PLEASANT JUNE WEDDING

Miss Maud Fox of this City and Chas. E. Reinig of Butte, Mont. United for Life.

At noon today, at the pleasant home of the bride's mother on upper Prospect street, will occur the marriage ceremony which will unite Miss Maud Fox of this city and Mr. Chas. E. Reinig of Butte, Mont, in matrimony, Rev. F. H. Anderson of the Pilgrim Congregational church to officiate. The ceremony will be witnessed by many relatives and friends of the bride. The groom will be attended by his cousin, Mr. Hugh Reinig of Griswold Iowa as best man while Miss Mable Ryan of this city will act as bridesmaid.

The bride, who is one of Durand's Durand's accomplished young ladies, has always made Durand her home and is known to most Wedge readers. She is a daughter of Martha and the late Arther Fox. She graduated from the High School in 1895 and from the Stevens Point Normal in 1898. She has been a successful teacher in the schools in this county and for the past three years has been teaching in the public schools in Butte, Mont.

The groom is a stranger to us but is a successful young business man and holds a responsible position of trust in the State Savings Bank in Butte, acting at present as paying teller.

The couple will leave for Butte on the afternoon train, where they will make their future home. The Wedge joins the many friends of the bride in wishing the young people a happy, prosperous married life.

Note: The following clipping describes the wedding of Dr. Galen A. Fox and Ida May Gilland on Nov. 6, 1909.

At eight o'clock Saturday evening occurred one of the prettiest weddings that has stirred Cheyenne society for a long time. It was the wedding of Miss Ida May Gilland and Dr. Galen A. Fox. The ceremony took place at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George H. Gilland on Ferguson street, Reverend Frank L. Moore of the Congregational church officiating.

The Gilland home was elaborately decorated for the occasion. The parlors and dining room were transformed into bowers of beauty with yellow chrysanthemums and ferns. The stair railings were entwined with white flowers and tulle and long ropes of smilax. Ferns and smilax were also used on the curtains and hangings in the various rooms and were festooned from the chandeliers to all parts of the rooms. In the back parlor where the ceremony was performed was a high embankment of palms and cut flowers and before which were two dainty white satin cushions upon which the newly wedded couple knelt.

The nuptial music was especially beautiful. Before the ceremony Miss Flora McGregor played several selections and Miss Olive Hetzel sang "I Love Thee Truly." At eight o'clock the bridal party ascended the flower adorned stairway, while the soft strains of the bridal chorus from Lohengrin was softly played, which during the ceremony was changed to a selection from Wagner's "Der Freischutz" and at the conclusion of the ceremony bursting into the strains of Meddelssohn's Wedding March.

The bride's gown was an exquisite creation of heavily corded silk of a delicate ivory shade. It was made in princess style with a long train. The trimmings were of pearl passementerie and heavily embroidered French knots. She carried an arm bouquet of brides' roses.

Her attendants were her two sisters, Miss Vera Gilland and Miss Helen Gilland. Their gowns were made alike and were of yellow seco silk cut in the moyenage style, with low neck and short puff sleeves. They carried large bouquets of yellow chrysanthemums.

The groom was unattended.

Immediately following the ceremony an elaborate wedding supper was served. At the bride's table were the bridal party and the immediate relatives. The table decorations were elaborately followed out with yellow chrysanthemums and ferns. The place cards and favors were in one, being small boxes of wedding cake tied with dainty bows of white ribbons with the guests names in gold written upon them.

It was expected by the friends of the bride and groom that they would leave immediately after the ceremony for the east, but their plans were different and they did not leave until Sunday morning, when they took the train for the Pacific coast, where they will remain for several weeks.

The traveling gown was of reseda green broadcloth, made in a plain tailored style. A most becoming hat of green silk and black lynx was worn with this as was also worn a black lynx neck piece and large pillow muff.

Mrs. Fox has lived in Cheyenne for many years and has made a host of friends during her residence here. She has

attended the Cheyenne schools and finished her schooling at College of Colorado. Dr. Fox is a comparative new comer to Cheyenne but has made many friends here both in a business way and socially.

