1. Teachers will be examined in Spelling, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, English Grammar and Geography. If a candidate is unknown to the Examiners, a written recommendation of good moral character shall be required.

2. We recommend the use of Webster's and Cobb's Spelling Books, Murray's and Kirkham's Grammars, Adams', Dabell's and Pike's Arithmetic, and Woodbury's Geography.

May 4, 1830

3. No applicant will receive a certificate without understanding Arithmetic so far as to include the Rule of Three.
4. No candidate can have been refused a certificate by an Examiner 4 months previous to being admitted to examination.
5. Wm. L. Perkins Lewis Dille, and J. Gillet will draft an address to the citizens of the county based on the foregoing resolutions.

During the last war, at the age of 19, he enlisted in the Rangers, a Corp of mounted men raised expressly for the protection of the western frontiers. On Aug. 30, 1814, he was one of a party of 12 men under the command of Lieut. Journey who were posted at Hill's station about 8 miles south of Greenville (Illinois). They had ridden out after seeing Indian sign on the morning of Aug. 31, and were ambushed by Indians, to the number of 70 or 80. Four of the Ranger party were killed, among them Lieut. Journey. The rest fled, except for Higgins. Under cover of the smoke hanging in the air from the guns, Higgins fired at some Indians who had not seen him, as he turned to mount his horse and leave, someone called to him and it was one of the Rangers, named Burgess. His leg was smashed to pieces. As he approached his horse to put the wounded man on, the horse took off in fright. He told Burgess to crawl to the high grass and he would stay between him and the Indians and keep them off. He distracted three Indians from his friend and ended up being shot four times and stabbed with spears. He fought them until help arrived from the Ranger station. (Describes his fight and rescue.)

In the appendix to Mr. Campbell’s “Annals of Tryon County” we find the following document,
Extract of a letter from Captain Courish of the New England Militia, dated March 7, 1782.

The Militia took possession of eight packages from the Seneca Indians in one of their expeditions. A letter accompanied the packages that were sent by them as a present to Col. Hinman, Gov. of Canada in order to be forwarded by him to England.

In the letter each package is numbered and explained. No. 1 contained 43 scalps of soldiers and 52 scalps of farmers killed. Each scalp is stretched on a hoop, four inches in diameter, and the inside skin painted a color to depict if they were killed in day or night and with bullet, ax, or knife.

No. 2 contained the scalps of 98 farmers

No. 3 contained the scalps of 97 farmers

No. 4 contained the scalps of 102 farmers; 18 were marked with a little yellow flame to denote their being of prisoners burnt alive, after being scalped and their nails pulled out by the root

No. 5 contained 88 scalps of women, hair long and braided in the Indian fashion to show they were mothers

No. 6 contained 193 boy’s scalps of various ages

No. 7 contained 211 girls’ scalps, big and little

No. 8 contained a mixture of all varieties and a box of birch bark with 29 little infants’ scalps

The Chiefs asked the father to send these presents across the sea to the Great King so that he can see their faithfulness in destroying their enemies.

They expect the Great King to give them another country as the enemies grow great in number and have driven them out of their country for taking part in your quarrel.

We know you will send us powder and guns and knives and hatchets; but we also want shirts and blankets. Letter was written by James Crauford for the Indian chiefs.

p. 4 col. 1 An Ordinance Regulating the Town of Painesville

Be it ordained and established by the Town Council of the Town of Painesville:

1. Town council members will be elected in May and the term will be for one year.
2. The Treasurer will have charge of all monies paid into the treasury of the town and keep a book with the names of persons from whom received or to whom paid.
3. The duty of the Marshall, who may call to his aid one or both of the street supervisors, to maintain and enforce the by-laws, to suppress riots and disturbances, to abate and remove nuisances, collect all taxes that may be levied and all fines and penalties that may be imposed and to pay the same to the treasury.
4. Street Commissioners shall remove or cause to be removed all obstructions on the sidewalks, roads, streets, lanes, alley and common of the town, will superintend the construction of sidewalks, the erection of shade trees, and the erection of the front fences of the lots in the town, and have the power to enter any lot with a view to the removal of any nuisance that shall render the air, noxious offensive and unwholesome and may request the owner to remove such nuisance or be fined..
5. The street supervisors shall aid the marshal and street commissioners in impounding any swine found running at large and notify the owner within 12 hours of the impounding.

