Carmel, Ind. - Former Elkhart resident John J. GAVIN, 77, died of natural causes Wednesday (April 5, 2000) at Sister Elizabeth Ann Seton Hospital in Carmel.

He was born on Oct. 21, 1922, in New Brunswick, N.J. to John J. and Mildred (DONAHUE) GAVIN. He married Shirley FIEGER in May 1945 in LeMans, France.

Surviving are his wife; three daughters, Mary Beth BARNBY, Judy JONES, and Peggy CONDON; six sons, Michael, Terry, Christopher, John J. III, Lt. Col. Timothy, and Paul; a sister, Betty LYNCH; and two brothers Robert and the Rev. William; 26 grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

An immunologist and microbiologist, he received a bachelor's degree in 1949, a master's degree in 1950, and a doctoral degree in 1964, all from Rutgers University. during a 40-year career, he lived in Elkhart from 1971 to 1980 while working for Miles Laboratories, Inc. He was director of allergy research at Miles.

He obtained several patents during his career and was a member of numerous professional organizations, including being a fellow in the American Academy of Microbiology and the American Institute of Chemists.

He also belonged to American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Chemical Society, New York Academy of Sciences, and a number of others.

His activities also including advocating for people with disabilities. Gavin became deaf at age 34 as a result of a drug interaction.

He worked on the President's Committee for the Handicapped and in 1979 was chosen Handicapped Hoosier of the Year.

John (Pa) Harkins, 81, One of the Oldest Big League Stars, Dies at His Home Here

Succumbs to Heart Attack; Was Former Alderman And Court Aide

Big League Diamond Star of 80's, Also Coached Yale and Princeton

John (Pa) Harkins, 81, one of the country's big league baseball stars of a half century ago, died at his home, *70 Easton avenue*, late yesterday afternoon. Harkins was ill for the past five years but was not confined to his home until the past year.

Harkins retired as sergeant-at-arms of the New Brunswick District Court three years ago because of failing health. He suffered from recurring heart attacks in the past year but on each occasion rallied.

Late yesterday afternoon Harkins suffered another attack which resulted in his death.

Harkins was employed as sergeant-at-arms approximately 25 years. He succeeded the late Michael Casey. Prior to his appointment, Harkins was a member of the common council when New Brunswick was governed under the aldermanic system.

Harkins operated cafes in New Brunswick and New Market before his appointment to

the district court job. He conducted a cafe at the corner of Albany and Spring streets for many years and was also in business on Easton avenue.

Besides his wife Elizabeth, he is survived by the following children: James, John, Leo, Charles, Eugene and Francis, all of this city, Robert of Bound Brook, Clement of Basking Ridge, and one daughter, Miss Betty Harkins of this city.

Also his two brothers, William F. Harkins of this city and Charles A. Harkins of New York; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Maher, Mrs. Angela Maroney and Miss Loretto Harkins all of New York City.

The funeral will be held on Thursday morning at 8:30 o'clock at his home and at St. Peter's Church at 9 o'clock. The arrangements are in charge [sentence ends here unfinished]

Life Time Sixth Warder

Harkins, known as "Stebbs" to his legion of friends, was a Sixth warder all his life, being born near the present site of St. Peter's Hospital, where he first played baseball. In those early years as a youngster he played haphazardly in pick-up games, concentrating on no one position, although he later made his big league reputation as a pitcher.

More than 60 years ago, "Pa" played with the Unions and Eagles, outstanding local teams.

His development as a pitcher came through an accident and it was years more before he was definitely established as a hurler. As a teen age youth he was attending a game in Elizabeth when he was asked to take the mound for a pitcher who failed to put in appearance. The game ended in a tie and from that time on, "Pa" became a regular hurler.

After his pitching start, "Pa" continued to play every position until he entered Rutgers University as a special chemistry student. He hurled against a Trenton semi-pro team during this time and was signed by them in 1881 to replace a blacklisted National Leaguer.

With Trenton

Two years later Trenton entered the Inter-State League which meant prominence for the players. In 1884, Harkins was sold to Cleveland of the old National League and thus he became the first and only New Brunswicker ever to become a regular in the majors.

Harkins, pitching at a time when gloves and masks were unheard of, and when a batter did not receive free transportation to first base until the pitcher threw nine balls, made his big league debut with the Cleveland Blues under Manager J. Ford Evans in 1884.

When Cleveland dropped out of the National League the following year, Harkins joined the Brooklyn club and was its ace pitcher through 1885-86-87. He pitched every other day, and when not active on the mound 'rested up' by playing first base or the outfield. He always had a place in the lineup because of his good hitting.

Returns Home

In 1888 Harkins was traded to Baltimore and he retired midway in that season to return home to New Brunswick to open a tavern.