Upon their return from their honeymoon, Dr. and Mrs. Fox will go to housekeeping at 212 East Twenty-second street, where they will be at home to their friends.

Note: The two following ^{PW}clippings relate the death of Arthur Fox.

FOX.-- At his home in the town of Durand, Saturday morning, March 31, 1894, Arthur Fox, aged 45 years. Mr. Fox had been suffering for more than a year with a disease of the kidneys, that baffled the treatment of several skillful physicians. Arthur Fox was born in Van Buren, Ind., Jan. 20, 1849. When a child, his parents, Adam L. and Matilda Fox, moved to Dane Co. and afterwards to Durand township. The History of Chippewa Valley records that the last removal was made with ox teams, the family also bringing one horse and some cows and young stock. Mr. Fox at the age of 21 went to Iowa and purchased a farm, but soon returned to take charge of the "home" farm, upon which he resided at the time of his death. He was united in marriage October 17, 1874, with Miss Martha Parrish, daughter of E. A. Parrish, who, with two children, Maude and Galen, survive. The funeral was held from the home, Monday afternoon, Rev. John Holt, officiating. The remains were placed in the Durand cemetery, the accompanying procession being one of the largest ever in Bear Creek Valley. Arthur Fox was highly esteemed by his neighbors and friends. He was a restless worker and an honest, conscientious man. The entire community sympathizes with the family in their bereavement.

Death of Arthur Fox

Although not entirely unexpected the announcement of the death of Arthur Fox early last Saturday morning came as a sudden shock to many who had been hoping for his ultimate recovery. Mr. Fox was taken ill last July, and although everything possible was done and the best medical skill obtained, it was soon evident to his family and friends that his illness was to terminate fatally. He was for some weeks at the Eau Claire hospital but received no relief and returning home proceeded to prepare for the end. His earthly affairs were placed in order some time ago. Early in the winter he manifested an interest in religious matters and

after many earnest conferences with Rev. John Holt expressed the firm conviction that he had found that which he sought. He expressed a desire to be baptised and the solemn rites were administered by Rev. Holt a few weeks ago.

In the death of Arthur Fox the community loses a good and upright citizen and the family a kind and affectionate husband and father. The funeral was held at the residence in Bear Creek Monday afternoon, and the esteem in which he was held was amply illustrated by the large attendance of sympathizing friends and neighbors.

Arthur Fox was born at VanBuren, Indiana, Jan. 20th, 1849. He was a son of the late Adam Loftus Fox, well known to all residents of this section, and who died at the residence of Arthur in 1881. Mrs. Fox died at Van Buren when Arthur was but four years of age. The family removed from Indiana to Dane County in 1854 and in 1856 came to this county. Arthur attended the district school and spent a short time at the State University, and in 1870 went to Iowa and purchased a farm. He did not remain long, however, but returning here took charge of his father's farm, which he afterwards purchased and occupied until the time of his death. October 17th 1874, he was united in marriage to Miss Martha Parrish, daughter of E. A. Parrish of Canton, who with their two children, Maud and Galen, survive him. His brothers and sisters, Henry L. Fox, Chas. J. Fox and Mrs. A. T. Spooner of this county, and Adam L. Fox, Mrs. H. Cathcart and Mrs. C. Freligh of Iowa were all present during a part of his illness, the three latter going home but a short time ago, and were unable to return for the funeral.

A very large company of neighbors and friends assembled at the Parish home in Tarrant last Saturday, at 11 O'clock to sympathize with the bereaved family, and join in the sad rites attendant upon the burial of Mrs. Parish. Rev. J. F. Bacon of the Congregational church in Durand, officiated, and the choir of the same church, furnished the singing.

