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maintain a "1" average in regular classes and "2" (which is the same as "1" in regular classes) in advanced classes to retain her membership in the Honor Society, which means a lot of "homework".

We have homogeneous grouping in our school system which comprises three different groups or more in each grade. The advanced students are at least one year ahead of the regular students in the same grade. The Remedial Classes give special help to the students who are working below class standards. Paul and Peggy have taken advanced courses in English, Science and Mathematics. We begin homogeneous grouping in the 4th grade in all Roseburg schools. In addition to the grouping, we have Team Teachers, Interns, Teacher Aides, Psychologists, Music Supervisors, Special Education Teachers, Speech Therapists, and believe it or not— classroom teachers and principals. I am classified as an ordinary classroom teacher.

I seem to have wandered from the subject of our family and I still have two to go. Craig and Faythe can pass for twins since they are both the same size. Faythe is 8 and in the 4th grade, Craig is 10 years old and in the 5th grade. Craig is a member of the Pee Wee Football Squad and Faythe is going to start Baton Lessons. Faythe will be 9 in November so she isn't much of a baby any more.

I am teaching my third term in the Roseburg School System in a comparatively new building. It is located on the bank of the Umpqua River with the mountains and evergreen trees in the background. I teach a 4th grade with one fifth grade class during the day. There are around 75 different children who are in my classes during the day. The largest group I've had to instruct at one time was 120 every Friday in the Rhythms Class. One teacher frequently supervises 250 children on the playground in some schools. My biggest problem was 80 students turning out for a tumbling class. I used the public address system and five tumbling mats until I was able to get the class divided. I believe there is still a lot of good to be said for the "one-room" rural school.

We are all kept very busy during the school year but still find a little time for golfing, tennis, deer hunting, sight seeing and football games. During the summer we enjoy picnics, swimming, water skiing, deep sea fishing, riding the sand dunes, scenic rides and baseball games. This winter we plan to try snow skiing. Craig and Faythe tried skiing last year but it looks easier than it is. We went deer hunting last weekend but weren't lucky. We're