Extremely popular in and about this city, Somerville, Plainfield, Elizabeth and Trenton, where he often appeared in semi-pro games, he figured he could make a more profitable living in business and pitching for town teams than as a regular in the big leagues. That, of course, was long before the days of fabulous major league salaries.

Joe Page, 75-year-old newspaperman of Montreal, Canada, who had occasion to write about Harkins in a recent issue of "The St. Louis Sporting News", recalls the New Brunswick pitcher as being one of the best in the game in the early 80s'.

Famous Battery

While at Cleveland Harkins was the pitching end of the famous Harkins and Buschong battery, a team that carried the forerunners of the present Indians to many a victory.

A Cleveland Herald clipping of June 18, 1884, attests to his ability as a pitcher. It reads:

"Cleveland played on Monday with Harkins and Buschong as the battery. No better exists today. The young Jerseyman pitched with even better success than on Monday and his field support was perfect as the Blues beat Chicago, 4 to 1. Chicago was held to five hits while Cleveland got 12, two of which were made by Harkins."

When Harkins retired the famous Baltimore Orioles Club of the early 90's was in the process of formation. He antedated John McGraw, Wilbert Robinson, Wee Willie Keeler and others of that ilk who became famous with the Orioles managed by Ned Hanlon.

Played with 'Immortals'

Harkins' contemporaries on the major league mounds of that era included Tommy Bond, "father of modern pitching" who one season won 31 of 41 games for Boston; Charlie Sweeney of Providence, first to pitch the "fadeaway"; Tim Keefe, great New York pitcher, John Clarkson of Chicago and Boston; Charles (Old Hoss) Radbourne, who in 1884 won 60 games for Providence and Arthur Cummings, reputed to be the first pitcher to throw a curve.

In his day Harkins pitched against such diamond immortals as Mike (King) Kelly, Cap Anson, Dan Brouthers, Al Spalding, Charley Comiskey, Buck Ewing and Sid Farrar, among a host of others.

During his sojourn in the majors, Harkins doubled as a college coach, serving in an advisory capacity at Yale, Princeton and Lehigh.

Coached Stagg

While at Yale one of Harkins' pupils was Alonzo A. Stagg, then regarded as the outstanding collegiate pitcher in the United States.

Stagg, who later became famous as football coach and athletic director at the

University of Chicago where he served for half-a-century before moving on to Pacific University where he is still active as head football coach, has credited Harkins with being largely instrumental in developing his baseball talent at Yale.

When Harkins took baseball command at Yale, Stagg was listed as a third baseman. The local man persuaded him to try his hand at pitching and in that capacity Stagg attained spectacular success.

Harkins and Stagg, friends for more than 50 years, last met about 1922 when Stagg brought his University of Chicago team to Princeton. Although on the eve of the most important game of the Chicago schedule, Stagg spent several hours with Harkins in Trenton talking about old times.

Saw Last Game in '36

"Pa" saw his last major league game in 1936 when he attended the All-Star classic at the Polo Grounds in New York City. There he marvelled at the pitching of Carl Hubbell, Dizzy Dean and Lefty Gomez and the batting prowess of Jimmy Foxx, Lou Gehrig and Joe Medwick.

Harkins, on that occasion, commented: "Yes, there's been a big change since my day. And one of those boys down there (pointing to the members of the two teams) probably is paid more than was our entire team. And the crowds nowadays are different. Here there are 50,000. When we played before 5,000 we were performing for an 'enormous throng!'"

Local Athlete,
Dies of Injury

Injuries he sustained in a football game at Freehold on Sunday resulted in the death of Vernon Slover, 22, popular local sports figure and formerly a three letter athlete at the Harold G. Hoffman High School, at two o'clock yesterday morning. Death came after an emergency operation at the Memorial Hospital for a kidney injury. The same grit and courage which made him a star athlete made him put up a valiant fight against the grim reaper, but the serious nature of the injury made recovery an impossibility.

Slover graduated from the Hoffman High School in the Class of 1933. While a student at the *John Street* institution he was a star performer with the baseball, football and basketball teams and was regarded as one of the outstanding schoolboy athletes in this section.

Following his graduation from his school athletic activities he was a prominent member of the Tiger A.C. local sporting club. He was one of the outstanding players on the entire team, pitching the baseball 9 to a large number of victories and generally regarded as one of the most valuable plays in the local City League.

Slover played the entire game on Sunday and paid little attention to his injuries until Monday, when his condition grew worse and he was removed to the hospital for observation.

Funeral services will be held on Saturday afternoon at three o'clock from his Bordentown Avenue home with the Rev. Harry Stansbury Weyrich, rector of Christ Episcopal Church officiating. Interment will be in the Christ Church Cemetery.

Slover is survived by his father, Walter, two sisters, Mrs. Mabel Cosgrove of Point Pleasant and Miss Margaret Slover of Plainfield, and his grandmother, Mrs. A.H. Slover of this city.
