Enoch pain for the rest of his life. On an application for an invalid pension in 1874, he stated, "I was thrown from my horse and terribly injured and disabled, having my thigh badly mashed and my body seriously injured from which a permanent rupture was caused which has become so violent as to destroy my physical health and renders me unable to perform manual labor for which I am dependent on for a support, I being a planter. The injury has been progressing from 1838 until the present time." He was mustered out with the Company on December 18, 1837 at Newmansville, Florida.

He served under Col. Robert Brown's Regiment of Florida Volunteers for a brief three month period from April 6, 1838 to July 22, 1838.

On August 22, 1840 at Fort Call, East Florida, Enoch E. Mizell once again mustered another Company of his own. This