6. The owner of any swine who run at large will pay a fine of 12 and a half cents. If no one claims the impounded swine, they will be sold.

7. If the owner of the impounded swine is notified and does not pay the fine, the swine will be sold.

8. A person, who obstructs a sidewalk, and does not remove the obstruction within six hours after notice will be fined from \$1 to \$5.

9. A tax is hereby levied on the aggregate amount of taxable property within the town of one eighth of one per centum.

10. Any person playing ball, beat, knock, or drive any ball or hoop, or raise or fly any kite, or shall throw or fire any cracker or fire ball, or play any other game in the public street in the town to the annoyance and disturbance of the citizens or travelers, or the peace and quiet of the town, shall pay a sum of \$1 to \$5. The Marshal is to arrest anyone violating this ordinance.

11. In the absence of the Mayor, the Recorder has the authority to call a meeting of the town council.

12. Owners of dogs that run at large in town shall pay a fine of \$1 to \$5. Moreover, it shall be lawful for any person in the town to kill and destroy any dog found running at large, and it is the special duty of the Marshal, the street commissioner and the street supervisors to destroy and kill any dog running at large. The Mayor or Recorder are also authorized to cause any dog to be killed if represented to be dangerous to the community.

13. Each officer of the town before entering upon the duty of his office will take an oath. The town marshal and the treasurer shall each give a bond of \$200. Lemuel G. Storrs, Mayor; Addison Hills, Recorder

Indian Treaties - On the 16th ult., a treaty was signed with the Winnebago Indians by which they cede to the United States all the lands south and east of the Wisconsin and the Fox river of Green Bay, amounting to nearly 5,000,000 acres for which they are to receive an annuity of \$10,000 for 27 yrs. A school will be established for them and they will be provided with agricultural implements. They are granted a tract of country called the "Neutral Ground," extending 40 miles along the west bank of the Mississippi and running back 76 miles. They are to give up 9 of their warriors who stand charged with murdering unoffending white citizens. A treaty was also concluded with the Sac and Fox Indians, who also ceded land. They will receive an annuity for \$20,000 for 30 yrs. and a blacksmith shop will be maintained among them. Black Hawk and other Chiefs are to be detained as hostages for the good conduct of their followers.

from Sillimans Scientific Journal regarding an experiment on a large rattlesnake in the northern part of the state of Ohio where rattlesnakes are said to be very large and numerous. The experiment was made about 30 yrs. ago by Judge Woodruff in order to test the accuracy of the prevailing notion among the people that the leaves of the White Ash were highly offensive to the rattlesnake and this horrid reptile was never found on the land where the White Ash grows. It is the uniform practice among the hunters who travel the forest in the summer to stuff their boots and shoes and pockets with the white ash leaves for the purpose of securing themselves against the bite of the rattlesnake. It is said that no person was ever bitten who resorted to this precaution. The account given by Judge Woodruff tells of him hunting with a small party who went to the Mahoning River to hunt deer. The party positioned themselves upon an elevated spot 15 or 20 yards from the river. From here, they saw a large rattlesnake, that crawled out from the rocks beneath the men, made its way towards the river. The men decided to try the effect of the ash leaves. A search turned up a small white ash sapling and another sapling of sugar maple was cut. The Judge came up from the rear to the snake and when the snake got coiled and ready to fight, the Judge place the leaves upon the snake. The snake uncoiled and rolled over on his back and appeared to be in great agony. The white ash was taken away and the sugar maple stick was used next, which the snake attacked. Then the Judge presented the white ash sapling again and the snake again writhed his body in the same manner as the first time.

From the Missouri *Republican*, St. Louis, Aug. 9th
Very extraordinary proceedings have taken place in Jackson Co., this state, against the sect of fanatics called Mormons. Banished as they are

now from that frontier, it may well be asked to what place they now remove.

A meeting of the citizens of Jackson Co. was held in Independence on July 20th. Their object was to take measures to rid themselves of the Mormonites. Col. Richard Simpson was called to the Chair and Jones H. Flournoy and Samuel D. Lucas appointed Secretaries. A committee was then appointed to report and address the public in relation to the object of the meeting.