Mrs. Parish was a lineal descendant of the Brewster family who came to this country in the "May Flower", along with the Pilgrims, her maiden name being Cornelia J. Brewster. She was born at Auburn, Gauga Co. Ohio Sept. 29th, 1837. She was married to E. A. Parish, Sept. 16th, 1855; and

Along with her husband came the next year to Wis. and settled on what is known as the Frank Howard farm, where they remained one year, then returned to Ohio. They came again to Wis. in 1862, and settled on the Asel Goss place; but, after a residence of two years, returned to Ohio, again. In 1866, Mr. and Mrs. Parish came to Wis. to stay, and settled on their present home place at Tarrant. Her husband, E. A. Parish, four children, and a step daughter, mourn her loss, all of whom were with her in the last hours. The children are, Mrs. Hattie O. Howard, Gene C. Parish of Mondovi, and Guy E. and Add Parish, of Tarrant; Mrs. Arthur Fox of Durand being the step daughter. Mrs. Parish was a loving and beloved wife and mother, and her gentle and merciful spirit had won her a host of friends. She will be greatly missed in Bear Creek Valley, where she has been a ministering Spirit for nearly thirty years.

PIONEER DIES

E. A. Parish Passes Away at
Home in Bear Creek on
Wednesday last.

RECEDED IN BEAR CREEK
VALLEY FIFTY YEARS

Had been in Poor Health for
many Years -- was 83 years
of age.

E. A. Parish, one of the early pioneers of this section passed away at his home in Bear Creek on Wednesday night Feb. 14, 1906, aged 83 years, 2 months and one day.

Ephraim Andrew Parish, one of the first of Bear Creek's pioneers, was born in Cuyahoga, Co., Ohio, 83 years ago last December 13. His father was a farmer who came from Massachusetts at an early time. He was a drummer in the war of 1812 on "our side" of course, making his home at Toledo at that time. The detachment of the army he was in had most of its fighting with the Indians. He got some recognition for his services in that war--after he was dead, that is, his wife did, in the shape of a grant of 160 acres of land.

The subject of Solon, this sketch lived in Ohio till 1855 when he moved into this vicinity having handled several pieces of land which go to make up some of the finest farms in the fertile Bear Creek valley.

He was married in '45 to Miss Corintha Pettibone. They had two children, Martha (Mrs. Arthur Fox), Lily C. (Mrs. Chas. Fessenden), who lives in Kent, Ohio. Her

husband who was an engineer, is dead. Some time after the death of his first wife, Mr. Parish married again, to Miss Cornelia Brewster was his choice this time. She was in direct line a decendent of the famous John Brewster a Baptist minister who came from England to America in the Mayflower.

There were four children from this connection; Eugene, who has a fine farm near Mondovi; Guy, who has as good a farm, Harriet (Mrs. Jno. Crawford,) who lives at Boardman, and Ad. E. who has charge of the home farm.

Mr. Parish was always a public spirited man and always did every thing in his power to further the interests of his community. He came here when the country was a vast wilderness and lived to see the valley prosper and thrive for half a century until it had developed into one of the richest valleys in the northwest. He was a kind neighbor and a loving husband and father. The funeral services which were held at the home on Saturday morning, were largely attended which but attested to the high regard and esteem in which the deceased was held in the community. Rev. S. M. MacNeil of the Congregational church of Mondovi officiated at the service and the interment was make in Durand cemetery.

KILLE FAMILY PAPERS FOUND IN LOGAN FAMILY BIBLE.

Handwritten account of family meeting:

Family Meeting.

Editor Monitor:

A very happy family meeting took place at the residence of Joseph Harlan, near Damascus, Columbiana Co., Ohio, on Friday September 4th, 1874. The remaining children Clayton Kille, who settled in this county, in the spring of 1818, met at that place and time, after a long seperation. One brother had not met for thirty-six year. Eight are now remaining. The eldest Rachel Gaskill, in her 71st year, residence Alliance, Ohio.

Mary K. Stanley, in her 69th year, residence Damascus, Columbianna county, O.

Isaac Kille, in his 67th year, residence Chestehill Co. O.

Family meeting, continued:

Jemima Wright, in her 59th year, residence Gardington,
Morrow Co. O.

Ann K. Woods, in her 64th year, residence Pittsburgh, Pa.

Thomas Kille, in his 62nd year residence Vinton Co., O.

