13. William Sloan, born 1863; died October 19, 1941; married Mary Jane Gaskets in 1886.

Daniel Sloan was residing in Thomas County, Georgia in both the 1840 and 1850 Census. In 1850, he was living in the same household with his younger brother, Dickson Sloan. He and his family moved to south Florida about 1852 settling in Hillsborough County near Plant City.

Daniel Sloan fought in the indian wars in Georgia and Florida. He was a Private in the company commanded by Capt. James Numan in the regiment commanded by Col. Young. He volunteered in June or July of 1837 by reason of an order from the Governor of Georgia to march against the indians and was honorably discharged in September or October of 1837. He was also a Private in the company commanded by Capt. Levi J. Knight in the regiment commanded by Col. Hall. He volunteered in September or October of 1838 and was discharged in December 1838 or January of 1839. He received for his services a Land Warrant for 40 acres by the Act of 1850 and later received a Bounty Land Warrant for 120 acres by the Act of 1855.

Besides his war services in the Georgia Militia, he was very active in the Florida Seminole Indian Wars. As a Private in Capt. Hooker's Company of Florida Mounted Volunteers, he served from January 3, 1856 when he was mustered in at Fort Meade till February 21, 1856 when he was mustered out at Fort Meade. He rejoined and served again under Capt. Hooker from February 21, 1856 till August 20, 1856.


He was mustered in to service as a Private in Capt. Lesley's Independant Company of Florida Mounted Volunteers on August 20, 1856 at Fort Meade and was mustered out at Fort Brooke on July 19, 1857.

His final service in the Indian Wars was from March 11, 1858 to May 10, 1858 as a Private in Capt. Durrance's Independant Company of Florida Mounted Volunteers.

Daniel's two oldest sons, Alford and Owen, served with him during the Seminole War of 1856 in William B. Hooker's Company.

In 1860, Daniel Sloan was residing in Hillsborough County next door to his son, Owen Sloan, and his wife. Owen's occupation was given as a cattle driver.