They represent that the Mormons number 1,200 souls in that county. The citizens are daily told they are to be cut off and their lands appropriated to the Mormons for inheritances; but they are not fully agreed on how this is to be accomplished, whether by the destroying angel, the judgement of God, or the arm of power. The committee express their fears that should this population continue to increase, they will soon have all the offices of the county in their hands and that the lives and property of other citizens would be insecure.

They declared:

1. No Mormon shall in the future move and settle in this county.
2. Those now here need to give a definite pledge of their intention to move out of the county and they will remain unmolested.
3. That the editor of the *Star* be required to close his office and discontinue printing in this county.
4. The Mormon leaders here are required to use their influence to prevent any further emigration of their brethren to this county.
5. Those who fail to comply with those requisitions be referred to those of their brethren who have the gifts of divination and of unknown tongues to inform them of the lot that awaits them.

I was called from my bed at 5 o'clock this morning and told "It's raining fire. Looking out the window, I saw the whole firmament constantly and splendidly illuminated by a succession of falling meteors, or luminous bodies.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 15th

Houses and property were destroyed and the Elders of the Church severely whipped by the mob, under cover of night. As yet, our intelligence is not very accurate, or full, in regard to the measures taken by the officers of the county to suppress this rebellion as it may properly be called. There may be many worthless and intolerable members of the obnoxious sect; but the laws are equal to the punishment of all whose who are guilty of violating them. The Mormons are as much protected in their religion, their property, and persons, as any other denomination or class of men.

Reports that all the male members of the sect had been murdered seem to have been put in circulation by the Mormons themselves and through the same channel we learn that there were but two or three lives lost on either side. He was immediately offered a command in the continental army but declined, and raised and equipped a body of men at his own expense entering the service as a volunteer. He lived in the family of the commander-in-chief. He was

appointed Major General in July and in Sept. was wounded at Brandywine. In Jan., 1779, he returned to France. Upon his return to America, he received command of 2,000 men which he clothed and equipped in part at his own expense. His forces marched to Virginia in Dec., 1780.

The Mormons in Missouri expect a reinforcement from the state of Ohio and are informed that small parties arrive almost every day. As soon as they all arrive, they intend to call upon the Governor to reinstate them on their lands in Jackson, and if molested are determined to defend themselves, sword in hand. We are advised they will be able to muster 700 strong.

The people of Jackson are also making preparations and at a meeting elected Samuel C. Owens, their commander-in-chief. They have received a letter from the Governor asking them to affect a compromise, if possible, by purchasing the lands from the Mormons and paying them for the injuries they have sustained. Hannah Duston should be ranked among the heroines of antiquity. She was the wife of Thomas Duston, of Haverhill, in Massachusetts, born in the year 1659, and married in 1677. She had altogether 13 children. When they attacked Haverhill on March 15th, 1697, she was confined to her bed with an infant only a week old. Her husband catching the alarm, fled from the field to the house and consulted his wife on the course he should pursue. She calmly told him to leave her and the infant to their fate and to make his escape, if possible, with her other children. He got seven children on a path through the woods to the garrison. Mrs. Duston, the baby, and Mary Neif, her nurse, were taken prisoner. The Indians found the infant troublesome and killed it. After this outrage, Mrs. Duston wept no more and planned revenge. Eventually, while camping about 75 miles from where they started, she took a hatchet and snuck out of the wigwam and killed 10 Indians, each with a single blow of the hatchet, one at a time. In order for people to believe her, she took their scalps. She

Several methods of drying unripe corn for winter use are recommended. The worst is to boil the corn and then cut it from the cob. A far better plan is that adopted by the Indians of Lake Michigan who roast corn in a sand bath heated by a fire which they make on a bed of soft sand, into which the ears are plunged. After being roasted in this way, it is removed from the cob and kept in sacks for winter use. A still better way is to roast the corn in an oven as much as you would do for immediate use. Corn dried this way may be kept for years. When boiled for at least 12 hours, it is as tender and soft as green corn.