These surrounded the table together for the first time in forty years. Quite a number of children, grandchildren, and relatives were also present; A day pleasant, friendly greeting was passed. Happy meeting; happy greeting. The 90th psalm was read by Rachel Gaskill, thanks returned by several present. "The Sweet Bye and Bye" was sung, and they separated, in all probability never to meet again until they meet "Beyond the River."

Notes added to copy of above account by Mrs. Grace Logan Schaedel:

This account of a family reunion mentions members of the Kille Family who were cousins of Elizabeth Kille Logan (Mrs. Hill Logan) Their father, John Clayton Kille (Killie) of Columbiana County, Ohio, was an older brother of Thomas Kille 1785-1845, who was the grandfather of Ernest Logan of Cheyenne. Elizabeth Kille Logan was born Feb. 22, 1824, Salem, Ohio, and married Hill Logan, County Antrim, Ireland, in 1843 in Ohio, moving to Illinois in 1854. Ernest Logan was born Oct. 21, 1857, d. Oct. 24, 1944, Cheyenne. His sister, Frankie Logan Carlaw, b. Nov. 10, 1860, d. April 11, 1946, Sacramento, Calif.

A family record from Ike Killie (Kille) in Denver, cousin of Elizabeth Kille Logan, shows a William Clayton Killie, b. 1770, and John Clayton Killie, 1773-1846, both older brothers of Thomas Kille, our great-grandfather, 1785-1845. John Clayton Killie's name comes up again as the "Clayton Kille" who was the father of those present at this family reunion. Abraham Chandler Killie, father of Ike Killie, and his sister, Elizabeth Kille Logan, had two infant brothers who died in infancy, one also a John Clayton Killie, 1822-1822, not to be confused with their uncle, John Clayton Killie, 1873-1846. (Note: must be 1773 P.C.F.)

Ike Killie in Denver insisted on the spelling "Killie", but this early ms. shows Kille, as spelled by Elizabeth Kille Logan (our grandmother). The final e is a separate syllable. Ernest

Logan said Ike put the extra i in himself.

Typewritten manuscript on genealogy of the Kille family:

GENEALOGY OF THE "KILLIE" FAMILY

It is reliably stated that the Killies are principally of English ancestry, partly Welch and one German ancestor.

From letters written by Thomas C. Killie in 1898 and John H. Killie in 1902, sons of Thomas Killie (who lived and died at Paris, Stark County, Ohio) to their niece Mary J. Prince of Canton, Ohio, we glean the following interesting information relative to the Killie family.

"The name K-i-l-l-e or rather K-i-l-l-i-e is of Galic origin and comes from the Highlands of Scotland. Its English equivalent is Church -Killie - Cranke or the Glen of Killie, and is the place from which Killies originally came. It is north and west of Loch Lamond. Take a good map of Scotland --start up the Tay river, from the Firth of Tay, North Sea, you come to Killie--Cranke, follow the Tay west a few miles, there on the north bank, yet stands the old Monor House of Prince Killie in Perthshire.

Church - Killie - Cranke, or the glen of Killie, is memorable, as being the scene of, at least, two events that have a prominent place in history. The first, was the burning of Killie Christ, or Christs Church, by McDonalds, when the building was full of women and children, not one escaped. Most of the Highlanders at that time were savages, as wild and ruthless as the Mohawks, and what in that bad age was far worse, they were Catholics. "There used to be an old book in our family, entitled "Daring Exploits and Perilous Adventures". It contained the fearful story of the raid of Killie Christ. You may have read it without knowing that those unfortunate people were your relatives, or that they were burnt alive because they were protestants. Whenever you look upon the portrait of Mary, Queen of Scots, remember that you have personal reasons for execrating the memory of that painted harridan and painted fiend. The second event to which I referred, was the battle of Killie - Cranke, fought between the armies of King William and King James, in 1689, the result of church troubles. Dundee, was killed and men opposed to him hurried out of Scotland. The Killies being free "church" churchmen, were always on the side of free thought and act.

