United States.

9th. I desire that my just debts and funeral expenses should be paid out of personal property and that the remainder of said personal property consisting of one stock of cattle marked poplar-leaf in one ear and staple fork in the other and branded AW; also my wagon and harness, stock hogs and horses, together with all household and kitchen furniture of which I may die siezed.

I give and bequeath to the four heirs of Celia Jane Rimer, and to said Celia Jane Rimer herself as follows: to the said Celia Jane Rimer one-fifth of the said above named person property. To my beloved grand daughter Bettie J. Raulerson, nee, Bettie J. Rimer, I give and bequeath one-fifth of the above named personal property.

To my beloved grand daughter Mary Ardelia Rimer, I give and

bequeath one-fifth of said personal property.

To my beloved grand son James Hampton Rimer, I give and bequeath one-fifth of said property.

To my beloved grand daughter Hattie L. Lee Rimer, I give and

bequeath one-fifth of said personal property.

10th. I do hereby make, constitute and appoint my beloved friend and neighbor Hampton H. Smith, executor of this my last will and testament. This 24th day of September 1886.