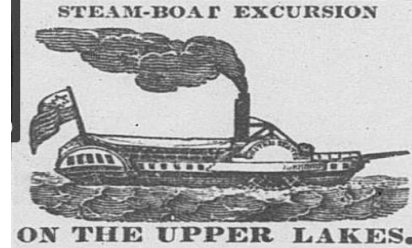

From the West there is intelligence of hostilities between the aboriginals of the prairies and the traders and emigrant Indians.

From a letter "Near Fort Gibson, A. T. March 14, 1836"

Gen. Arbuckle received by Express that the Comanches and Pawnees had murdered all the traders at Coffee's Trading House on Red River, in Pawnee country. One man only escaped; he arrived here and described the massacre as dreadful; 50 or 60 Americans and some Creeks and Osages were butchered. There is no doubt that the United States will resent these murders and we will march from here as soon as the grass will admit of our horses living on it. Chili McIntosh, the Creek warrior, swears vengeance against the Pawnees and Comanches and he will no doubt add six or seven hundred warriors to our command.

Michigan Indian Lands

p. 2 col. 3 It is stated in a letter from Washington written by Mr. Schoolcraft and published in a Detroit paper that the negotiations between the government and the Ottawa and Chippewa

Indians were closed on the 28th ult. and a treaty signed by the chiefs of the two tribes by which the U. S. are put in possession of 17,000,000 acres of land 10,000,000 south of the straits of Micilimacinac and 7,000,000 north of them. The Ottawa still retain about 640,000 acres. The Indians are to receive a million and a half dollars besides other provisions benefitting their condition. *Black Rock Advocate*

escaped to Florida. A large force under Gen. Sandford immediately started in pursuit.

On the 25th, 18 miles below Lumpkins, Capt. Jerigan with his command, engaged a body of Indians killing some 25 or 30 with a loss of 3 men killed and 7 wounded. Later they pursued the Indians into the swamps. Upon the Indians giving ground, 40 of their number had fallen and about as many more taken prisoner. The Indians at last account were in the swamp. Capt. Jerigan's loss is stated to be 5 or 6 killed and 11 wounded. "Thus, it will be seen that the war has again broken out, at the very moment when the assurance of men in high authority have induced the country to believe that all was as calm as sunshine."

This Indian princess was a remarkable woman. She was the third wife of the distinguished chief, whose name during the American Revolution carried terror into every border hamlet, who was in her own right, by birth, the head of the great Indian Confederacy of the Six Nations. Hence, on her husband's death in 1807, she needed to name a successor to the head Chieftaincy of the alliance.

Jan. 18, 1838

She named her youngest son, the late John Brant, who died of cholera in 1832. She next appointed an infant grandchild, son of Col. J. William Kerr, who married the youngest daughter of Joseph Brandt. The little fellow is three quarters Mohawk, inheriting white blood from Sir William Johnson, of whom he is the great grandson. She was married to Capt. Joseph Brant in 1780. He took up the hatchet to fight for the British. He was given a gold finger ring with his name, Joseph Brant Thayendanegea engraved on it so in the event of his fall, his body might be known. After the war, he built a mansion at the head of Lake Ontario where he adopted the English style of living. After his death, his wife resumed the Indian style of living.

He inoculated cows with small pox matter and the vesicle produced had every appearance of the vaccine pox. He then inoculated children with the matter taken from the cow, thus artificially infecting them, the result was a genuine vaccine vesicle. The children were then submitted to smallpox disease. In countries where cow pox cannot be procured, now it is only necessary to inoculate a cow with the small pox which will be converted to a mild fluid to inoculate humans.

The Mormons – Arrest of Jo. Smith

From a private letter from a highly respectable gentleman residing near the Mormon city, Nauvoo, it seems the scenes which a few months since were enacted in Missouri are in danger of being repeated in Iowa. There is a tract of land lying directly opposite the Mormon settlement on the Mississippi River. The tract was given to the Sac and Fox nations by the United States. There had been a proceeding in the Equity Court of Iowa to partition these lands and to survey and divide them among the lawful claimants. Some months since, Jo. Smith received a revelation from God to the effect that the Latter-Day Saints should go in and possess this land, and

claim a title by the Creator. They have taken much valuable timber and forbid the Commissioners and Surveyors, on pain of death, to attempt to survey and partition. "Jo. Smith was yesterday arrested between Nauvoo and Quincy, by the authorities of Illinois, on a requisition from the Gov. of Missouri." *N. Y. Journal of Commerce*

p. 2 col. 2 Mammoth Squashes – Mr. Thomas Wilder of our village, raised this season three squashes, weighing severally 107, 75, and 66 lbs., from one seed.