The Killies went to England and from there to America, which was then a British Colony. Three brothers came to America in 1690, one went down into New Jersey, one up into Massachusetts, and one into Canada. Today there is no trace of the one who went to Massachusetts. The one who went to Canada left traces behind him, as the name is common in and around Hamilton, Ontario. The name Kille, marks the change in spelling --in Salem County, New Jersey, is like that of Smith, Brown, or Wilson, -- very common. The name Killie occurs in Burns' poems several times, but in that Masonic song the first line of which is "Ye sons of old Killie, assembled "Willie", and also that line of another song of his, "The high borne dames of Killie", he refers not to a family, but to the old name of the city of Kilmarnock, which was originally, Killie, because it is rightand because it is more easily pronounced than K*Il-l-i-e, and also because Killie is always being turned into Kelly, a name that is odious, because it is Irish. Confounding of the name Kille with that of Kelly was quite distasteful to many of the early fathers and also to many of the present generation. The Killies, probably settled at Salem, New Jersey, before Penn landed at New Castle. They became followers of George Fox, the founder of what is known as the Quaker Meeting, or Friends Meeting.

The oldest Killies that we have any reliable account of just now, were Abraham and Rachel Killie, who doubtless lived in an early period of the 18th century. Abraham Killie was married three times, Rachel, his first wife was the mother of three sons, Isaac being the oldest. To Abraham's second wife were born three sons and two daughters, Rachel and Mary. Mary married Samuel Davis, they lived and died in Salem, Columbiana Co., Ohio. Rachel was usually known to the younger generation as "Old Aunt Rachel". Isaac Killie, Abraham's oldest son, is the one whom we are more particularly interested in, as we are his direct descendants. He was born March 13th, 1742, died Oct. 25th 1797. He was a shingle maker. He served in the revolutionary war, 1783 in the commissary department, was once taken prisoner by the British. He married Martha Clayton in 1767 at Port Penn, Salem County, New Jersey. No such town now appears on the map. Martha Clayton, wife of Isaac Killie, was born June 8, 1747. She was a direct descendant of the Parnells, an English family of nobility. She died Sept. 20th, 1815. The children of Isaac Killie and Martha Clayton Killie were,

at Paris, Stark County, Ohio, where he and his first wife, Mary Chandler Killie, are buried. Thomas Killie was the youngest child of Isaac and Martha Clayton Killie. He was a hatter. He learned his trade in Philadelphia, Pa., where he went when 14 years old and remained there ten years or more. He married his first wife, Mary Chandler, in Salem County, New Jersey. Her ancestry were of English descent and dates back to the Mayflower, 1620. We have no date of her birth or of her marriage to Thomas Killie, but they must have been married sometime between 1810 and 1814. They were married out of Meeting, he being a Quaker and she not, and he refused to acknowledge a wrong for so doing. The Quaker Meeting then withdrew its membership from Thomas Killie and for this refusal to acknowledge wrong in marriage, he was held in contempt by all Quakers. Following are the children of Thomas and Mary Chandler Killie.

John Killie and John Clayton Killie --both died in infancy (born Dec. 1826, died Nov. 8, 1827) (born June 1822, died July 22, age 4 wks.) Mary Chandler Killie, first wife of Thomas Killie, died in Paris, Stark County, Ohio, Nov. 6th 1827, and is buried there. Soon after her death, he married Jane Hines. She was of German descent. Her grandfather, John Hines, was born in Germany about the year 1740. In 1767, he with his family and brother Henry came to America and settled in Lancaster County, Pa., June 4th 1800. The afterwards married John Hiner. She died in Fayette Co., Ill. April 14th 1883. The children of Thomas and Jane Hines Killie are,

Thomas Killie was a man of more than average intelligence, well read and a good conversationalist. He served in the war of 1812, enlisted Sept. 20th, 1814 under Capt. James Lackey, West Chester, Chester County, Pa. Served until Dec. 15th when peace was declared. For this service, his second wife, Jane Hines Killie got a land warrant of 160 acres, in 1859, laid in Marshall County, Ind.

