated in the public schools. He married Bertha E. Clark of Holden. One son was born to them. He moved to Dexter where he is engaged in heavy teaming and road work.

Brother Levenseller has served repeatedly as road commissioner and was Dept. Sheriff for several years. Besides Penobscot Lodge he is a member of St. John's R. A. Chapter. He has the unique distinction of having served as Worshipful Master without previously holding any other office. That the experiment was a success was shown by the renewed interest taken in the lodge and the large amount of work done while he was Master.

Brother Levenseller is a Democrat. His religious preferences are Universalist.

## XXXVII

**Frank M. Howard, 1903, '04.**

Frank M. Howard was born in Dexter, Feb. 11, 1867, and was educated in the public schools of that town. He married Mas Bailey of Dexter and they have two sons.

Bro. Howard is a machinist and is foreman in the Boston Navy Yard. He is a member of all the local Masonic bodies and takes a great interest in the work. He writes that since he has been living in Massachusetts he has done degree work in ten different lodges.

In politics he is a Republican; in religion, a Congregationalist.

## XXXVIII

**Charles H. Thompson, 1902, '06**

Chas. H. Thompson was born in Clarendon, N. B. and was educated in the schools of that town. He was married to (1) Grace E. Young; (2) Winnifred B. Rollins of Dexter, and has one son.

He is an expert machinist.

Besides the Blue Lodge he belongs to St. John's R. A. Chapter and to De Molay Commandery of Skowhegan.

He is a Republican. His religious preferences are Congregationalist.

## XXXIX

**Frank B. Arnold, 1907, '08**

Frank Bradeen Arnold, son of Nathaniel and Wealthy Arnold, was born in Monson, Maine, Oct. 31, 1872. His parents moved to Dexter when he was two years old. He was educated in the schools of that town and of Garland. He planned to enter college and study medicine but sickness in the family prevented. Consequently, he entered the employ of Wm. E. Brewster & Co., grocers, with whom he remained nearly twenty-five years. Later for two years he was the Dexter agent of the Metropolitan Insurance Co.,

resigning to take a position with the Carter Knit Underwear Co. of Needham Heights, Mass.

Besides the local Masonic bodies he is a member of Mt. Moriah Council and of De Molay Commandery. He served as Master of Penobscot Lodge two years, as Worthy Patron of Wassooskeag Chapter, O. E. S., as High Priest of St. John's R. A. Chapter, as D. D. G. M. two years, and as Junior Grand Warden.

He is interested in the schools and has served several years on the School Board.

He was a member of the Free Baptist church while in Dexter but since going to Massachusetts he has united with the Methodist church at Needham Heights where he is president of the Good Fellowship Men's Club.

Besides the local Masonic bodies, Bro. Hale is a member of Mt. Moriah Council of Skowhegan and of St. John's Commandery of Bangor. He is Secretary of the Dexter Trust & Banking Co. and a director of the Merrill Trust Co. of Bangor. He is a Republican and a Universalist.

## XLI

### Albert L. Atkins, 1911.

Albert L. Atkins was born in Corinna, May 4, 1861, and was educated in the public schools of that town and of Dexter. He married L. Blanche Nutter of Dexter and they have one daughter.

Bro. Schoff came to Dexter in 1904 and engaged in the jewelry business. He moved to South Paris in 1917. He is a member of R. A. Chapter and for the last three years has been Chaplain of Paris Lodge, F. & A. M. His religious preference is Methodist. He is a Republican in politics.

## XLIV

**John W. Springall, 1916**

John W. Springall was born in Dexter, Nov. 20, 1858, and was educated in the public schools of that town. He married Jennie H. Campbell of Foxcroft. For several years he was engaged in the drug business but for the last thirty-eight years he has conducted a jewelry business in Dexter. Besides local Masonic bodies he is a member of Mt. Moriah Council and of DeMolay Commandery of Skowhegan.

Because of his ability to work in any position in an able and impressive manner, Brother Springall is frequently called on to fill the chair of an absent officer. He sang in the choir of the Universalist church for twenty-five years and has been a member of the Board of Trustees of that church for more than forty years.

In politics he is a Republican.

## XLV

Walter N. Rowe was born in East Eddington, Oct. 8, 1881, and was educated in the public schools of Holden.

##### **William Boyd, 1919**

He received his education in the public schools of Wallace and the Truro Normal School from which he graduated in 1884. He married Cartherine E. Bro. Boyd is a moulder by trade and has been superintendent of the Fay & Scott foundry since 1904. He is a member of the local Masonic bodies, of Mt. Moriah Council, and of DeMolay Commandery of Skowhegan. He is a Democrat in politics. His religious preferences are Congregationalist.

#### XLVIII

##### **Carl F. Lawrence, 1920**

Carl Francis Lawrence was born in Wilton, N. H., Aug. 7, 1890, where he received his early education. He came to Dexter, where he married Viola E. Widdoes. They have one child. Bro. Lawrence is a machinist. He is a Republican in politics, a Methodist in his religious preferences.

#### XLIX

##### **Charles E. Stone, 1921**

Charles E. Stone was born in Ripley, March 16, 1881. He was educated at Dexter High school and Bryant & Stratton's Business college. He married Alice E. Additon of Ripley. They have two children.

Bro. Stone is superintendent of Fay & Scott's machine shop. He is a member of St. John's R. A. Chapter. His religious preferences are Free Baptist. He is a Republican in politics.

## L

### W. D. Austin, 1922

Willie Dennis Austin is a native of Parkman, where he was born Sept. 20, 1855. There he attended the public schools. Coming to Dexter he married Nellie M. Dexter of that town. He still resides there and is engaged in a teaming and jobbing business.

Besides the local Masonic bodies, he is a member of Mt. Moriah Council and DeMolay Commandery of Skowhegan. He is an independent in politics and a Universalist in religion.

Brother Austin is another one of the old standbys who can always be depended upon to do his full duty. He is the fiftieth Master of Penobscot Lodge. His is the honor of presiding while the lodge celebrates a century of achievement. His also is the honor and the responsibility of guiding the lodge aright as it begins a new era in its history. May the memory of the past and the impetus of a century of good work help to make the new century even better and nobler, more fraternal and more useful than was the last.