Mr. Smith of Mentor, exhibited one at the Fair weighing 111 lbs. but there were no others on the same vine.

p. 2 col. 3 Agricultural Fair – First came 43 pairs of oxen, preceded by a band of martial music, and attached to a large and commodious vehicle got up for the occasion. On board of this carriage, all sorts of trades and occupations were carried on while approaching the town, such as, flax dressing, coopering, shoemaking, tailoring, broom making, corn-shelling, grain threshing, blacksmithing, horseshoeing, & c. Following the carriage was a man sowing seed and a team harrowing. Next on, a wagon drawn by eight splendid grey horses, came the Mentor Polymnian Band, whose excellent music filled the air.

Oct. 18 1843

In the same carriage were 35 ladies engaged in knitting, sewing, spinning and various other employment.

Next came a wagon drawn by four "spanking bays," and containing the select school of Mr. Wilson, which consisted of some 40 or 50 children, organized with perfect system and order, attending to their studies and recitations, and receiving instruction from their preceptor. Among the other teams present, was one from Chardon, Geauga Co., which attracted much attention. It consisted of 13 yoke of oxen and 65 span of horses, all owned by Orrin Tucker, Esq. accompanied with some 15 or 20 men in his employ.

Mr. Asa Childs, of this town, exhibited at the Fair a superb plated single harness.

The Military had scarcely set up their tents before Britton and his associates started trouble; he was arrested and brought into Camp, but soon discharged upon his promise that he would go away and not make any more difficulty. But shortly, he started to make a disturbance again, and Mr. Allen, who was one of the sentinels on duty, was ordered to arrest him. Seeing Britton sitting on a rise, Mr. Allen put his hand on Britton's shoulder, when Britton stabbed him in the heart and he fell down dead. The guard had some difficulty capturing Britton but took him into the Camp where he remained until he was delivered to the civil authorities the next morning.

Letter from the Mormon War—Another Anti-Mormon Killed. We have a long letter from the Editor of the *St. Louis Republican*--dated Sept. 18. Samuel McBratney, one of the incendiaries engaged in burning the Mormons out on Bear Creek was killed by the Sheriff's posse. He was shot from his horse and otherwise mangled by the Mormons. The Mormons declared if the law failed to protect them, they had the power to protect themselves. The Sheriff sent a communication to Col. Williams requiring him and other leaders of the mob to come in and submit to the law. Symptoms of trouble were manifesting themselves At Keokuk, Iowa Territory, the citizens of the township resolved that the Mormons should not live there and sent a petition to the Gov. requesting to have them removed. The *St. Louis papers* of the 21st, the Mormons between 600-800 under the command of Sheriff Backenstos and E. A. Bedell, Postmaster at Warsaw marched into that place. The anti-Mormons had fled across the river. The people of Quincy have called a public meeting to take into consideration the disturbances in Hancock Co. Gov. Ford, of Illinois, refuses to take any measures and expresses his determination to let them fight it out.

p. 2 col. 4 The Agricultural Fair – The farmers of the Western Reserve have met with a reverse in consequence of the oppressive drought this last season, from which they will not entirely recover for years to come. The failure of the hay crop compelled them to reduce their stocks of cattle.

All other crops have suffered more or less from the drouth and the grasshoppers, and added to this the destruction of the fruit by the early frosts. As a consequence of all this the Fair that took place was meagre indeed.

Mammoth Cheese – From the dairy of Mr. Ezra Holmes, of Kirtland, the cheeses were of an average of 80 lbs. each.

p. 2 col. 5 Body Snatching – Some gentlemen from Austinburgh passed through this town Monday night in pursuit of Dr. Shelby, who is charged with robbing the grave of a Mrs. Preston, and also of a child of Mr. Lucius Austin. The bodies were discovered at Ashtabula Harbor, boxed up and directed to T. Sherwood, Cleveland, O. The shipment of the box was delayed and the offensive odor from it led to an examination of the contents. The bodies were recognized by some people from Austinburgh.