Isaac Killie, (father of Thomas Killie) was a Quaker but his wife Martha Clayton Killie was a sturdy tory who never got tired abusing Washington or of praising those two Miscreants, King Charles the second and King James, the second.

Thomas Killie had two virtues, which it seems he did not inherit from his mother. First, he was not much of a Quaker, second he was not a tory at all. He married out of the church, and he volunteered to fight the British in the war of 1812. For those two good deeds, the broad-brims cast him off, and he joined a loyal church, the Methodist.

The Penns, the Claytons, the Gaskills and the Killies were intermarried, but nothing particular is known of them now, only the Gaskills lived at Alliance. In the general election in 1838 one of the New Jersey Killies got into congress on a very close vote. He ran as a democrat. An account of that famous contested election case --democratic--can be found in Bentons "Thirty Years View" Vol. 2, Chapter 39.

Henry B. Killie, son of Thomas and Jane Mines Killie, enlisted for the civil war in the 19th Ill. Reg. at Mattoon, Ill. in 1862. In the battle of Murfreesboro, he was shot, a flesh wound in the face, took neuralgia in the wound, and died very suddenly Jan. 20th, 1863. He served as adjutant.

Thomas C. Killie (brother of Henry B. Killie) first enlisted at Shakopee, Minn., to quell the Indian Massacre in 1861, then again in 1862. He was Captain of Artillery, elected by acclamation. Most of his service was in the north west, some in the north east part of Missouri. John Mines Killie enlisted at Alliance, Ohio, in 1861, in the Canton Zouaves, with Capt. Wanderson. Served all the time of the rebellion.

Charles Weatherwax, Lydia A. Killie's first husband, enlisted at Terre Haute, Ind., in 1862 in the 63rd Ind. Reg. He fills an unknown grave. E. Shoepf, Caroline Killie's husband, filled many offices at home, but never enlisted.

Hill Logan, Elizabeth Killie's husband, served in the St. Louis Arsenal from 1861 until peace was declared in 1865. Elmer Harry, Mary Ann Killie Harry's son enlisted at Bluffton, Ind. in 1862. Served three years.

Isaac, Samuel, and Levi Killie were exempted from army service on account of physical disability, but were just as loyal as their brothers who served in the army.

Elizabeth Killie Maines, oldest child and only daughter of Isaac and Martha Clayton Killie and sister of Thomas Killie, was

born at Salem, New Jersey, Aug. 18th 1768 and died at the residence of her daughter, Ann Haines Ewing in Pittsburg, Pa., in 1856.

Her husband was Abraham Haines. Their children were Jonathan, Richard and Abram Haines and one daughter, Ann Haines Ewing.

Aunt Betsy Haines, as she was familiarly called, was ever a welcome visitor in the homes of her brothers, nephews and nieces.

Excerpts from letter written by Mrs. Mabel Killie Hamlin to Mrs. Grace Logan Schaedel:

Oct. 16, 1962.

Dear Grace,

Was happy to receive your interesting letter. I have always had such respect for my friends who went in for geneology. It must be very interesting and so worth while.

I must have the same thing that Mother sent to you. I can't think now where it is. but I am sure that I have little else. I believe Daddy had 4 brothers but am not sure. I rather think he was one of the 4 himself. But I know he had 4 sisters - Oldest was Mollie who married Jack Reid and lived in Chandlersville, all her life. Next was Hattie who married Monte Sutton, had 3 children and lived and died in Zanesville, Ohio. Then 2 twin sisters. Elizabeth (Libbie) and Nannie. Former married Will Vogt, had 3 children and lived and died in Zanesville, Nannie married a man whose last name was Henry, had 4 children and lived in Ft. Wayne, Ind.

Mother's maiden name was Martha Elissa Hannum, born 20 miles from Cleveland, came to Denver in 1874 and taught school. She was a graduate of Painesville Femal Seminary in Ohio. She & Daddy met & married here in the eighties and I the only child.

Two of Daddy's brothers died single. And I believe the older one was not well and died in Ohio.

