May 18, 1795. "Voted, To each man who shall turn out as a volunteer in the service of the United States, for the term of one year, 12s. bounty, and to make up the wages to \$10 per month." This bounty was paid by the town, to the following persons: Samuel Merriam, Elisha Buss, Ezra

Newell, Aaron Wheeler, Jr., Thomas Robbins, Jr., Joseph Merriam, Jr., Capt. James Wood.

1795. The following persons were paid 12s. each, for bounty, for enlisting as volunteers; Samuel Merriam, Elisha Buss, Ezra Newell, Aaron Wheeler, Jr., Thomas Bobbins, Jr., Joseph Merriam, Jr., Capt. James Wood, James Withee, according to the vote of the town. See page 124.

The water power on the south side of the stream, above the bridge, was first occupied for a blacksmith's shop, in which was a trip hammer. It was carried on by Ezra Newell, for the manufacture of scythes and axes, with other blacksmith work. In this shop, near the commencement of the present century, was put in operation, a machine for the manufacture of cut nails. The business did not succeed, and was soon abandoned. About the year 1813, a wooden building was erected on the site of the old blacksmith shop, for the spinning and weaving of woolen goods, under the direction of Maj. Seth King. This business not succeeding, it was, after a few years, abandoned.

246 Ebenezer (Ebenezer<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Thos.<sup>2</sup> Thos.<sup>1</sup>) born in Lynn 9 Dec, 1725; married in Lynnfield, 25 Dec, 1755, Mary Newhall, perhaps the widow of Elijah<sup>230</sup> Newhall, and daughter of Thomas and Mary (Baker) Cheever. The children enumerated below were all born and baptized in Lynnfield, and nothing more has been learned about them unless, as seems probable, the following gleaned from the Middlesex Co. Probate Files refers to two or three of them, viz.: " Memorial of Elijah Newhall of New Ipswich, Co. of Hillsboro, N. H., that Ezra Newhall, late of Acton Co. of Middlesex, blacksmith, dec'd, within thirty days leaving a widow Eunice Newhall who has requested the memorialist, a brother of dec'd, to undertake administration." Bond of administration dated 13 July, 1815. In a list of debts shown 4 Sept., 1815, appear notes of haud to Elizabeth Newhall deceased, to Hitty Newhall, and to Joseph Newhall.

THE FIRST MERCHANT in Whitefield was WILLIAM DODGE, born in Francestown August 15, 1795. He was the third son of Simeon Dodge, a soldier of the Revolution, who migrated from Beverly, Mass. to Francestown about 1753. The emigrant, William Dodge, came from cheshire, England, to Salem about 1629. He was of old Kentish stock--the only one of the name noticed in Burke.

William came to Whitefield with his newly wedded wife, Eunice Newell, in December 1823. He built and occupied until his death, the house still standing at the north end of the bridge on the river bank upon the east side of Lancaster street. In the south end, next to the bridge, was placed the merchant's "stock in trade," and here, until 1830, was the only store in town. This was the third house built in the village. About 1824 a postoffice and mail facilities were established, and William Dodge received the appointment of postmaster, a position which he held through successive administrations until his death in November 1837. He also for many years carried on the manufacture of pot or pearl ash. The gray old ashery stood upon the river bank in the rear of the house just where the livery stable is now situated. Mr. Dodge was a man of liberal education, and his abilities were early recognized in the conducting of the affairs of the town. He was town clerk for seven consecutive years, was superintendent of "schooling," and represented the town at "General Court" for the years of 1834-35-36, and in all his official course his work was marked by eminent ability and strict integrity. He died at Whitefield at the age of forty-two, in 1837. The children of William and Eunice (Newell) Dodge who lived beyond childhood were Eunice N.; William Franklin, now of the "Mountain View House," in Whitefield, and a well known citizen; Levi W. of Syracuse, N.Y., a writer of some repute, and a local historian of no mean ability; and Henry C., a successful businessman of New York City.

WILLIAM DODGE married Eunice Newell Nov., 20, 1823 in Francestown. The groom was born in Francestown, the son of Simeon Dodge and Mary Balch, both born in Beverly, Mass. The bride was born in Mason, the daughter of Ezra Newell and Eunice Swallow.

He married, second, December 11, 1765, Mary Hall, born March 9, 1746, daughter of Nathan and Mary (Chapman) Hall of Mason. She died August 14, 1822. Four children of first and eleven of second wife, born in Mason.

- i. John, born January 3, 1757; married Rebecca Dunster, born June 18, 1756, daughter of Jason and Rebecca (Cutter) Dunster. He lived in Mason. He died in January, 1830. His wife died, August 3, 1811. Seven children.
- ii. Sarah, born October 2, 1758.

- iv. Deborah, born November 15, 1762; married March 27, 1785, Noah Winship.
- v. Mollie, born December 14, 1766; married October 22, 1786, Samuel Green.
