JUDGE DENNIS MARION CASON

Grandmother Martha always addressed her husband as "Mr. Cason", which seems to us a formal salutation, yet, it could be that she was aware of the social standing in the 17th century where the term Mister was no doubt applied to both gentleman and yoeman alike. We know he was most certainly a gentle family man.

Judge CASON was prominent in the Camps of Confederate Veterans and his greatest pleasure was attending meetings of the veterans.

Dennis L. Marion CASON passed away 10 November 1910 and is buried in Wauchula Cemetery beside his first wife, Mytelda Rosewell LEE.

A PIONEER CITIZEN DEAD

Judge D. M. CASON passed away yesterday after a few days sickness.

Judge Dennis Marion CASON died at his home in Wauchula yesterday of septic poisoning after being confined to his home about a week. The funeral will take place this morning at 10:30 o'clock, from the Baptist Church if the grief-stricken widow is able to attend, otherwise from the home.

Judge CASON was born in Georgia in 1837 and moved to South Florida in 1874. He was one of the pioneer citizens of DeSoto county and no man was more highly respected. For ten years the writer has been intimately acquainted with Judge CASON and during this time we never heard of him doing a questionable act, but on the other hand, always found him standing up for the right and just. For years he was justice of the peace for this district and was re-elected to that office Tuesday, receiving the solid vote of the district.