I think the most interesting thing in our family is the Chandler connection I was told yrs ago that Howard Chandler Christy was a relative. He, his sister Rose and their parents were born and lived in Chandlersville, a little town ten miles outside of Zanesville.

There were 2 chandler sisters, one who was a direct ancestor of ours. Their father settled some where in Pennsylvania

and Harrisburg, Penn is supposed to be on their land. Periodically, some one used to show up in Denver when I was a child, looking for Chandler heirs and wanting to be financed in claiming this Pennsylvania Chandler estate. Daddy paid no attention to any of it. But yrs ago I saw the names of these 2 sisters in a volume of an early encyclopedia. I think onw was Mary. There were Quakers in our family.

Do get on this Chandler trail. It could not only tie us in with the illustrious HCChristy but would be interesting to see if they ever were chronicled. I think Daddy's older brother's name was Lew and the 2 younger ones Ed and Jim. Ed sold early Singer sewing machines in Denver and gave me the toy sized model that I later gave to Mabel Logan.

I'm sure Daddy's grandfather was named Abraham and his brothers ALL had Bible names. Daddy loved to tell those names. Daddy's name was Isaac Lawrence Killie (correct spelling Kille) Daddy was only one who put that i in. There is a Burns poem mentioning the mountains in Scotland and one ---"the heights of Kille Krabky."

There used to be an old Uncle Isaac, who came to Denver occasionally when I was a child. He was a very old man, then. I'm sure his last name was Killie. He came on the train from somewhere and would hand me what was left of his dried up lunch.

* * * * *

"Columbiana County" in Ohio intrigues me. I never heard of it. I wonder if name has been changed? Mother was born in Portage County and Daddy in Muskingum County. I still have 2 cousins in Zanesville, both very old. They would be no help. Dorothy is in nursing home (daughter of Aunt Hattie) Winifred on an old farm in care of nurse (daughter of Libby).

I remember Frankie Carlew and her 3 daughters. Lovely people. I trust you keep in touch with the girls.

(Note: This record is written in pencil on sheets torn from a lined writing tablet. It is among the papers found in the Bible of Arthur Wilfred and Della Luella Wood Noble.)

George B. Wood was born June 7, 1806 and married Sarah Mann Curry March 17, 1830.

Sarah Mann Curry was born Dec 5th 1801. And to this union was born

According to letters in possession of James A. Wood, George B. Wood went south to make money and left his wife and 2 children, James A. and John C., in Fleurissant, Mo., a French village 6 miles west of where St. Louis then was and now no doubt in the city limits. A letter from George B. Wood to his wife dated in Louisiana Nov 1st 1835 speaks of the two children, Jas Andrew just two years old that date and the baby Jno Cleland if alive playing about her feet. He speaks of a desire to return home. Another letter from New Orleans speaks of George B. Wood being sick. A Letter from Fort Adams, Miss in 1836 shows him to be 200 miles nearer home working at his trade at \$50.00 per month and Found, and would stay a while as he had good health and making good money.

All letters show a desire to return home, also request that his wife and children move to Whitehall, Illinois. And Uncle James A. says that as far back as he can remember he was with his grandfather Curry in Green County, Ill. near Whitehall and he thinks he was about 2 years old. Grandfather Curry was formerly from Virginia and Kentucky and it is thought Sarah Mann Curry Wood was born in Kentucky and the Currys were once slave holders. No farther back in the Wood family than Geo B. Wood's birth can be traced. No record of the death of his 3 first born children and James A. Wood has no recollection of any living sister or two older brothers than the Bible record. John Cleland and Jas Andrew were the only children spoken of in letters of 1835 and 1836. No knowledge or record of the death of George B. Wood after the letter written by him at the Fort in Miss where he was working at his trade, a blacksmith.

In the year 1855, June 21st, she married John Cleland Wood at Carlton (sic. Carrollton), Ill. He was a preacher in the M.E. Church and died April 24, 1883. There were nine children, six sons and three daughters. There remain four boys, Edward, James, Charles and Judd and one daughter, Della. In the early spring of 1884, Mrs. Wood and the children came to Hays and has been one of the pioneers of this place..
